

It's time to eat 'fair-style' once again

The waiting is finally over. The always anticipated California State Fair opens today, July 14, and with it comes its usual traditions, which of course include "fair food."

This is the time that guests of the event put aside their general eating habits and partake in a wide variety of edible assortments ranging from longtime favorites such as corn dogs and cotton candy to just about any fried food imaginable.

Although many reports have been made regarding the fair's food offerings, less emphasis is generally placed on the food vendors themselves.

And these vendors undoubtedly have many unique details to tell about themselves and their histories in business.

Despite their busy schedules as they prepared for this year's fair, several vendors dedicated time to share information about themselves, the fair and their food offerings.

Milo Franks' corn dog stands

One such individual was corn dog vendor Milo Franks, who volunteered the obvious observation that he has a surname that is quite fitting for a man in his line of business.

Franks, 61, who lives in Pilot Hill, near Auburn, said that he has seen the concessions at Cal Expo grow tremendously in his four decades of selling corn dogs at the State Fair.

"I've been working at the State Fair since the second year it was here (at Cal Expo) in the new facilities," said Franks, who also sells pizzas with dough made on the fair's premises. "I can remember there were stands here that were actually made out of those cargo vans that you can rent nowadays. And there were tents back then. Guys used to call them knock down joints. They were canvas (with 2-foot by 4-foot boards). Now it's just nothing to have \$2,000 or more invested in a stand."

In an attempt to bring entertainment to the fair, Franks is working with his secretary, Georgeanne Clasen, to present the California State Fair's first corn dog eating contest.

The qualifying round of the contest will be held on July 21 and 22 and the finals will be held on July 23.

The cost to enter the contest is \$30 and the first place prize is \$2,000, second prize is \$500 and third is \$300.

Although Franks, who enjoys racing hot rods at the Sacramento Raceway in his spare time, has spent two-thirds of his life as a corn dog salesman, he said that his ini-

tial plan was to be an industrial arts teacher, so he would not have to work during summers.

Franks said that ironically, he has not had a summer off in 42 years, but added if he ever retires, he will build a car and race in all of the National Hot Rod Association meets around the country.

Jungle George's Exotic Meats and Bugs

Certainly, fair food offerings are much different today than when Franks began selling corn dogs at the fair.

A prime example of this fact is the Jungle George's Exotic Meats and Bugs trailer,

which is operated by Fremont, Calif. resident George Sandefur, a 38-year fair vendor, who began his career working in his native state of Indiana.

Sandefur said that he offers about 18 different, unusual meats such as alligator, python, raccoon and beaver meats and a full line of bugs from scorpions to crickets to

We sell a lot of strange and unusual stuff," Sandefur said. "Our new sandwich this year is our Maggot Melt, which is like a patty melt, but instead of a burger, it has maggots. We also have desserts, including deep fried butter and deep fried jelly

Offering unusual edibles was not always one of his trademarks, explained Sandefur.

"My trailer used to be a chicken trailer, but it just wasn't doing what I wanted it to do," recalled Sandefur, who has one child and five grandchildren. "So, last year, the California State Fair called and asked me to do something strange. I said, 'How strange?' They said, Oh, maybe some strange meat or alligator or something like that.'

Sandefur, who enjoys boating, swimming and flying standard, single engine airplanes during his spare time, said that by the following April, he introduced alligator meat, Rocky Mountain oysters and other unusual offerings at the Maricopa County Fair in Phoenix and sold out his inventory in about an hour.

"I said, 'Oh, well, maybe I've got something here," said Sandefur, whose personal favorite exotic menu items are his alligator and yak burgers. "We just kept adding (un-usual food items) and finally at the State Fair, we had probably 14 or 15 different meats and we added bugs. I just keep going on and trying to see how strange and 'wow' I can get. I believe that patrons, especially the younger crowd, are looking for more than standard fair food these days. They want something you can't go to a restaurant and get. They just want something 'wow."

Tempura, Inc. owner Grace Wang has been working at fairs for more than 15 years, and has two trailers at this year's State Fair.

Wang, who is assisted in the business by her husband Richard, who designed and built one of Tempura, Inc.'s trailers, said that she is very excited about introducing crepes to guests of the State Fair through her Grace's Crepes trailer.

They never had crepes at the State Fair before," said Wang, a native of the north-east part of China. "The reason why we wanted to bring this new crepe trailer to the State Fair is because we wanted to bring





Open house at East Lawn Pet Loss Center shows expanded facility

East Lawn Pet Loss Center in Sacramento hosted an open house for community members and their pets on Wednesday, June 29.

In addition to a tour of the newly renovated St. Francis Community Hall (which is available for community groups to rent), tours were given of the cemetery.

As with human cemeteries, the monuments at the pet cemetery are touching.

One especially moving section of the cemetery is the special section for police dogs. Over 45 K9s are buried in one section of the facility. Sacramento K9s and their handlers were on hand to "meet and greet" visitors.

Overlooking the entrance to the cemetery is a statue of St. Francis of Assisi, who is the patron saint of animals.



Mark Koller retiring from Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District

Employees at the Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District offices in Carmichael are in for a major change: no longer seeing the face or hearing the voice of longtime Director of Recreation and Marketing Mark

Koller retires in late July after more than 30 years with the district, leaving a legacy of expanded facilities, increased enrollment in district programs, and greater recognition for the district and its recreational offerings. But even more significantly, Koller's coworkers are dealing with having to say goodbye to a valued friend and proven leader.

Koller grew up playing football in Martinez and played college ball for a while at the University of Utah,

his career shortened by a persistent case of mononucleosis. The setback, Koller said, "forced me to reestablish my life," and he enrolled at Sacramento State University, where several friends were students.

Eventually Koller took a job with the City of Martinez, then moved on to the Boys Club of Oakland. During Koller's time with the club, he and a partner started a girls' night on Thursdays, and because of their initial offering, the club eventually expanded to become the Boys and Girls Club of America and started providing programs for girls nationwide.

'I've always tried to be an advocate for people of all ages and especially for girls," said Koller, father of two daughters. "After retirement, one of the things I plan to do is to work on getting females of all ages a fairer playing field."

Koller joined the MOR-PD in 1974 as a part-timer while still in college at Sac State; he was hired full time in 1979 after completing college. When Koller was hired, the district still was developing its facilities and programs. Since Koller came aboard, the district, which serves about 65,000 Arden-Arcade and Carmichael residents, has developed 16 parks and two community centers and operated a successful recreation program that includes a 36year-old summer camp program for kids.

"Even today with the bad economy, the camps are still filling up," Koller said in his office over the voices of campers playing outside. "Most of our camp

staff is kids who were campers and junior leaders here. And each group that comes in wants to do better than the group before them did, which is a nice problem for me to have," he added with

Also helpful to Koller is the location of the MOR-PD offices, between American River College and Sacramento State University, two schools that offer recreation programs.

"Having those two schools nearby has really improved our recruiting possibilities," he said. "And it also helps that this is a really fun place to work."

The district, Koller said, employs about 13 fulltime staff and uses contracted services for maintenance work at district facilities.

"Jobs like mowing, fertilizing, landscaping, those are all contracted out, which saves us money by not having to buy that equipment and not having to pay benefits to that many more employees," he explained.

Koller is especially proud of the relationship he and the MORPD have built over the years with the San Juan Unified School District. Five high schools and five middle schools are located within MORPD boundaries, Koller noted, and four of the district's 16 parks are located on San Juan Unified School District properties. In addition, the school district several years ago selected MORPD to run the district's middle school sports programs under an arrangement known as the Middle School Sports Alliance.

"It's all about a goodneighbor policy," Koller ex-plained. "You build trust and respect within the community and you focus on not allowing the things that upset the neighbors to

MORPD Administrator Debby Walker, who hired Koller back in 1974, considers his work to save the school district's middle school sports programs his finest accomplishment.

"Mission Ōaks has a great work environment and Mark played a huge role in making that happen over the years by building strong internal and external relationships," Walker said. "His contributions are many, but one that rises to the top was the rescue and redevelopment of the middle school sports program for San Juan Unified School District after it was dropped from the school district's budget in the early 90s."

Koller's co-workers realize his retirement will mean a change around the office. MORPD Supervisor of Parks Ken Matsumoto, another longtime district employee, will miss Koller's positive attitude and teambuilding skills.

"I've ` worked alongside Mark for more than 30 years, and during that time I have seen Mark grow into his current position of director of recreation and marketing," Matsumoto wrote in an email. "Under his guidance, the district has consistently offered top-notch programs and opportunities for youth and adults through employ-

ment. But most significantly, he has worked tirelessly to promote staff well-being and has been the heart of employee recognition and accomplishment."

Matsumoto also praised Koller as a friend and an ad-

"His influence has made Mission Oaks a family, not merely a place of employment," he continued. "Mark and I have shared many of our life's experiences with work and family, and if I needed advice I would turn to Mark. His imminent retirement leaves a bigger void as a friend than as a cowork-

As for Koller's plans for after retirement, he plans to focus on helping others.

"I'm a big believer in giving back, and whatever I'm able to do to make a significant difference in this next phase of my life, whether it's with family, friends, community, that's my goal," he said. "I am blessed to be at a place in my life where I can give back and give more than I receive."



Amazing, educational and off-beat, Annual Turtlerama is July 16

Turtles and tortoises and terrapins, oh my! The shelled, slow-footed Chelonians will serve as the stars of the annual Turtlerama event put on by the membership of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club. This year's event will take place from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Saturday, July 16, at Belle Cooledge Library, located at South Land Park Drive and Fruitridge Road. The free event will include live turtles and tortoises, educational displays, and turtle adoption opportunities.

Felice Rood, founder and president of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club, is the driving force for the annual event, which marks its thirtieth anniversary this year.

"I created it back in 1981 after rescuing turtles in the area before that," she said recently by phone. "The people who'd bring rescue turtles to me encouraged me to start a club, and now here it is, 30 years later."

As the organizer of a successful event that has lasted for three decades, Rood said she knows what works and has no problem with trying to keep the event's vibe the same year after

"We'll have all kinds of educational information provided by our club members, we'll have tons of displays, and all the animals will be outside," she said. "It's always taken place right there at the Belle Cooledge Library. We never change things; everything stays the same because it's so popular the way it is."

A sense of permanence is also one of the things that Rood most appreciates about turtles and tortoises.

"I like that prehistoric look they have to them," she said with a chuck-

le. "I used to live in Dayton, Ohio, and my kids started bringing home box turtles all the time. Then one day, they walked in with this gigantic tortoise and my heart just started to sing and it hasn't stopped singing since then.

One such gigantic Greek Tortoise, known as "Jim the Jerk" (it's an affectionate nickname, Rood swears), will be one of the show's featured attractions. The cranky old male just last year helped to father quintuplets after a lifetime of less than amorous behavior around plenty of females.

Rood dedicates herself to educating people about turtles and proper turtle ownership, emphasizing that owing a tortoise or turtle is a long-term commitment.

'Not all people know or realize that, and so they get something little for a pet and then they're caught off-guard when it grows into something huge," she said. "That's when they have to call me."

Another point Rood stresses is that pet turtles need natural habitats.

"I always say aquariums are for fish and artificial light is for plants," she said, the tension in her voice evident as she recalled cases she has seen where a turtle's growth was limited to the point of deformity by being kept in an undersized glass tank.

Rood expects the show to draw a good crowd to Belle Cooledge Library; she said mails about 850 newsletters four times a year to the membership of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club, with mailers going as far away as New York, Florida, and even the United Kingdom.

College Greens Gators a founding team in the Sacramento Suburban Swim League

It's not whether you win or lose; it's how you play the game. There is no "I" in team. It's not the size of the dog in the fight, it's the size of the fight in the dog. These are some of the mottos that could apply to the College Greens Gators recreational swim team in East Sacramento.

The Gators, founded in 1965, are the smallest team in the eight-team Sacramento Suburban Swim League. And while the relatively small size of the team may keep the Gators from scoring as many points as the larger squads, the 162 members at College Greens (roughly half of which reside in East Sacramento, the others come from Arden and the surrounding area) continue to thrive in the water while setting different goals beyond just winning and losing.

"This year the team is much better," said Coach Pat Daniels. "There are more things in place to improve the team."

Daniels, who is in his second year as coach of the Gators, said that the team has been able to retain more swimmers than in past years. The team has had problems in the past with members quitting the

The Gators may not pose a significant threat to the teams with 300-400 members, but Daniels has implemented ways for his swimmers to be successful.

'What we take away (from competition) is individual improvement," he said. "We may also shoot to score a certain amount of points in a certain age group."

He also said that he and swimmers will set goal times rather than worry about the competition.

"If we reach our goal times, it will result in scoring points."

He also posts the "Top 10" times in the previous year's championship meet in different events so that the kids have something to shoot for that they can see.

Daniels swam in the very same league when he was a child (for the El Dorado Hills Tazmanian Devils, nick-named the "Taz") before moving on to swim for the Sierra Marlins Swim Team (SMST) year round when he was 14. He went on to swim at Oak Ridge High School and for two years at UC Davis.

After each team faces off head to head with the other seven team in the league, the season ends with a league

championship meet at Sierra College that includes all eight teams competing together. With less than half of the members of some of the other teams, the Gators simply cannot score enough points to come out on top as a team, but that doesn't mean that the team is without gifted swim-

One such swimmer, whom Daniels said consistently wins her races, is 15-yearold Morgan McClure. Mc-Clure, who recently finished


