

Grindin' it out

La Sierra Skate Park holds on despite budget cuts

Unless you can perform an ollie or a 5-0 grind, chances are you don't know about La Sierra Skate park.

Located next to the La Sierra Community Center on Engle Road in Carmichael, the skate park was built in 2000 by Carmichael Recreation & Park District (CRPD) staff and volunteers. Then in 2007, the skate park received an upgrade - the original wooden park features that were deteriorating due to weather issues were replaced with steel features purchased from a closing skate park.

Since its start 11 years ago, La Sierra provided a free place for skateboarders and inline skaters to practice their sports seven days a week. According to CRPD Recreation Supervisor Elizabeth Crisante, in an average year the Skate park will see 3,500 to 5,000 kids, with 30 to 50 kids there each day during peak summer usage.

Cut from budget

However, this all changed earlier this year, due to budget cuts the District was forced to make.

Crisante says in March 2011 it was proposed and approved by their Advisory Board to cut the skate park from the budget as of July 1, 2011 as a cost-saving measure.

Local fundraising

Fortunately, skate park staff were able to do some fundraising and keep the skate

park from closing. For example, neighborhood thrift store R Thrift in Carmichael has provided monthly donations, which allowed the Skate park to remain open daily through the summer.

However, donations have slowed and in October the skate park moved to a modified schedule - open Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday - and charging a \$1 daily admission fee.

Additional ideas for funding

Skate park staff has also come up with some other revenue generating ideas. According to La Sierra Skate park Attendant Bob Kerr - who has been working at the skate park since 2003 - staff has been holding some events such as skate competitions. Kerr himself has also created snack bar and has been promoting the Skate park on the Internet "trying to get people to understand the importance of it."

Getting the community to realize the skate park is a viable institution they should invest in can be just as tricky as certain skateboarding moves.

"While skateboarding may not be baseball or football, it is certainly a sport that is to be commended and it has its array of difficulties, so it's also a skill level as well to master," Crisante says. "I just want the community to realize that if the Park ultimately has to close for good, then we do have a very large population of youth that will be out on the streets and we'll

Performing artist brings 'Nutcracker' magic to Sacramento school kids

Ron Cunningham is a storyteller. As artistic director of the Sacramento Ballet, his most-often-used medium is that of dance – creating a story through the movements he gives to others. But several times each year, Ron steps out of the ballet studio and into the classroom, introducing hundreds of youngsters to the magic of his stories.

Earlier this month, he stepped into his costume of Dr. Drosselmeyer from *The Nutcracker*, and visited three schools – Crocker Riverside Elementary, Washington Elementary and William Land Elementary – to tell the story of America's best known ballet in a fun and interactive way – magic tricks and all.

Now in his 24th year as artistic director of Sacramento Ballet, Ron has a special affinity for working with kids. This is reflected in his casting of more than 500 youngsters each year in The Nutcracker – meaning that he must rehearse four and five casts for each role – far more work than would be normally necessary – just so more children can be part of the experience. This is, arguably, the largest Nutcracker cast in the country.

"Youngsters respond and remember far more when the experience is creative, imaginative and interactive," said Cunningham.

"They sit rapt during the programs and seem to understand and retain what they heard better."

Because of his commitment to youngsters, and the programs he has developed at the Company, the Sacramento Ballet was recently chosen as one of the designated participants in the region's Any Given Child program – an initiative of the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. to bring the arts back into the classroom.

Sacramento animal shelters unite for 'Home for the Holidays' adoption campaign

The Sacramento SPCA, City of Sacramento Animal Care Services, Sacramento County Animal Care & Regulation and Happy Tails Pet Sanctuary are holding a joint "Home for the Holidays" pet adoption special which will run through Dec. 30.

Know your neighbor

Sac Metro's fire chief discusses his important role with local fire district

As the dust is finally beginning to settle from the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District's recent relocation to its new facility, which was featured in the last edition of this publication, it is timely to review another newer feature of the district: Fire Chief Kurt Henke.

Sure, Henke is not as new to his position as the district is to its recentlyopened, two-story, 82,000-square-foot building at 10545 Armstrong Ave. on the former site of Mather Air Force Base. But that is exactly why the Arden-Carmichael News paid him a visit last week.

Henke was appointed to his present position eight months ago. He has had plenty of time to adapt to his important role with the district.

With this experience, Henke is thus better prepared to discuss what it is like to head the state's seventh largest fire department.

'High energy'

On several occasions during his interview with this paper, Henke referred to himself as a "high energy" person, which is quite beneficial for a man who dedicates 60 to 70 hours per week to his job.

In addition to his high energy level, Henke has a strong fire department background.

But simply reviewing the story of

whole story of his love for this profession.

Henke, who grew up in Napa Valley and attended St. Helena schools from kindergarten through high school, said that working for a fire department was the realization of his childhood dream.

It's in the blood

It should come as no surprise that Henke was interested in becoming a firefighter at such a young age, considering that he said that he grew up around his local fire department.

"I come from a volunteer firefighting background, both my mom and dad, Henke said. "My dad (George Henke) was a volunteer fire chief (and) my mother (Beatrice Henke) was one of the first women volunteer firefighters in the entire United States, and actually, in the early 1970s, (she) was on an NBC nightly news special with about 12 other women in our little volunteer area. They ended up (receiving) from the California Assembly and the Legislature some award several years back."

When Henke was 16, he became a volunteer firefighter for the Napa County Fire Department.

He studied fire science at Solano Community College and received his first full-time job as a civilian firefighter at Skaggs Ísland Naval Communication Station in about 1984.

Henke said that it was interesting working at a military base that had such an important connection to the

"That base, if you read 'Blind Man's Bluff, was the base that helped end the Cold War," Henke said. "It was responsible for tracking all the submarine movement in the Western Hemisphere and it tied in with Mare Island. Also,

for the Soviet phone-tapping cables." On Feb. 4, 1985, Henke was hired by the city of Vallejo's fire department as an apprentice firefighter. He was later promoted to a firefighter.

(it) was the intelligence gathering arm

Henke became a fire captain in about 1992 and he worked in the training division as a training captain

for the department before eventually being promoted to the rank of director of training.

Regional reputation

Concurrently with his other work, Henke, in 1992, was elected vice president of the International Association of Firefighters, Local 1186, which represented Vallejo, Benicia, Fairfield, American Canyon and eventually Cordellia and Rio Vista. Two years later, he was elected president of the

overall union and held the position for five

His accomplishments with the union included assisting in the development of the first paramedic public-private partnership in Solano County and negotiating contracts of various entities that belonged to the union.

In December 1998, Henke was appointed assistant fire chief, and he held this position until he left the department in 2009.

Toward the end of his time with the Vallejo Fire Department, Henke spent about a year managing the Fire Prevention Division.

Recalling this position, Henke said, "I was asked to go in there and get (the division) straightened up and I did so."

Now at Sac Metro

With his previous fire department experience, Henke, who was hired by Sac Metro as its deputy chief of operations on Oct. 1, 2009, arrived at the local district with many skills, especially in labor management.

Henke said that he has an understanding of the political environment and what a fire department has to do to survive and present the best services.

"That really comes down to, you've got to get the best out of your employees and you have to do that through building trust," Henke said. "I inherited an exceptionally talented group of people and I look at it as my job to figure out how to get the best out of those people. Put them in the positions that they can do the best and then get out of their way and let them go to work."

Henke said that as part of his fire chief duties, he completes work that is normally per-

formed by a city manager.

"At Metro, as a fire chief, you're basically the equivalent of a city manager," Henke said. "I report directly to the Board of Directors. Normal fire chiefs, if you look around us, report to a city manager who reports to a city council."

Having a role as a sort of city manager is quite fitting for Sac Metro's fire chief, considering that this 600-member fire department, which has a \$130 million budget, is like a city unto itself. The district includes such features as a finance department, a human resources department, operations, fire prevention, buildings and logistics.

Fiscally wise

Henke said that he is proud of Sac Metro's success at balancing its budget and added that the district has a good model for working in difficult financial times.

"I think extraordinarily hard times and challenges bring out the best in people, so we're not looking at this terrible economy as a lot of people are out of work and there's a lot of destitution out there," Henke said. "We can kick back and cry and whine that we've lost all this money in tax revenue, but we more come to work as an opportunity to retool the way we have our business model. We look at the redesign of the system from top to bottom and we think that we're

going to come out of this in a lot better position by a long shot than we were doing."

Building relationships

During his time as fire chief, Henke has also headed a large public relations campaign.

'We had to go out and rebuild relationships that really had been neglected throughout the years with county officials, county Board of Supervisors, staff of the county, Citrus Heights elected officials and staff, Rancho Cordova and that," Henke said. "So, we've really, at the same time, been on this massive public relations campaign to tell people who we are, that we're here, how we can help them. Even on issues that maybe are not so much germane to us, but if we can help them, they can help us in other issues.

When it comes to reflecting upon the progress that the district has made since he was appointed as fire chief, Henke said that he is proud of the district's accomplishments thus far.

"It's been an action-packed eight months," said Henke, who enjoys hunting, fishing, traveling and cooking during his leisure time. "I've been told that the Board of Directors has been quoted as saying there's been more accomplished in the last eight months than in the last six years. I don't think that that's so much a reflection on the past as it is that sometimes you end up with that perfect team of people and the perfect timing and everything just comes together, and I think that happened in this case."

And of course, it certainly does not hurt to have a leader as passionate about his work as

Toward the end of his interview with this paper, Henke, with a serious, yet energetic tone to his voice, said, "I get up every day at 4:30, 5 o'clock in the morning and I can't wait to get (to

Eight stations allow for work at any skill level.

NBS provides a free tote bag of comfort and wound care supplies to patients. The most beloved items in the bag are two small, soft pillows made from cheery cotton fabrics. The women use these as support for their arms after surgery. The pillows provide a buffer under seatbelts (to and from doctor appointments) and allow women to rest more comfortably, while still sensitive to draining tubes and stitches.

Women use the pillows throughout their recuperations and reconstructive surgeries. They are a comforting, valuable resource.

Titanic's Pantry helps Sacramento families feed their four-legged family members

The last few years have been very rough for everyone economically - every day families struggle just to put food on the table. And for many families, that includes a struggle to provide food for

That's where Sacramento's pet food bank, Titanic's Pantry, comes in.

When you have to make a decision between paying your mortgage, your car payment or buying dog food, that's a real conundrum," explained Gina Knepp, acting manager of the City of Sacramento Animal Care Services. "It's a terrible dilemma for anyone to have to face. If you find yourself in dire straits where you need pet food, come get it from us because we don't want people to surrender their pets to the local shelters - that's the last thing we want to do."

The pantry is seeing an increase in need, just as local food banks for humans are seeing an uptick – at this time of year, especially. Every neighborhood in the region is affected.

Penny Cistaro, now chief operations officer for the Sacramento SPCA, started Titanic's Pantry in November 2009. She got the idea for the pantry while in Washington State.

When I came back to California, there wasn't a (pet) food bank in the region, and having had a (pet) food bank up in Washington State at the shelter I had worked at and seeing the benefits there, I wanted to start one here," Cistaro said.

A team effort

Now about two years later, Titanic's Pantry is a collaborative effort of the City of Sacramento Animal Care Services, Sacramento County Animal Care and Regulation, the Sacramento Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA), and Happy Tails Pet Sanctuary.

According to Knepp, those in need of pet food can visit the city, county, or SPCA shelter once a month for a donation.

The City's shelter has the biggest client base more than 2,000 people come there each month and they distribute at least 3,000 pounds of food a week. Additionally, Titanic's Pantry provides a number of other supplies that people may need for their animals; everything from cat litter and litter boxes to dog biscuits, leashes, collars, beds and even toys.

Who is eligible?

So who is eligible to receive assistance from Ti-

Anyone who needs it, according to Knepp. There is no application to fill out or proof of eligibility.

"If they're not registered with us, the first time they come in they show us a picture ID and we'll put them in our computer system to keep track of how many people we're helping," Knepp explained. "Then once a month they can come back if they need to and get food from us. We have some people that come back sever-

al times. And then we have some people that come back and bring us a bag of food to thank us because we helped them when they were in

Bags of food needed

And it's those bags of pet food coming in to Titanic's Pantry that are so desperately needed right

"One of the biggest challenges is to keep the shelves constantly stocked because you rely on donations," said Shari Lowen, senior services coordinator for the Sacramento SPCA and volunteer that helped Cistaro start Titanic's Pantry. "You may get a huge truckload of donated food and that might last a few weeks and then somebody comes in and there's absolutely nothing to give them."

Donations of pet food – dry cat and dog food – are how the community can help support the Pantry, Cistaro said.

Buy a 20, 30, or 40 pound bag of food and bring it to the SPCA or take it to the county or the city (shelters) - whichever shelter is closest or whichever one is closest to your heart," Cistaro said. "Just bring in food - even a 10-pound, 5-pound bag of dry food. It's easy to transport, it lasts, that's what will help."

Participate in a pet food drive

According to Knepp, donations can be made onsite to the city, county, SPCA, or Happy Tails. She added that the community can pitch in to help by setting up pet food drives for the Pantry in their neighborhood.

For example, Knepp held a drive in Hollywood Park, raising 800 pounds of food for the Pantry. She then passed it on to Curtis Park - which brought in over 3,000 pounds of food donations and now is trying to get Land Park "to take up the

Knepp said a pet food drive can also be a great project for groups, such as high schools.

Help pets by volunteering

Titanic's Pantry is also always in need of volunteers to help with picking up donations of pet food. For example, a Save Mart store in Vacaville currently supplies the Pantry with donations of food from broken bags, which Knepp says can sometimes add up to about 7,000 pounds of dry kibble for the Pantry. Volunteers are needed to help bag the loose kibble for distribution using empty sand bags Knepp obtained from the Department of Transporta-

"Our volunteers will come in and fill the sand bags up with dog food and we tie the tops just like sand, but it's dog food, and (we) give that out," she

Keeping Titanic's Pantry going will continue to help enable people to keep their animals, Cistaro

"Animals play a powerful role in someone's life," she said. "People lose so much, the last thing they should lose is a family member and an animal is a family member."

also have depleted a source of programming for families as well."

Family friendly

Yes, she said families. While kids and teens may be the largest population the skate park sees, Črisante says the environment they have established brings a family element as well.

"We do have whole families that come and participate," she explained. "We actually have a very wide age range of participants that frequent the park. We serve anywhere from age five to age 40 because skateboarding has been around for so long, we have parents skateboarding with their children."

The La Sierra skate park is also unique in that the park is supervised, while most skate parks are not due to liability reasons, Crisante says. This

can cause the skate park to draw an "undesirable crowd" as there is no one there to implement any policies. Having supervisory staff on-hand at the La Sierra skate park, "makes families feel better, so it often becomes a family-oriented place that will bring their children there," she adds.

A good influence

As one of those adult supervisors, Kerr says he's been able to help steer quite a few Skate park goers towards making good choices in their lives thanks to his own childhood experi-

"Being a person that grew up skateboarding on the streets, as I've gotten older I've realized the importance of keeping kids inside a contained environment where they're supervised because there's a lot of trouble to be had,"

he explained. "A lot of these kids are really good kids, but when you're out on the streets there's too much room for bad influence and there could be destruction, fights, things like that. When they're there with me, I don't let any of that happen. I make sure they're wearing their helmets and they're staying focused on their skateboard. It gives them somewhere to be productive in a safe environment."

Team Ninja Midget

Kerr has also brought a family element to those that frequent the skate park through the formation of a skating team called Team Ninja Midget. Kerr works to promote the team through Facebook and videos showcasing the members' skills on You-Tube, and helps sponsor the team through providing them with T-shirts and boards.

"I think it would have been cool to have somebody like that in my life when I was younger, so now I'm older and I can do that for them," he said.

Support needed

With an uncertain future looming ahead, Crisante hopes the skate park will eventually become a selfsustaining program, and may even form a sports team to take on the

"There's a lot of ideas and options out there for us, but we have to be able to have the resources to expand (and) we can't do that without community support," she said.



It's hard to walk into Parkside Pharmacy in Sacramento without sampling a body lotion or perusing the many cards made by local art-

Now open for two and a half years, Parkside was formerly known as Land Park Pharmacy. Ted and Georgia Econome opened the pharmacy in 1953 and are now retired. Current owner John Ortego worked for Land Park Pharmacy three years before the Econome's retired. When the pharmacy closed, Ortego saw the perfect opportunity to remodel it based on an idea he and his wife Michelle had discussed.

John graduated from the University of Pacific and had a vision of running a compound pharmacy. Compounding is the mixing of drugs by a compounding pharmacist to fit the unique needs of a patient. This may be done for medically necessary reasons, such as to change the form of the medication from a solid pill to a liquid, to avoid a non-essential ingredient that the patient is allergic to, or to obtain the exact dose needed. It may also be done for voluntary reasons, such as adding favorite flavors to a medication.

John wanted to run an independent, whole wellness pharmacy that included a spa.

"John entered a nationwide competition with the idea of having a whole wellness pharmacy that in-

cluded the compounding pharmacy, boutique and skincare and won," Michelle said. "He received a lot of recognition for his idea."

In addition to servicing the local community, he also makes compound medications for his neighbor, the Sacramento Zoo. Compound medications make it easier to treat the animals there.

John hired Gary Thomas to help him run the pharmacy. Thomas previously ran the Land Park Pharmacy for 35 years.

'Gary is a celebrity," Michelle said. "He reminds me of the old-fashioned doctors, who used to make house calls."

Michelle wanted a boutique where people could purchase jewelry, paintings and cards made by local artists.
