


The Fratello Marionettes will present "The Vaudeville Follies" at the Arden-Dimick Library on Tuesday, Nov. 15 at 4 p.m.

Sacramento County's Department of Human Assistance Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), in partnership with the Library of Congress American Folklife Center, has conducted more than 450 interviews since 2003.

Sacramento's VHP is one of the special projects completely run by RSVP Volunteers. All the interviewers are veterans and have shared their own military experiences with the project as well as recruited other veterans to share their sto-

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
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Sacramento Food Bank & Family Services gearing up for Thanksgiving

The Sacramento Food Bank & Family Services (SFBFS) is preparing for the busiest Thanksgiving season in the organization's history. From donating turkeys to jogging through town, Sacramento residents can help families in need this holiday season.

The food bank serves residents throughout Sacramento county, including Arden and Carmichael.

Turkey Drive

The annual Turkey Drive for families will be on Nov. 18, from 4:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. The goal this year is 8,000 frozen turkeys.

Members of the community are encouraged to drop off a frozen turkey or packaged side dishes to help the food bank meet this year's goal. In 2010, local residents donated 7,053 turkeys to this worthy cause. This year, the need in our community is even greater.

This effort will help the food bank to provide the in-

gredients for a holiday meal for thousands of local families. Representatives from Papa Murphy's, Wells Fargo and SaveMart will be on hand to thank donors and unload turkeys. This event is all day.

Bring turkeys and packaged side dishes to the SFFBS Oak Park facility at 333 Third Ave. (near 34th St. and Broadway), Friday, Nov. 18 from 4:30 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Turkey Distribution – one day only

Holiday ingredients including a turkey and all of the wonderful Thanksgiving trimmings will be distributed to families in need on Monday, Nov. 21 starting at 8 a.m. and going until the turkeys run out (likely in the late afternoon).

For Thanksgiving, SFBFS would like to see every family celebrate the holiday together with a meal. Several thousand families are expected to arrive for this one-day distribution. Volunteers from PG&E will be on hand to help distribute items

SFBFS does not provide a hot meal on Thanksgiving Day.

Please note, for the first time in several years, SFBFS will distribute turkeys in **one day** instead of two. Help


Dad's love of his new country came quick and ran deep. When the Korean War broke out, though not yet a US citizen, he joined the fight.

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
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

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

Sacramento turns out for bittersweet anniversary party at Clunie Center

Hundreds of Sacramento residents, library patrons, and community members descended upon the Clunie Center and its housed McKinley Library on Sunday, Oct. 23 to celebrate the 75th anniversary of their opening to the public - and learned of the possible closure of the facilities.

"At the end of the day, we were trying to figure out how many people showed up - I thought about 700 and other people thought about 1,000 throughout the day," said Claudia Bordin, event chairperson for the McKinley East Sacramento Neighborhood Association (MENA). "We had way more people than we ever expected show up - we thought (we would have) about 300, and we had double or triple that show up."

Classic cars, including a 1929 Pierce Arrow convertible coupe and 1941 Ford half-ton pickup, studded the front

lawn leading to the Clunie Center.

It was standing room only during the hour-long talk on East Sacramento and Midtown, McKinley Park, Clunie Center, and McKinley Library given by historians and authors Bill Mahon and Amanda Graham.

The delightful giggles of children echoed from the McKinley Library, as they took part in arts and crafts and

magic tricks courtesy of Penny the Clown.

And the Clunie Center's auditorium was a mass of bodies from start to finish, as attendees browsed works of art created that very morning by plein-air artists, noshed on cupcakes and root beer floats, and then worked the calories off to the big band sounds of the Swingmasters.


We had something for everybody - I can't imagine someone coming and not having something to enjoy," commented Anita Člevenger, president of Friends of McKin-

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








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'Check Before You Burn' starts in November in Sacramento **County and its cities**

The fifth season of the Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District's "Check Before You Burn" program started Nov. 1 and runs through Feb. 29. Residential wood burning will be restricted or prohibited on days when fine particle pollution is forecast to be high. The law is in effect in Sacramento County and its cities of Citrus Heights, Elk Grove, Folsom, Galt, Isleton, Rancho Cordova and Sacramento. Residents are required to "Check Before You Burn."

The District will restrict or prohibit the use of indoor and outdoor fireplaces and wood stoves, and fire pits and chimineas that burn wood, pellets, manufactured logs or any other solid fuel to keep fine particle pollution down. A voluntary request to discourage burning will be issued when air pollution levels are on the rise.

Check Before You Burn categories:

Stage 2 – All Burning Prohibited

 All burning is prohibited in any device when fine particle pollution is forecast to exceed 35 micrograms per cubic meter. It is illegal to burn any solid fuel, including wood, manufactured logs and pellets.

Stage 1 – No Burn – Unless Exempt

• It is illegal to burn when fine particle pollution is forecast to be 32-35 micrograms per cubic meter unless EPA certified fireplace inserts or stoves, or pellet stoves are used.

Burning Discouraged - Vol-

 Burning is discouraged when fine particle pollution is forecast to be 26-31 micrograms per cubic meter. The AQMD asks you to voluntarily choose not to burn.

Legal to Burn

• When the forecast is 25 micrograms per cubic meter or lower then it is legal to burn and the use of manufactured fire logs is acceptable at this level. If you choose to burn please follow clean burning techniques in order to burn as cleanly as pos-

Exemptions:

The following exemptions apply to both Stage 1 and Stage 2 categories:

- Homes where wood burning is the sole source of heat;
- Financial hardship waiver approved by the Air Pollution Control Officer. The waiver must be renewed each burn season;
- Devices that operate exclusively with natural gas or propane;
- Cooking devices;
- Ceremonial fires related to specific religious activities.

Enforcement:

Enforcement will through complaints (800) 880-9025 and sightings of visible smoke by Air District enforcement staff. First time violations will result in a \$50 fine or a requirement to complete and pass a wood smoke awareness course. Fines for subsequent violations are higher.

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


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Local, regional artist entrepreneurs to participate in Harvest Festival

The popular Harvest Festival Original Art and Craft Show, which is in its 39th year, returns to Cal Expo on Nov. 18 through Nov. 20.

Recognized as the largest indoor arts and crafts show on the West Coast, the Harvest Festival is a traveling event, which makes its way to other California and Nevada cities from early September through early December.

After this weekend's show at the San Mateo County Event Center, the event will make its way to the capital city, where hun-

dreds of artisans will present and offer for sale more than 24,000 unique American handmade items such as fine art, ceramics, jewelry, hand-turned wood, toys and home décor.

not?' And that's how (the business) started."

Although Michell lacked experience as a vendor when she started her business, it did not take long for her to gain a reputation for her unique jewelry and fine craftsmanship.

This is not to say that selling her products was a simple task, as she noted that it took her about two years to establish her business as it basically operates today.

Visitors of Michell's jewelry booth will discover simple jewelry – necklaces, bracelets, earrings and charms – designed around natural gemstones.

Michell added that she also focuses on the metaphysical meanings of the stones.

"We do a lot of work in our booth with people on what they are hoping for in their life and this is just a little assist toward that end," Michell said. "I feel very lucky to be in that position to help people that way."

In speaking simply about her offerings, which range in price from \$10 to \$50, Michell said, "Anybody who loves natural stones will be in heaven at my booth."

Eggshell artist

One of the show's more unique items can be found at the booth of Roseville resident Virgi Bondi.

Specializing in eggshell art, Bondi is known as the "egg-making, military police, biker chick" due to her experience in the military and the fact that she rides

a Harley-Davidson motor-cycle.

Bondi began creating eggshell art with Japanese paper, called washi, while she was living in Japan from 1985 to 1989. These decorative eggshells received recognition in the December 1999 issue of *Sunset* magazine.

As the years passed, Bondi became more and more involved in eggshell art and today, she operates the Eggstra Special art gallery, studio and supplies shop in Auburn and teaches eggshell art classes for children and adults.

Bondi said that her experience even includes decorating hundreds of quail eggshells while she was on duty as a military police officer in Iraq in 2005 and 2006.

Festival guests will have the opportunity to purchase a wide variety of Bondi's decorative eggshells, which include Christmas tree ornaments.

Book author/photographer

Georgia Bockoven, a notable fiction author and wild-life and nature photographer from Rocklin, will also be present at the event to sign copies of her latest written work, "The Year Everything Changed," and sell copies of her photographs, which range in price from a \$19 mat to a \$1,400 canvas print.

Bockoven said that her new book, which takes place in Sacramento and is her 22nd

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City Jewel: Celebration overshadowed by possible Clunie Center closure

she said. "They liked 'bedazzling' it."

The event also drew attendees from all over Sacramento. Midtown Sacramento resident James Booker and his daughter came to support the event as frequent McKinley Library patrons.

'We use the library a lot - my daughter goes to Sutter (Middle School), so she comes here almost every day," Booker said. "I like the atmosphere of the library - it seems to always have what we need and if they don't have it, they always help us get what

Sadly, there may be a day coming when Booker and his daughter will not be able

to visit their favorite library branch.

According to Bordin, due to city financial cutbacks the Clunie is slated to close and is currently open in a limited capacity. "İ think this is the first time in its history that (the Clunie) is being faced with closure, so it was a very bittersweet celebration that we have such a neat vintage building built in 1936, and now in 2011 we're looking at closing it due to a lack of funding."

Clevenger feels there is a lot of denial by the East Sacramento community about the potential Clunie closure.

"It just seems impossible that a facility like that would be shuttered, but we're in tough economic times and I believe if there is not some sort of nonprofit communitybased effort to keep the Clunie going, it will be closed."

To help keep the Clunie from shuttering its doors, Clevenger said the nonprofit Friends of East Sacramento have submitted a proposal with endorsement from a variety of community groups to take over management of the Clunie Center.

"The Friends of McKinley Library have endorsed their proposal because, honestly, there is not anything else going on that would allow the clubhouse to continue as the City has said there would be no more funding at the end of the fiscal year," Clevenger said. "They are already cut back to three days a week. So the only thing we see happening that would allow the clubhouse to stay open is this proposal. And because our primary concern is the library continuing to operate, we feel that we need to be behind that and we are."

Bordin said that saving the Clunie Center is also a top priority for MENA. In fact, part of the proceeds from the sale of art during the plein-air art portion of the event benefited MENA and its programs, such as their efforts to keep the Clunie open. Bordin hopes events like the anniversary celebration will help

community members get to know the building more and see its possibilities.

"I think for a lot of people (at the anniversary event) they don't come (to the Clunie) on an ongoing basis and they don't know that it's even there or what it looks like inside – they just drive by it," Bordin said. "So it was a good eye-opening event as far as getting in front of the public."

Bordin also feels the Clunie is currently underutilized. She believes the facility has great potential to host a variety of events, including everything from dances to weddings.

'We need to create a nice marketing campaign and get it out in front of the public that we have this great venue that you can rent for your event," she added.

When asked about the potential closure of the Clunie, East Sacramento resident Cooper was sad at the prospect of losing some of her family's favorite annual activities like the Easter pancake breakfast and other activity options.

"It's unfortunate that the City can't find the general funds to keep the community center open," Cooper said. "Hopefully, they'll be able to work something out in the budget process to keep it open. It would be very sad for the community if we didn't have it any longer."

However, Cooper was happy to hear the Sacramento community was stepping forward to try to take over management of the Clunie.

That would be a very 2000 thing to do for a community partnership to partner up with a nonprofit organization to protect the building," she said. "That would be nice."



Project HYPE a summer success

Believe the hype: Project HYPE was proven a summer success story for the Mission Oaks Park and Recreation Department.

Project HYPE (Healthy Youth for Physical Excellence) is an eight-week health education program that just completed its third year. Danny Curtola, supervisor of recreation at Swanston Community Center, formulated the program after hearing a presentation about a similar program operating in Fresno. The program has grown in popularity each of its three years, Curtola said; 50 families participated this year, up from just 20 families three years ago.

Project HYPE emphasizes a holistic approach to weight loss and maintenance, stress-

ing the importance of nutritional information, weight maintenance, and physical fitness. Family participation also is critical; Curtola noted the program included five family night events, with each family required to attend at least three family nights. During those events, Curtola said, families were tasked with providing healthy snacks and learning about smart food

"We try our best to provide nutritional data that is appropriate for our clients," he said. "We understand that not everyone can afford to go out and buy coconut water and stuff like that, so we talk about maybe buying corn tortillas rather than flour ones, that sort of thing."

This past summer, 25 CSUS nursing students helped to quantify participants' results by comparing the fitness lev-

els of the 10- to 15-year-old participants before and after they completed the eightweek program. Results are impressive: boys shaved two minutes, 31 seconds off their walking mile time, while the girls reduced their walking mile time by a minute and nine seconds. Girls could do nine more pushups at the end of the summer than they could when the program began; boys could do four more pushups by the end of the session. And both sexes saw drops in their resting heart rates; the boys' dropped by an

average of 11 beats per minute, while the girls' heart rates declined by five beats per min-

The CSUS nursing students were but a few of the sponsors who helped make Project HYPE a success through donations of time, personnel, materials, and equipment.

"We literally could not do this program without their help and the help of our sponsors," Curtola said. "They allow us to keep this within budget."

For example, this summer, 10 Project HYPE participants received scholarships to a Mustard Seed Spin bike safety day, where they got a refurbished bicycle, bike safety lessons and equipment, and more; the total value of this package, Curtola said, was more than \$1,300.

Other Project HYPE sponsors included California Family Fitness, which donated 16 personal training sessions, Health Net Community Solutions, REI, the Sacramento River Cats, Ame Cruz, Whole Foods, the Sacramento Food Co-Op, Body Hook, CSUS Martial Arts, Fitness Major trainer Vince Singletary, Hot Hula dance instructor Chinh Pham, Keys to Fitness trainer Courtney Keys, the Ohana Dance Group, the Pham brothers, Pipeworks gymnasium, and Romi Sunga, who donated a salsa dance lesson.

One returning 13-year-old male Project HYPE participant, who learned about the program through a flyer at school and an afterschool presentation, was pleasantly surprised by the assortment of exercises available to participants.

"They put a variety of exercises into the different relays we did, and to increase participation, they added tickets that we traded for prizes," he said. "Even the nutrition lessons were exciting and most people were looking forward to them."
