

# Sacramento's 'Albie Aware' provides needed help to breast cancer victims

I have a favorite picture in my office of my husband, Jack, dressed up like a cowboy when he was five years old. His demeanor is very serious. He appears to be ready to take on any upcoming cowboy situation. Several years ago our son, Bryan, who also happens to adore this picture, used it for a sales brochure with the slogan, "There's a new Sheriff in town."

The little boy in this picture inspires me. He is a reminder that, though you may be small, you can do big things.

Albie Aware, while not exactly the new sheriff, is a local breast cancer foundation serving women and men in this community. Albie Aware (sounds like "I'll be Aware") was created in memory of Albie Carson who lost her battle with breast cancer on July 4, 2002. Our focus is a little different than the big, national breast cancer organizations.

Our mission is to save more lives and empower people with breast cancer through

awareness, education and support. We help provide direct services such as mammograms, MRIs, PET and PEM scans to people who do not have insurance, or who need assistance in covering their co-pays. We also help with medication and treatment co-pays. But that's not all.

Albie Aware reaches out to under served and low income people by teaching the importance of early-detection and screening, patients' rights to those who do have cancer, and the importance of counseling and emotional support during and after treatment. When people are diagnosed with breast cancer, they often find their world turned upside down. We attempt to inform them of their available community resources.

Our foundation is just over six years old and last year we met our goal of serving and reaching out to 1,000 women. Yet we are just beginning. The gap between the need for – and the availability of – breast cancer services is wider than ever. To date, our foundation has been solely funded by our fundraising efforts and do-

# Leading to election, proponents and opponents of Arden Arcade cityhood present their final arguements

The 100,000 residents of the proposed city of Arden Arcade have reached the final days to make up their minds on Measure D. More and more big names in the Sacramento area are coming out and taking sides on the issue. Most notable in opposition is Sacramento County Sheriff John McGinness.

The sheriff's concerns are that while Arden Arcade may be fiscally viable, there is an unknown factor that remains on just *how* viable it will be.

Joel Archer, chair of the Arden Arcade Incorporation Committee stands firm in his

belief that incorporation is the right move.

"Every Sacramento County Sheriff has opposed every incorporation effort," Archer said. "Thirteen years ago, Lou Blanas fought against the incorporation of Citrus Heights and we are thankful that they gained their independence."

In response to Sheriff Mc-Ginness, Archer pointed to the fiscal expert paid by the Local Agency Formation Committee (LAFCo) who said that Arden Arcade is "without a doubt" fiscally viable.

Stay Sacramento, a group dedicated to voting no on Measure D, lists the reasons why they think incorporation is bad for residents on its website. Among the rea-

sons included is the same fiscal analysis by LAFCo.

"The fiscal analysis could not conclude that the new city is financially viable because revenues go down over the course of the model. By year 10, net revenues are only four percent bigger than costs."

Their conviction is that with shrinking revenues after 10 years, the new city would soon be in a deficit.

With the Yes on D and No on D signs all over the area, Archer is confident that a new endorsement in favor of cityhood could push the committee's efforts over the top. He said to keep an eye out for public endorsements in favor of Measure D from local fire-fighters in the days leading up to the election.

Jay Boatwright, a candidate for Arden Arcade City Council, is optimistic as well.

"I am better than 50 percent confident," Boatwright said. "There is a better chance now than there was before."

He added that the county is mired in debt and that local control is very important. Incorporation, accord-

ing to him, would give the people of the area more control over what they want.

"The people that are against incorporation just don't have enough information," Archer said.

The information is out there for the residents of the proposed city, according to all parties. On Nov. 2, the public will cast its vote and decide for itself.



# Hoops at St. Mary's School

Boom, boom, boom, boom.

I remember that sound as if it were yesterday: the sound of Dave Jurin bouncing his basket ball down the street. Soon it bounced right up to my house.

"Marty, let's go down and play basketball at St. Mary's," Dave said, and off we went to the school.

The baskets at St. Mary's did not reach the regulation height of ten feet. They stood only nine feet high. Better for us, as we had not reached our full height yet.

Nor were the courts regulation length. No matter, we usually played half court ball anyway: one-on-one to a score of 22 points. You had to win by four points or the game continued. Dave and I were equal in size and skill so we played very competitive games.

Soon, other kids arrived and awaited their turn to play. The winner of the first game played the next in line and so on. The loser sat out.

Dan Petrocchi often saw us and came over from his house on M Street. Don Agostinelli usually came over the fence from his N Street home as soon as he heard us playing. Jim Ducray played with us, as did Lou Viani.

If a total of four people showed up, we played twoon-two, half court basketball. If six showed up, we be-

gan playing a full court basket ball game.

We played basketball at St. Mary's almost year around. We didn't play in the rain or if it got real cold. Otherwise, we played daily, after school, before it got dark. As we had no coaching, we taught ourselves the "ins and outs" of competitive basket ball: dribbling, passing, shooting and defense. Later I utilized these skills in Catholic Youth Organization basketball. I did not play basketball in high school. I chose football instead, but the completion at St. Mary's was as intense as any organized competition.

When I grew taller, I learned to dunk the basketball on the 9-foot rims at St. Mary's. What a thrill that was to dunk the ball like Wilt Chamberlain did on television. I usually just did it in practice, but a few times I did it in actual games, to the "oohs" and "aahs" of my fellow competitors.

Sadly, I never could dunk the ball on a regulation 10-foot basket, but at St. Mary's I strutted my stuff.

We all did.

Dave had a smooth 10-foot jump shot. Dan drove hard to the basket to slam in lay-ups. Don dribbled practically through our legs to drive the hoop and score. We had some epic games.

I drove by St. Mary's School the other day, heading toward our family home on Janey Way. The baskets still stand exactly where we played 50 years ago. A new generation of children now play there.

I can still hear the sounds of the ball, the squeak of the shoes and the thump of bodies banging into one another. Another exhilarating Janey Way memory.

# Jesuit High: 'Tower Stories: A 9/11 Project' explores doubt and faith

Jesuit High School will debut its upcoming production of "Tower Stories: A 9/11 Project" on Nov. 4. The unique play is a "documentary theater" piece based on re-

search, transcripts, and other sources about Sept.

"This piece tells the story of that day in a fragmentary way from the moments before the planes hit the Twin Towers to the aftermath as people struggled to deal

with what happened," explained Jesuit play director Ed Traftone. "We're focusing on doubt and faith, and what happens to people when the worst occurs."

Jesuit High, which is the Sacramento area's allmale Catholic high school, boasts a student body that hails from throughout the region. Likewise, the actors in the play are from throughout the area. It is anticipated that audience members from all age groups will come from Sacramento and the surrounding area.

Reactions from the audience may be varied. Audience members may remember the tragedy of 9/11 or have been affected by it...or may have only been little children when it happened nine years ago. Members of the public still have opinions about 9/11 in general because it truly gave an impact on every American, whether it is spoken about openly about it or not. The impact was greater for those who knew someone who personally experienced the tragedies in New York and Pennsylvania. Others may feel sympathetic, even if they do not have any close connections to the event.

Characters in the play include everyone from people on the street to members of the international and religious communities and rescue workers.

The play is intended to provoke thought. Questions that the director and actors wish the audience to consider include: What do you believe in times of tragedy? How are those beliefs challenged? Do they change? How do events like Sept. 11 change our individual thinking, as well as our concern for the world's safety?

"Everyone tells the story together," Traftone said. "There really aren't any leads. It's about a group coming together."

"Tower Stories: A 9/11 Project" opens Nov. 4 and runs through Nov. 13. Evening performances at 7:30 p.m. are Nov. 4–6 and Nov. 11–13. There will be a 2 p.m. matinee performance on Nov. 14. Tickets are \$10 for students and \$15 for general admission. To purchase tickets, visit the business office on campus. Jesuit High School is located at 1200 Jacob Lane in Carmichael.

The Black Box Theater where the play will be performed is located at 900 Gordon Lane (off Fair Oaks Boulevard) in Carmichael. For more information, call (916) 482-6060.

# Kaveri Indian Grocery offers unique service in the Arden area

Considering that Sacramento has been referred to as the most diverse city in the world, it should come as no surprise that located right here in the Arden area is a very popular Indian grocery store.

The 1,600-square-foot store, Kaveri Indian Grocery at 1148 Fulton Ave. #D, just south of Hurley Way, has built a strong reputation during its seven years of operation as a business offering a wide variety of quality, competitively-priced Indian groceries, as well as Pakistani, Fijian and Sri Lankan food products.

Born in Madras - now Chennai -India, the business's owners, Suresh Kannan and his wife Reena Suresh, who were married in 2001, opened the business less than two years later.

Suresh Kannan said that the store is very important to people in the Arden area who are interested in purchasing Indian groceries, since it is the only such store for several miles around.

"We are the only Indian grocery store in the Arden area and the closest (Indian grocery store) to us is (located) around 65th Street," Suresh Kannan said. "There are more than 20 (Indian) grocery stores in the (Greater) Sacramento area, but there are only a few that everybody knows."

Suresh Kannan said that his store is considered one of the best Indian grocery stores for actually purchasing groceries, since many İndian grocery stores focus more on DVD movies and other non-food items.

Although Kaveri Indian Grocery has a fair selection of DVD movies and audio CDs in India's national language of Hindi and in the Indian languages of Tamil and Telugu, as well as brass figurines, incense, herbal soaps and other non-food items, the store concentrates on Indian foods.

Among the Indian food products available at the store are dry lentils, basmati rice, wheat flour for making breads, pickles, packaged goat and lamb meats, and almond, coconut, sesame, mustard and olive oils.

The store also carries samosas – a very popular, traditional, triangularshaped Indian pastry, which is filled with spiced meat or vegetables - as well as a mix for making idli, which is a steamed rice and lentil cake that is prepared and cooked in a manner similar to pancakes.

Reena Suresh said that customers of the store can undoubtedly find plenty

of Indian spices for cooking.
"Of course, we have spices," she said. "Without spices, Indian cooking is not really Indian cooking. And not all Indian spices are (spicy) hot. There are some that are really, really hot, where you can stay away from it or use less. But we tell you how to use them, like minimum use."

Educating customers about the store's food products and how to make Indian meals, in fact, is one of the business's unique qualities, Reena Suresh said.

"If someone needs help with (a product) or wants to know how to make (a certain Indian food dish), we

will help them find the right (ingredients) and (learn) how to use them," she said. "We tell them (if a product) has preservatives or (if) it doesn't have preservatives and this is what it's going to do."

Reena Suresh added that such educational tips can be very helpful, considering that cooking varies from region to region in India.

"Northern Indian cooking is different from southern Indian cooking and then eastern and western (Indian cooking)," she said. "You come in (the store) and you're going to see everything. I'm from southern India, but I just didn't keep my place like that. You come in here and you get every part of India."

And for those who either do not feel like cooking or do not have the time to cook, Kaveri Indian Grocery also offers a variety of pre-prepared meals and foods that require very little preparation.

One such item is an all-natural spinach and buffalo milk mozzarella cheese, personal sized naan pizza with a hand-stretched, tear-shaped, artisan crust. And as is indicative of many of the store's competitive prices, this item is offered for the low price of \$1.99.

Despite the fact that this neighborhood grocery store caters to a clientele that is about 80 percent East Indian, Reena Suresh said that other cultures

have continuously become more interested in the store's offerings.

One of the reasons for this interest, she explained, was that more locals of different cultures are learning about the health benefits of many of the store's products.

Explaining such benefits, Reena Suresh said, "Sesame oil is good for your heart. Also, neem (which is derived from a tree of India) is good for the skin. I've (sold) neem soap or neem oil for people with skin eczema and they don't need to put on anything else. Use it the way it is directed. One drop of neem oil and have it as your wash every day and you won't get eczema back again. And neem toothpaste is very good. You don't get cavities. A lot of people come in (to the store) looking for (neem). We also have a lot of other herbs in the capsule form that are good for you. And for people who have cancers, we give them the freshest (products). We don't give them processed food. We show them like how this lentil is really good and we show them how many minutes you

have to cook (the lentils)."

Although Kaveri Indian Grocery is open daily from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m., customers can also inquire about the store, its products and Indian food recipes 24 hours per day through the store's Facebook page, which can be

found through a search of the business's name.

Suresh Kannan, who later added the Arden area-based information technology and business services management company, Brainware Solutions, in which he owns, to his business endeavors, said that operating a business with his wife is a dream come true.

"I landed in the U.S. in 1998 and since then I always wanted to have my

own business," Suresh Kannan said. 'We didn't have any prior plans of a specific business we had to have, but we looked at this (Indian grocery business) as a low-risk, easy entry thing."

And fortunately for Suresh Kannan and Reena Suresh, this dream became





# Eagle Scout candidate builds 'Frisbee' disc golf course

Disc golfers can attempt to score some eagles on a new disc golf course designed and built by a local teenager as his Eagle Scout proj-

The new 9-hole disc golf course in Santa Anita Park, located at 2000 Bell Street in the Arden-Arcade neighborhood, is the brainchild of 16-yearold Eagle Scout candidate Logan Brown. A member of Boy Scout Troop 161, which meets at Arcade Wesleyan Church, Brown has been disc golfing for only a few months.

"İ've known about (disc golf) for years, but I've only played it a few times so far," he said. "It's fun, it's quick, and it doesn't take a lot of effort to have fun."

A lack of regulation disc golf courses inspired Brown's idea for the project; in the past, he and other members of Troop 161 would use items like laundry baskets and trashcans to create makeshift disc golf courses in area parks.

Disappointed by the lack of a permanent disc golf course for him and his friends, Logan began writing letters to area park districts last August, offering to build a disc golf course at an appropriate park site. The Fulton-El Camino Recreation and Park District (FECRPD) showed an immediate interest in Brown's offer, since the district had wanted to install a disc golf course for some time but had lacked funds to do so.

'We knew there was a Scout who wanted to have an Eagle Scout project and we knew he was interested in building a course, so it was a great match," explained FECRPD Superintendent of Parks Mike

The FECRPD asked Brown to perform a neighborhood survey to judge interest in the course's construction. Brown went door-to-door, asking residents near Santa Anita Park for their opinions about the park potentially being home to a disc golf course. After Brown obtained 82 percent positive responses, the FECRPD District Board approved revising the master plan for the roughly six-acre Santa Anita Park this February, paving the way for construction of the disc golf course.

There was, however, a vocal group that opposed construction of the course, fearing it would disturb cranes, geese, ducks, and other wildlife that inhabit and visit the tranquil park.

"There was a contingent from that neighborhood who did not want the natural beauty of the park infringed upon, so the board took that input and went about seeing what sort of balance could be struck." said Grace. "In the end, an

golf course was offered, to minimize the chances of Frisbees flying into neighbors' backyards."

Brown said a public hearing about the proposed disc golf course was the most challenging step of the entire process.

There were some neighbors who were very loud about not wanting the course; they protested and they emailed me re-peatedly," Brown recalled. "But a wildlife conservationist came up to me at the grand opening of the course and told me the wildlife the people worried would be disrupted were (not native) to this area anyway.

FECRPD Once the approved board course's construction, Brown had to plan the revised course and oversee its fundraising and its construction. He ended up collecting close to \$2,800 in three months.

"I did a lot of begging," he admitted with a chuck-

altered, much shorter disc le. "We held a car wash, and I wrote letters asking for support to friends, family, and businesses, asking them to sponsor a hole. The Arden Arcade Rotary Club really stepped up and donated \$1,000."

> Brown's buddies from Troop 161 assisted with the course's construction, and Brown said his fondest memory from the entire experience is of him and his Troop 161 cohorts playing the initial round on the brand-new course.

> The end result of Brown's effort, Grace said, is a course that should appeal to beginning disc golfers.

"I think the clientele the largely will be novices and kids, though the course will allow experienced disc golfers to sharpen their skills and to play a quick nine holes," Grace said. "I think Logan and all the other scouts did an admirable job.'

John so enjoys making pizzas that customers sometimes laughingly accuse him of not wanting to hand it over to them. He seems to work with a perpetual smile on his face as he crafts each pizza. He is passionate about producing a pizza that is as New York as possible. He was taught by those in the know, in the Italian neighborhoods of New York. The recipes are Old World Italian.



"There's a lot of action behind what I do," John said. "My name is on the building. I care about this business and the community. We help everyone in the community. Those kids are the future.





# Wall of Honor pays tribute to local veterans, other local heroes

One of the Carmichael Recreation and Park District's most unique parks, Patriots Park, will add one more name to its Wall of Honor during a special ceremony on Saturday, Nov. 6 at 10 a.m.

Although the park is only three years old, many who are familiar with this 3.68-acre neighborhood park know that it is far from an ordinary recreation and leisure spot.

At the center of the park sits a 20-foot-long by 3-foottall by 3-foot-wide concrete and stone wall with much more significance than its durable materials.

Recognized as the Wall of Honor, the wall is so significant, in fact, that when the park was dedicated on Nov. 15, 2008, an entirely separate dedication was held on the same day to present the Wall of Honor and its first inductees to the public.

The park, which is located just east of the Carmichael-Fair Oaks border at 6827 Palm Avenue, off Dewey Drive, features the latest in park designs with walking paths, a playground, a picnic

area, a basketball court and a butterfly garden.

But it is the Wall of Honor, which is the park's most treasured feature.

The wall features 11 plaques with the names of local heroes, who gave their lives serving their country or commu-

The Nov. 6 ceremony will honor former Navy pilot, Lt. j.g. David A. Warne, who was lost at sea at the age of 27 on Jan. 12, 1991 during a nighttime training mission over the Mediterranean Sea.

Tracy Kerth, recreation services manager of the Carmichael Recreation and Park District, explained the background of the creation of the Wall of Honor.

"We were trying to name the park and the community came forward and they said, 'Well, how about we name it after this young man (the late Army Sgt.

Ronald L. Coffelt), who grew up in the area and his family still lives here.' But then we started thinking about all of our heroes. So, then we thought about naming (the park) Patriots Park and having a Wall of Honor and that would include not only military people, but it would include firefighters and police and CHP and Sheriffs and civilians who died in the line of duty."

With the creation of the wall, such local heroes who resided, worked in or served the community within the park district boundaries could be honored as part of this lasting monument.

This honor is available to those who showed acts of courage beginning as early as 1945, when the district was established.

Nominations for candidates for the Wall of Honor are accepted until July 31 every year.

Official nomination forms are available through the district's Web site www.carmichaelpark.com or by calling (916) 485-5322 to arrange for a form to be mailed via the United States Postal Service.

### Wall of Honor: Special ceremony to honor new inductee Nov. 6

and displayed on the Wall of Honor were:

Army Sgt. Ronald L. Coffelt: As previously mentioned, Coffelt was the inspiration for the Wall of Honor.

Raised within walking distance from the park, Coffelt, a graduate of Del Campo High School, died on July 19, 2007 from wounds that he suffered as a result of a bomb that exploded near him in Baghdad.

Army Spc. Raymond Nigel Spencer, Jr.: Spencer, who was raised in Carmichael and excelled in hockey during his youth, was killed less than a month prior to Coffelt's death when insurgents attacked his unit with an improvised explosive device and small arms fire.

Sheriff Deputies Kevin Patrick Blount and Joseph Kievernagel: Blount and Kievernagel, who worked as partners in the North Division serving Carmichael, lost their lives during a burglary call on July 15, 2005, when the engine of the helicopter they were flying failed and the helicopter crashed.

CHP Officer Ronald Eugene Davis: Following his graduation from the California Highway Patrol academy, Davis moved his family from Carmichael to Barstow.

Davis died at the age of 25 when he was driving about 100 miles per hour while en route to a traffic accident.

When a pair of motorists failed to heed his siren, Davis, in order to avoid a collision, died when he drove off the highway into the desert.

Army 1st Lt. Robert Scott Byrnes: A graduate of La Sierra High School, Byrnes, a former lifeguard and swimming instructor at Carmichael Park, lost his life in Vietnam.

<u>Firefighter Dean Wesley Rhoades</u>: An El Camino High School graduate, Rhoades died shortly after fighting a house fire in Carmichael on Jan. 6, 1981.

### The second inductees

Last year, plaques for the following inductees were also added to the wall:

Army Spc. James Edward Schlottman: An El Camino High School graduate, Schlottman was killed by a booby trap while on patrol in Vietnam on Aug. 22, 1967.

Sgt. Brian E. Dunlap: A graduate of Del Campo High

School, Dunlap was killed at the age of 38 on Sept. 24, 2005, when a roadside bomb exploded during his patrol in northern Baghdad.

Sgt. Larry Morford: The courage of Morford is recognized in the book, "The Least Beastly," by Bernard "Burn" Loeffke.

Within a memorial tribute to Morford in this book, it is explained that despite being a young man who did not believe in war as a method of resolving disputes, Morford felt that he could not stay at home knowing that other young men were fighting for his country.

On Feb. 12, 1970, Morford, a graduate of La Sierra High School, was killed at the age of 21 in Vietnam while serving in his patrol just a few days prior to when he was scheduled to return home.

Cpt. Olin E. Gilbert, Ir.: While flying an F-106 in a training mission at Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida on June 11, 1968, Gilbert was met with the plane's sudden mechanical difficulties.

Instead of parachuting to safety, Gilbert, a Vietnam veteran, piloted the plane out to sea and away from coastline homes in Port St. Joe, Fla.

This act of heroism cost Gilbert his life, but in turn saved the lives of many other people.

### A special honor for a local

Unlike the previous two Wall of Honor ceremonies, the upcoming Nov. 6 ceremony will honor only one inductee.

This year's inductee, David A. Warne, formerly resided in Fair Oaks and graduated from Sacramento State University in 1985 with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering.

David, who enjoyed skiing and fishing and briefly worked at Aerojet prior to entering active duty in the Navy in 1987, completed his pilot training two years later and was assigned as an F/A-18 pilot.

Although David has a marker in the Arlington National Cemetery, since his body was never recovered after he was lost at sea, it was not possible for his remains to be buried in a local cemetery.

Because of this fact, David's family and some of his closest friends, who will be attending the event, are additionally appreciative that David will have his name officially placed on the Wall of Honor.

David's mother, Warne, recently expressed her appreciation that her son will have a local memorial to hon-

"We don't have the grave marker here in the area for him, so that's really nice to have (David's name on the Wall of Honor) here in this area," Betty said.

David's father, Warne, a retired Air Force colonel, pilot and Vietnam veteran, also expressed his appreciation that his son's name will be placed on the wall.

"(Having David honored on the wall) means an awful lot to me," Evans said. "It means that somebody is recognizing his service and that whoever goes to that park will realize what a sacrifice he made and recognize what he did."

Lee Ann Yarber, administrative analyst of the park district, said that the ceremony, which will also be attended by park district advisory board members and Sacramento County District 3 Supervisor Susan Peters, is a great opportunity for the community to show appreciation for David, as well as other heroes of the Wall of Honor.

'We absolutely invite all the community to come out - anybody who ever lost a loved one or anybody who wants to pay honor to the family of the fallen hero," Yarber said. "It's just a nice ceremony, so come on out and honor our local heroes."
