



Local market partners with Sacramento Food Bank & Family Services for 'Meals for Health'

During April, Whole Foods Market partnered with the Sacramento Food Bank & Family Services and EarthSave to teach a group of low-income Sacramento residents a healthier way to eat. Participants celebrated with a "graduation ceremony" on May 7.

The "Meals for Health" educational program involved lectures from national leaders in the "plant-strong" and "whole foods" areas of nutrition and exercise, physician supervision and boxes of healthy foods. It was an inaugural program at the food bank that organizers hope to learn from...and to hopefully "roll out" nationwide.

According to EarthSave, which provided the curriculum for the program, "hunger and obesity are often flip sides of the same malnutrition coin. Both hunger and obesity can be symptoms of poverty. Obesity, heart disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, bowel diseases, arthritis and a host of other degenerative conditions are rampant in communities experiencing food insecurity. Being poor and having serious health problems create nearly insurmountable obstacles to success."

EarthSave is a nonprofit non-profit organization dedicated to helping people "make food choices that promote health, reduce health care costs and provide greater health independence."

Participants learned from national nutrition leaders and speakers on topics such as "The Starch Solution," "The Amazing Digestive System," "The Pleasure Trap," "How to Eat Whole – and Why Should I?" and "Healthy Living Made Easy."

The results from the four week program were astonishing.

Not only did every single participant graduate from the program (organizers had anticipated up to a 30 percent dropout rate) – they thrived. On average, each of the 21 participants:

- Dropped 30 points in total cholesterol
- Dropped 21 points in LDL (bad) cholesterol
- Dropped 7 points in fasting blood sugar
- Lost 17 pounds
- Dropped 10.4/10.3 points in blood pressure

Dr. Donald Forrester, supervising physician, noted that all participants had improved skin tone, a reduced (or eliminated) need for medication, a better sense of balance and an overall better sense of well-being. Several participants, who started the program on canes, graduated on their own two feet – no walking aids necessary. One diabetic observer, who followed the guidelines for the program along with the participants,

dropped 100 points in fasting blood sugar – without medication.

"No one had any complaints about the program," Forrester said.

The Sacramento Whole Foods Market located at the corner of Arden Way and Eastern Avenue donated over \$5,000 worth of whole food products that participants learned how to prepare and enjoy.


"Whole Foods Market is an active participant in the local community," said Christina Clarke, marketing team leader for Whole Foods. "Our core values at Whole Foods Market include caring about our communities and promoting the health of our stakeholders through healthy eating education. The Meals for Health Program is a great way for (us) to support community members and show our commitment to promoting healthy eating education."

"The results participants earned through modifications in their diet are tremendous. Submissions will be reviewed by the Sacramento Redistricting Citizens Advisory Committee and City Council. The community can continue to participate by attending the Committee meetings or Council meetings.

Sacramento Redistricting Advisory Committee meets every Monday (except May 30 and July 4) at 6 p.m. at New City Hall. More information is available at: http:// www.cityofsacramento.org. Click on Council Agendas and Meetings and scroll down to Sacramento Redistricting Advisory Committee.

Local Sacramento composer's work to be performed in 'Land That I Love' concert

The work of a local Sacramento area composer will be presented at the Los Rios Community College District's Three Stages facility on May 14. The Folsom Symphony will close out its 2010 - 2011 season with a patriotic concert, "Land That I Love."

William MacSems, who lives in Sacramento, is one of the composers whose music is being represented at the concert. "Westward Ho," MacSems said, is a composition of four short movements celebrating the western migration in the 19th

The first movement is a square dance, the second one references a cowboy, the third one is a folk song and the last movement is the conclusion of the westward migration. MacSems said a narrator introduces each piece, with music in the background.

"I originally wrote it for band," MacSems said. "It sounds a little more classy with the orches-

MacSems said he had previously composed the folk song used in "Westward Ho" when he wrote a piece for the opera "The Outcasts of Poker Flat," which played in Nevada City. He said the square dance is from a show he wrote in 1962 about the rail-

Timm Rolek has known Mac-Sems around four years. Rolek was the conductor of the Sacramento

"A lot of people are frightened of new music," Rolek said. "MacSems writes in a style that is interesting and very familiar. I compare him to Aaron Copland, an American classical composer."

Rolek said MacSems music is easy to grasp and within the first few seconds, people are listening to it. He said MacSems' music is very organic and American.

MacSems was born in New York in 1930 and received his master of arts degree in music composition from California State University at San Francisco in 1967.

MacSems has led a diverse life. He said he was a prop maker off and on from 1948 to the early 1960s.


'In one particular job, I had to blow air on Eva Gabor and Glenn Ford to make it look like they were driving a car," MacSems said. "I remember her telling me, 'That will

be enough darling."

MacSems said he remembers working at the Hollywood Bowl as the sound advisor for a concert given by Leonard Bernstein and André Previn.

MacSems became a teacher in 1959 in Nevada City, teaching music to elementary students, switching in 1962 to teaching band and chorus at the high school level. In 1970 and 1971, he took a sabbatical from teaching and studied with Gottfried von Einem at the Academy of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna, Austria. MacSems said Einem was the number one composer in Vienna at the time.

Joe Cannon, also a composer, has known MacSems for around 20 years. They both used Midi in-

struments and developed a musical based friendship.

Cannon said MacSems writes music in the neoromantic category, which is a style and approach be-

Rancho del Paso was once the world's largest thoroughbred horse-breeding farm

Editor's Note: This is part two of a two-part series regarding the historic, 44,374-acre Rancho del Paso Mexican land grant, which included the future site of Arden and part of what would become Carmichael.

In part one of this two-part series, which appeared in the April 28 edition of this publication, readers were presented with details regarding the historic Mexican land grant, Rancho del Paso – "Ranch of the Pass." And in continuing this historical summary, it is important to emphasize Rancho del Paso's former fame as a nationally-recognized stock farm.

As referenced in the previous article, the Sacramento Record-Union described Rancho del Paso on Feb. 9, 1884 as "second to no other stock farm on the continent."

As a model stock farm that specialized in the raising of blooded stock, Rancho del Paso featured horses, sheep and cattle.

But of these animals, it was Rancho del Paso's horses that received the greatest recognition

But to provide a further indication that the raising of all three of these animals was a serious endeavor, despite the property's grandest fame for producing many renowned horses, the previously mentioned *Record-Union* article

noted that the upper lands of Rancho del Paso were "used for pasturing purposes, upon which are grazed 20,000 sheep and large herds of cattle and horses."

In addition to its pasturing property, Rancho del Paso also included areas along the banks of the American River, where grains, hay and hops were grown in rich soil.

The Record-Union article also provides information regarding an area of the rancho, which was known as the "upper place." The "upper place" was described as being about 9 miles northeast of the city, which at the time did not extend beyond today's Alhambra Boulevard.

According to the article, a Record-Union reporter visit-



Firenzi was a multiple national champion who won 47 races and was known as the "Oueen of the Turf."

ed the "upper place" and observed large barns and corrals, stables, sheep pens and other dwellings.

The reporter noted a well-planned detail: each structure's purposeful spacing from other structures. This spacing – about 100 yards between each structure – was designed to prevent the rapid spreading

of a fire from one dwelling to another dwelling.

The very informative article also provided information regarding the rancho's water system, which was fairly extensive for the time.

This system was described in the article as follows: "A

Rancho: Success of famous rancho included 1886 Kentucky Derby winner, Ben Ali

large steam pump furnishes water to several immense tanks located on different portions of the place, and their water system, so far as quantity and pressure is concerned, is complete and never failing.

One does not have to look beyond the featured 1884 Record-Union article to encounter a prime example of how Rancho del Paso was synonymous with horse breeding and also horse racing, as about three quarters of the lengthy article was dedicated to the rancho's horses.

But the fact that Rancho del Paso included a first-class, three-quarter-mile horse racing track about a half-mile southwest of the stables is a fairly good indication of how serious the rancho was about its horses.

It is no secret where the idea to breed racehorses at Rancho del Paso came from, since the horses' owner, multi-millionaire James Ben Ali Haggin (1822-1914), also owned estates in his native Kentucky, where he raised racehorses.

Rancho del Paso, which was once recognized as the site of the largest thoroughbred horse-breeding farm in the world, was a natural place for breeding horses, considering its broad open spaces for pasturing and exercising the animals and the nearby river and creeks for water and the growing of oats and alfalfa.

Climate also played a very important role in Haggin's thoroughbred breeding farm, as is explained in the 1894 Sacramento Bee souvenir book, "Where California Fruits Grow," as follows: "Two-year-

are as far advanced and as well developed as are three-yearold animals outside the state. It has been observed by horsemen that California horses, when the racing season opens in the East, show in much better form and perform comparatively better than Eastern horses. The reason is obvious. The mild winters of California allow of horses being continuously exercised and of being in the open field, while East-

Kyrle Daly was still living a decade later, as the horse was referred to in The Bee's aforementioned souvenir book as "the oldest thoroughbred stallion on the (West) Coast."

Among Haggin's most notable horses were Salvator, a chestnut horse who held a mile record of 1:35 ½ and was named the U.S. "Horse of the Year" in 1889 and 1890, Firenzi, a multiple national champion who won 47 races honor of his maternal grandfather, a Turkish physician, named Ibrahim Ben Ali.

Ben Ali, the horse, who was born in Kenucky and matured at Rancho del Paso, won the 12th running of this famous event with a record time of 2:36 1/2.

Haggin achieved much wealth through the continuous sales of his Rancho del Paso-bred horses.

The Aug. 11, 1893 edition of the Record-Union, for instance, notes that Haggin sold




Rancho: Tributes to the old land grant remain, including Haggin Oaks Golf Complex

15 of his colts during the year's season for an average of \$3,800 each.

Although most Sacramentans today are unaware of the history of Rancho del Paso and its famous horses, the June 8, 1886 edition of the *Record-Union* reveals a much different recognition during the late 19th century. Included in this edition are the following words: "All Sacramentans feel an interest and pride in the success of the horses from Rancho del Paso in the East."

A quarter century after establishing his Rancho del Paso stock farm, Haggin had sold the last of the rancho's horses.

The Rancho del Paso Land Company, which was incorporated in 1891 with Haggin, Tevis and their wives as


stockholders, sold the rancho to the Sacramento Valley Colonization Co. for \$1.5 million on Dec. 22, 1910.

Despite the eventual suburban development of the historic Rancho del Paso area, many tributes to the historic land grant, as well as Haggin, remain.

These tributes include: Del Paso Boulevard, Del Paso Country Club, the Ben

Ali Shrine fraternal organization, Haggin Oaks Golf Complex, Hagginwood Park, off Marysville Boulevard, Salvator Way and Grant High School and its Pacers mascot.

Furthermore, with the establishment of Cal Expo, an unintentional tribute was made to Haggin's horses through the opening of the ground's one-mile horse racing track.

Twilight Academy expanding, will hire more teachers

A college preparatory academy has announced plans to expand operations on the campus formerly occupied by Loretto High School at the conclusion of the current school year.

Owned and operated by Oakland-based Aspire Public Schools, Aspire Alexander Twilight Preparatory College Academy, a tuition-free, open-enrollment public charter school, is Aspire's first secondary school in Sacramento. Aspire Capitol Heights Acade-

my has served kindergarten through eighth grade students in Sacramento's Oak Park neighborhood since 2003.

Open since fall 2009 at 2360 El Camino Avenue, Aspire Alexander Twilight Academy serves about 480 kindergarten through ninth-grade students; this summer, 10 prefabricated modular classrooms will be added, with the goal of accommodating another 300 pupils.

"The campus grow to handle 780 students," explained Steph Wilson, Aspire Public Schools chief of staff.

School, a Roman Catholic college-preparatory school for young women closed in June 2009, Wilson explained, Pacific Charter School Development (PCSD) purchased the campus for \$7.75 million from the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary on behalf of Aspire Public Schools. Originally the tenant, Aspire later acquired the buildings from PCSD.

Having the former Loretto High School campus available for use headed off one of the biggest challenges Aspire Public Schools usu-

"For charter schools, it can be a challenge find-When Loretto High ing facilities," Wilson said. "We've found that some of our best options are found in closed schools. And in this case, it is a true win-win for us because this property will allow us to both expand the number of kids we serve and be able to serve students through their high school years."

> Public At Aspire Schools' 30 California schools, the emphasis, Wilson said, is on preparing students for uni

versity or college attendance. Results are impressive; 100 percent of Aspire Public Schools graduates last year were accepted to four-year universities or college, Wilson noted.

"The goal is to set a college-going culture on our campuses," she said. 'We want to ensure we have students who meet all state and grade standards and we emphasize writing and academic discourse as two key elements of college readiness."

To help ready students for college, Aspire Public Schools feature slightly longer school days and school years, as



well as an emphasis on academic preparedness. Touches like elementary classrooms that bear the names and mascots of the universities and colleges attended by the school's teachers help to instill what Wilson calls a "college-going culture" among even the school's youngest pupils.

"Student-to-student interaction is emphasized at our schools," Wilson said. "And our teachers try to teach to each student as an individual, rather than teaching them all as a



Sacramento Jaguar automobile collector's taste is simple: He likes to have the best

Many reporters have written about their experiences of participating in a "ride-along" in a police or sheriff patrol car. But an invitation for a reporter to take a tour in a classic Jaguar automobile does not come along every day.

So, after Sacramento resident and Jaguar collector Jerry Reynolds recently contacted this publication and offered such a "ride along," it was difficult for this reporter to pass up such an invi-

Certainly, Jerry's mere ownership of a 1950 Mark V Saloon Jaguar is newsworthy enough, considering that wherever he drives this classic automobile, observing eyes along the streets become much wider, heads turn and conversations about Jerry's vehicle begin.

After accepting Jerry's invitation to take a tour in his Jaguar, I showed up at his Sacramento residence ready to learn about this local man and his cars.

After a brief discussion about his four Jaguars, Jerry, a retired legislative advocate who worked for a lobbying firm that represented 12 counties and spent five years as the lobbyist for United Cerebral Palsy of California, grabbed his keys and asked, "Would you like to take a ride in the (1950 Mark V Saloon) Jaguar?"

Of course, such a question was nothing more than a formality, and we were soon standing alongside the classic vehicle, which quickly caused this writer to ponder descriptive words for this automobile such as elegant, luxurious, beautiful, graceful, fancy and dignified, just to name a few.

It would be an odd reaction for anyone to observe this vehicle and not admire its beauty.

Its sleek design, upright, chrome front grill and bumpers, white wall tires, rear wheel fender skirts, fancy headlights and its leaping jaguar hood ornament are but a few of the features that combine to conjure up such descriptive words as previously mentioned.

Among the more unusual features of this car is its trunk, which opens in the manner of a pickup truck's tailgate and includes a storage compartment for storing tools.

Additionally, the front doors of this four-door vehicle open in the reverse direction of typical, standard automobiles. This feature can certainly cause a brief sense of disorientation for first time passengers, as I can attest.

Like many classic, well-kept automobiles, Jerry's beige and yellow Jaguar Mark V features its own personalized license plate.

And when asked about the meaning of the name, "Dazzy," on this car's plate, Jerry said, "We named (the car) 'Dazzy', because it looks like a car that would have been used in the story and movie, 'Driving Miss Daisy," Jerry said. '(The spelling), 'Dazzy,' was the closest (spelling) available (to the spelling of 'Daisy') for the plate."

And to assist people in pronouncing the vehicles name accurately, Jerry placed a sticker with an image of a daisy on both the front and rear plates and added an accent mark above the "A" on each plate.

After entering the Mark V's unusually opening door and taking a seat, I asked Jerry to tell me the story about how he acquired the car.

Jerry, who is a docent at the California Automobile Museum. said that he purchased the vehicle at the museum three years ago.

But he was also quick to reveal that he had hesitated purchasing the car, because its previous owner had replaced the car's original motor with a smallblock Chevy V-8 engine, and also an automatic transmission, power steering, a new electrical system and disc brakes.

The Mark V, which Jerry eventually purchased, was the realization of the dream of Per Ruuth, a retired McClellan Air Force Base electronics technician, who had desired to transform a classic, old car into a modern car.

Following the modernization of this Mark V, which also includes a stereo enclosed in a compartment in the dash, Ruuth shipped the car to Finland, where for several years he would drive it during his annual spring visits to the country of his heritage.

Jerry said that the residents in this part of Finland joked that spring was marked in the area by the emergence of Ruuth's Jag-

MacSems said he has a great affection for dogs and has owned three dogs over his lifetime. His last two were rescued greyhounds. He named his dogs after opera characters.



uar, which received its yellow paint due to Ruuth's fascination with the color of his 1970s Sears Appliance Golden Wheat #24984 refrigerator.

Despite his initial hesitancy to purchase a modernized Jaguar, Jerry was nonetheless drawn to the vehicle because of his love for Jaguars and for his comforting belief that the vehicle would be reliable for daily use.

So far this belief has proved itself factual, as Jerry's Mark V has built a strong following of admirers who enjoy observing the car during its daily travels in Sacramento and other parts of the region.

And fortunately, I was able to witness this fact first hand during my tour in the car.

While traveling along Folsom Boulevard in the Mark V after a drive through the very scenic East Lawn Cemetery, I observed how the attention of drivers and passengers was diverted to Jerry's car. And in East Sacramento's famous Fabulous Forties neighborhood, a youth on a bicycle rode up to the car to get a better view of it.

Jerry then drove the car to East Portal Park and upon reaching the portion

of the park on Rodeo Way next to the East Portal Bocce Club courts, Jerry was approached by a woman who inquired about having a classic automobile such as his car assist with a wedding.

Jerry politely eased out of the conversation and he later told me that although his Mark V has assisted with weddings, he generally shies away from using the car for these events.

But since purchasing the car, Jerry has provided chauffeured service on many occasions, including his regular service for his wife and some of her close friends.

Although I felt privileged to have the opportunity to write about Jerry's Mark V Jaguar, I learned during my tour with Jerry that I was not the first writer to interview him about one of his Jaguars.

After purchasing his first Jaguar – a 1967 Series I XKE – in 1984, Jerry, who was residing in San Francisco at the time, met the Pulitzer Prize-winning, Sacramento-born columnist, Herb Caen (1916-1997).

"I was working as a management consultant (and) I had an apartment in North Beach and hung out at the Wash-

bag' (Washington Square Bar and Grill)," Jerry said. "That's where Herb was a fixture. Herb owned a new (Jaguar) XJ6 he named the 'White Rabbit.' He loved Jaguars and was fond of commenting on all the problems which Jags are notorious for, which of course were multiplied in the 17-year-old XKE, which I'd just bought. I would regale him with the latest mechanical nightmare I was having, and it would end up recounted in his columns (in the *San Francisco Chronicle*)."

Jerry, who also owns a 1984 V-12 XJS Jaguar and a 2003 XJ8 sedan Jaguar – his wife Mary's daily use vehicle – said that he looks forward to the community learning more about his most notable Jaguar – his 1950 Mark V Saloon Jaguar – through this article.

"I'm sure just about everyone in East Sac has seen her go by over the past few years and maybe they would like to know more about the car," Jerry said.
