## Tale of 'The Silver Tooth of **Marty's Youth'**

About the time I reached twelve years of age, I had an accident while swimming at Glen Hall Pool. I dove too deeply into the shallow end of the pool and struck my face on the bottom.

As a result of the collision, I chipped my upper front tooth almost half off. A few days later I visited our family dentist. He put a silver cap on the damaged tooth and told me, "Since your teeth are still growing Marty, I can't repair this damage until they have finished grow-

So, that was that. The cap remained on the tooth until I reached 17 years of age.

I damaged my teeth even worse a year later, when I fell into a concrete porch while playing on Janey Way. That accident knocked my other front upper tooth completely out. So, in addition to the silver cap, I had a gap in my front teeth.

This damage to my teeth had an effect on me. One day, a boy looked at me and asked, "Where did you get that silver tooth?"

I responded, "What's it to you?"

Fearing repercussions, he said nothing more, but having the silver tooth definitely embarrassed me. Over the next several years, I rarely smiled, and then, only with my mouth closed: a kind of Mona Lisa smile.

My friends were great, they never taunted me about this. Others were not so kind.

Later, when I attended Sacramento High, I participated actively in athletics, grew up, and soon forgot about the silver tooth. However, people always thought me a very serious person, as I rarely smiled. My high school graduation picture reflects this serious demeanor.

In 1964, the summer after I graduated from high school, I went to the dentist for a routine checkup.

As he examined my teeth, he said, "Your teeth have fully matured now Marty. It's time to put in a bridge where your two front teeth have been damaged."

So, over the next few months, I saw the dentist several times. He made a plaster of Paris impression of my teeth and from that constructed a bridge to fill the gap between the teeth. Finally, he installed the bridge in my

After he put my new front teeth in and had adjusted them to fit properly, he said, "Nurse, take Marty over to the big mirror and show him his new teeth."

When I looked into the mirror and smiled, a feeling of joy came over me which I can hardly explain.

For the first time in five years, my teeth looked straight and white and beautiful. After that, I smiled often.

People sometimes say to me, "You sure smile a lot." And I do. My mother always said that a smile doesn't cost one cent, yet sometimes it can bring joy to other people. Now the silver tooth of my youth is just another not very happy Janey Way memory.

## Pet food drive to benefit animals in need on Nov. 13

The Sacramento Cat Hospital is hosting its Second Annual Pet Food Drive, benefiting Sacramento's Loaves & Fishes and the Sacramento Pet Food Bank, on Saturday, Nov. 13.

"Providing enough pet food to meet the need is an ongoing challenge for shelters, charitable organizations, and animal rescue groups," said Dr. Billie Bensen Martin, owner of the Sacramento Cat Hospital. "This large-scale pet food drive is an effective way for our community to help animals in need all over the city."

During last year's drive, more than 8000 pounds of pet food was collected. "It was wonderful to see the generosity of our community at last year's pet food drive," said Dr. Martin. "We're hoping to collect even more pet food this year. The economic climate means that the demand is greater than ever. So many people in our city are faced with the difficult choice of feeding themselves, or feeding their pets."

The kennel at Loaves & Fishes houses and feeds the pets of their guests while the guests are eating in the dining room or participating in other services. Pet food is also distributed to those who have pets at home.

The Sacramento Pet Food Bank was launched in November 2009 in response to the increase in pets surrendered to shelters due to the inability of their owners to afford to feed them. The goal of the program is to keep people and their pets together by having a constant supply of dog and cat food available to those in need. The food bank is a partnership between the City of Sacramento Animal Care Services, Sacramento County Animal Care and Regulation, the Sacramento Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and Happy Tails Pet Sanctuary.

# Swan tours focus on migratory waterfowl in Sacramento Valley

Every winter, millions of creatures migrate though California. Monarch butterflies are returning to Carmel. Hummingbirds are headed for Mexico. And waterfowl, including the tundra swan, are heading for their favorite winter habitats in Baja California.

Tundra swans are the most common swan in North America. The bird is completely white, although the head and neck can appear rusty, due to contact with ferrous minerals in marsh soils where the birds feed. They have black legs and a black bill that usually has a yellow spot at the base.


Tundra swans are strong fliers and fly either in a straight line or in a classic "V" forma-

tion. These birds prefer habitats that include marshy lakes, bays and tundra – especially locations in Canada where tree growth is hindered by low temperatures and short growing seasons.

The birds mate for life, producing their young in the spring. It is not uncommon for cygnets – young swans – to do their first migration south with their parents. Tundra swans have a long lifespan, and few predators outside of man. A tundra swan can live as long as 20 years or more.

California's Department of Fish and Game is offering an opportunity to view these amazing creatures as they make their journey south, starting in November and running through





## **Swans:** Private lands will open for tours

the migratory season's end in February. Members of the public are invited to register for a naturalist-led swan tour of Marysville's rice and waterfowl area.

Co-hosted by local rice farmers and land owners, these tours will focus on finding tundra swans, as this tract is one of the best locations for seeing swans in California.

"We'll be scouting for the sheets of white – namely the swans – and other assorted waterfowl," said Bruce Forman, naturalist for the Department of Fish and Game. "It's also a special treat to see a bald eagle, as this is also bald eagle habitat."

Ducks, geese, cranes, shorebirds, white pelicans, herons, egrets and raptors are also commonly seen in this area, known as District 10. The area contains 23,000 acres of rice fields and restored habit not normally open to the public.

"Part of the experience will be learning about the importance of rice farming as critical habitat for many kinds of waterfowl," Forman said.

Tours will be held on the second and third Saturdays of each month from 9 a.m.-11 a.m., November through February. These are driving tours along a short route with very little walking required.

Pre-registration is required on the department's website, www.dfg.ca.gov/regions/2/SwanTours.

Up to 30 people may register for each tour. The tours are free, but registrants are encouraged to make a donation online to the California Wildlife Foundation to support the program.

The swan tours are part of DFG's wildlife viewing services program, which includes similar outdoors opportunities at Gray Lodge Wildlife Area, Yolo Basin Wildlife Area, Isenberg Crane Reserve and North Table Mountain Ecological Reserve. ## Sacramento resident sails into adventure with each Pacific Cup

Sailing long distances on the Pacific Ocean, Michael Caplan says, is "hours of boredom punctuated by moments of sheer terror."

The boredom, Caplan said, includes spending hours on watch in some of the remotest spots on the globe, complete with hallucinations and some conversation with yourself, seeing one's life compartmentalized into only periods of light and periods of darkness, and repeated meals of the same tired pasta dishes and preserved canned ba-

At the other end of the seagoing spectrum are the otherworldly, sailors-only occurrences and interactions that the landlocked will never experience: eyeball-to-eyeball meetings with whales, endless seascapes seemingly meant solely for the viewing pleasure of those lucky few on board to view them at that particular moment and latitude, and occasional moments of mortal terror.

Caplan, a Sacramento realtor and a member of the Rotary Club of Arden-Arcade, recently completed his sixth Pacific Cup, a yacht race that takes competitors 2,070 miles from San Francisco to the Kaneohe Yacht Club on the windward side of Oahu, Hawaii. Fifty-six boats participated in the 2010 event, the race's sixteenth running.

The Pacific Cup, Caplan explained, is a race primarily for amateur crews, unlike the Trans-Pacific Race, which is held in odd-numbered years and draws professional rac-

"In the Trans-Pac, the more money you have, the better your chances to win," he said. "The Pacific Cup is an amateur race, run usually with older boats and amateur crews, and there is an enormous recidivist rate. It really gets in your blood."

## A 'water-oriented' upbringing in paradise

Sailing got into Caplan's blood early; his family moved to Hawaii from Sacramento when he was just four.

"My whole recreational perspective was water-oriented. I learned to surf before I learned to swim," he recalled. "I started sailing when I was 12; one of my teenage jobs was sailing in Hawaii. The ocean became my comfort zone."

Caplan returned to the mainland for college and resettled in Sacramento. As soon as he felt he had the discretionary time he needed to be able to do so, he resumed sailing, first on San Francisco Bay, then on the Pacific Ocean. He entered his first Pacific Cup in 1990 and competed in the 2000, 2002, 2004, 2008, and 2010 races. Over the years, Caplan has helped oversee and supervise the race in a variety of roles, including once serving as race commodore, a post he recalls as being "a great deal of fun and very time-consuming."

## How the race was run

A veteran Pacific Ocean sailor, Caplan knows well the sea and its capriciousness. During one race, his boat went from upright to capsized in the blink of an

One moment, it was fivefoot seas and a 25-knot breeze, and then around 3 a.m., a squall hit us. The winds went from 25 miles per hour to 55, and we went from upright and controlled to on our ear with the boat on its side," he said."We went from tranquility to utter chaos in seconds."

Handling the challenges of the rapidly-changing seascape is the true test of a sailor's abilities, Caplan main-

"Usually during a race, there's a middle ground," he said. "You're on the edge, and anything can happen at any time, but you're managing it well. You're completely focused on this 30- to 50-foot long piece of flotation."

This year's race, Caplan said, was marked by poor sailing conditions, and the conditions influence how fast each race is run. During this summer's race, Caplan and his shipmates aboard the Whistler V took 16 days to complete the nearly 2,100mile course; the boat he was on during the 2004 race finished in just 11 days.

"The conditions really were about as bad as you could imagine this year," Caplan said. "The weather was either calm or unfavorable. Our boat performed pretty poorly, and this race was just slow; even the fastest boats performed below capacity."

All hands on deck (and in the galley)

Participating in six Pacific Cup races has given Caplan insight into how to assemble a crew for a race. The main trait he looks for in prospective crew members is reliabil-

"Each person on that boat depends totally on every other person and their ability to perform," said Caplan. "And

it's true what they say, a quiet boat is the most efficient boat."

Caplan also looks for people who are experienced ocean sailors, and possessing additional desirable skills like the ability to cook or prior medical training or experience, helps one's resumé. For the record, family ties

By now, high school seniors are fully aware that CSU, UC, The Common App and other colleges have posted their applications for Fall 2011.

As one student aptly commented, "Applying to college is like having another extracurricular activity." By planning ahead, students can make the process go much more smoothly and efficiently.

After deciding on a college list, the most important task is to make a timeline for each college, the type of appli-

cation it requires, potential scholarship opportunities, and all due dates. For the Common App and many other non-state schools, students need to note additional requirements such as teacher recommendations, art and athletic supplements as well as the secondary school, midyear and final reports completed by their high school

Some colleges even invite students to submit additional recommendations, and all of these application parts need to be coordinated and completed on schedule.

To make the application process smoother, students can work ahead and organize information for easy input. They will need the following information:

+ A copy of their high school transcript so they can record their grades;

- SAT and/or ACT scores (these must also be sent colleges);
- · A list of their activities and jobs and the amount of time involved in each;
- + Their parents' annual income (information on tax records or pay stubs);
- · Their Social Security Number (memorizing it saves time and keeps it secure);
- Their Statewide Student ID (printed on high school transcripts or obtained from the school registrar or counselor);
- · A credit card to pay for application fees and additional SAT/

# Preparedness and Self-Reliance Fair to prepare Sacramento residents for potential emergencies

California is home to natural and man-made disasters: earthquakes, fires, flooding and even extreme weather situations, such as tornadoes, are not out of the realm of possibility here.

Because of the on-going potential for emergencies in the Sacramento region, city and county organizations and officials are co-sponsoring the Sacramento Emergency Preparedness and Self-Reliance Fair on Saturday, Oct. 16 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Guest exhibitors will include the Sacramento Office of Emergency Services, the American Red Cross, the Sacramento City Fire Department, the California Emergency Management Agency, the Drowning Accident Rescue Team (DART), the Sacramento Police Department, Army Corps of Engineers, United Animal Nations, Pacific Gas & Electric, the California Conservation Corps, CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) and many more.

Visitors to the event can learn about: building disaster-resilient families, having

an emergency plan, emergency communication, emergency shelters, power generators, first aid kits, employment, wills, trusts, estate planning, budgeting and saving, a three-month supply of rotatable food, crime prevention, Neighborhood Watch, flood preparedness, water storage and purification, children's emergency activities and much, much more.

This event is open to everyone in the community.

The event will be hosted by members of The Sacramento California Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Sponsors include the Sacramento City and County Office of Emergency Services, Council Member Robbie Waters, Council Member Bonnie Pannell and County Supervisor Jimmie Yee.

Individuals of all ages will have the opportunity to learn how to better prepare for natural and man-made disasters at this free event.

The Fair will include over 40 exhibits and displays highlighting topics such as: food and water storage, stretching your food dollar, employment, family evacuation plans, 72-hour kits, water purification, first aid, fire safety and much more.



hold no sway when Caplan is gathering his crew.

"My son-in-law is the only member of my family that I deem reliable enough for this," he said. "I hope that just he and I can go sailing one of these days."

For safety's sake, each boat in the Pacific Cup is required to carry certain amounts of potable water, provisions, anchors, feet of chain, and the like. Expecting the trip from San Francisco to Hawaii to take between 12 and 14 days, Caplan prefers to take provisions for 16 to 18 days, just to be safe. Caplan also supplements the provisions by fishing from the boat; during this year's Pacific Cup, he caught and prepared four mahi-mahi. Even with the occasional fresh catch, meals and accommodations aboard the boat grow tiresome quickly, Caplan admits.

"There is no shower, no comfortable way to sleep, so you basically race all day, eat, crash, and wait until you're called for your next watch," he

said. "As far as food, we have each crew member bring in his or her favorite dish frozen, and we eat those first. Then we get into the fortified protein shakes, pasta, Vienna sausages, Spam, that sort of

## The things you see at sea

Asked about his most memorable moments and sights on a boat, Caplan recalls seeing living "Rembrandt paintings" stretch out before him at sunset, scenes so beautiful that exhausted crew members would interrupt their hard-earned naps to take them in.

He remembers feeling like

his "whole soul had been sucked up into the Milky Way" one night under the stars. He tells of flying fish and flying squid inexplicably landing with a plop on the deck of the boat and of birds lighting on one of the ropes or rails and hitchhiking for days. Perhaps most stirring are the encounters with whales.

"They make eye contact with you, and you're looking at them and they're looking back at you, and you can't help but wonder, 'What the hell is this animal thinking?"

Unfortunately, Caplan also has seen how human thoughtlessness is impacting the oceans.

"I've observed a lot of trash in the open ocean: ropes, parts of fishing nets, and of course plastic bottles and other plastic things," he said. "It's really discouraging and disheartening. The nets and ropes are the most disheartening objects, since they can trap fish, dolphins, and turtles."

Caplan credits his Hawaiian upbringing for his fondness for the ocean and its in-

"The ocean has always been dear to me; chalk it up to being raised on an island in the middle of the Pacific," he said. "Spending time out there just strengthens the commitment to preserving our natural resources. I think that most of us that sail feel similarly."



## **Grand music kicks off seventh season for Folsom Lake Symphony**

The Folsom Lake Symphony Orchestra (FLSO) kicks off its seventh season in grand style this fall, with a concert of "Beethoven, Brahms and Borodin" in its largest venue yet – Fair Oaks Presbyterian Church in Fair Oaks – on Saturday, Oct. 16.

The popular symphony orchestra will perform in three venues this season. The inaugural concert in Fair Oaks will introduce Folsom's popular performing artists to the region at large.

### Borodin

The evening starts off with the "Prince Igor Overture." Audience members may recognize leitmotifs from the Broadway play, "Kismet" (1953). However, this overture was originally composed by Aleksandr Borodin for his opera, "Prince Igor," also referred to by some as the "Polovtsian Dances."

Sadly, Borodin died before completing all of the music for "Prince Igor" in 1887. The world nearly lost the overture, as well – because the composer never wrote it down. Fortunately, he played it on numerous occasions for his friends, Rimsky-Korsakov Nikolay and Aleksandr Glasunov, composers in their own right. Glasunov undertook the task of writing the overture from memory, while Rimsky-Korsakov endeavored to edit of the opera into a more com-pleted format. "Prince Igor" was performed for the first time in 1890, three years after the composer's death.

## Beethoven

The second item on the evening program is the "Concerto for Violin, Violoncello and Piano: Opus. 68 in C Major "Triple Concerto" by Ludwig van Beethoven. It is the only concerto that Beethoven wrote for three instruments.

"This is our largest venue, ever," said Bruce Woodbury, president of FLSO. "This concert is special because this is the first time we've put three soloists together for our first triple concerto."

The special guest soloists are: Ben Dominitz (violin), Richard Andaya (violoncello,

or commonly called, cello) and Natsuki Fukasawa (piano).

The Triple Concerto is divided into three movements, Allegro, Largo and a Rondo alla Polaka. The themes are joyful and soaring. Audience members will enjoy this masterful work that blends orchestra with the talents of soloists on violin, cello and piano.

## **Brahms**

Concluding the evening is Johannes Brahms' "Symphony No. 1, Opus 68 in C Minor."

Brahms began the work in 1854, but it took him 21 years to complete it. It was first performed in 1876.

Brahms struggled with the composition, deterred at the outset by his lack of orchestral experience. His friends viewed the work with mixed opinions. Clara Schumann was not favorably impressed: "I find it lacks melodic inspiration, for all the ingenious working-out." Hans von Bülow was of an entirely different opinion. To him, Brahms' First Symphony was living


proof that it was still possible to compose symphonies of Beethovenian dimensions – even after Beethoven's Ninth.

In fact, this work's greatest challenge is a part of its great triumph. Brahms was actively working to produce a piece that could stand up to Beethoven. The leitmotifs are very similar to Beethoven's "Joy," particularly in the Allegro movement.

Composers, musicians and critics will doubtless continue to argue about the mer-

its of this work, which has remained in the popular repertoire for over a century – and likely will for centuries more.

"Beethoven, Brahms and Borodin" will be performed one night only, Saturday Oct. 16 at the Fair Oaks Presbyterian Church, located at 11427 Fair Oaks Blvd. in Fair Oaks. Season tickets and single tickets are available. Single tickets are \$22 to \$42. To purchase tickets, call the Ticketline at (916) 357-6718 or visit www. folsomsymphony.com.
