

On Jan. 5-6, members of the troop will collect trees that have outlived their purpose of spreading Christmas cheer. The trees collected by the scouts will be run through a chipper and mulched, according to project coordinator Ed Hickey. The mulch is then used to improve parks within the Carmichael Recreation and Park District.

The Christmas tree pickup project is a tradition dating back over 30 years, according to Hickey. The troop has had what Hickey called "a long-standing relationship" with the Carmigoal is to collect 200 trees.

Troop 55 is comprised of 32 scouts ages 11-17. Most of the members will participate in the tree pickup. According to Hickey, three current scouts from the troop are in the process of completing their Eagle Scout certification projects within the park district. "Seventy five percent of all our Eagle Scout projects help CPD (Carmichael Recreation and Park District)," Hickey said.

The mulch that is created by the collected trees will be stored and used as necessary to improve the following parks: Bird Track Park, Capra Park Site, Cardinal Oaks Park, Carmichael Park, Del Campo Park, Glancy Oaks Park, Jan Park, Charles C. Jensen Botanical Garden, O'Donnell Heritage Park, Patriots Park, Schweitzer Grove Nature Area, and Sutter Avenue Park Site.

# SCUSD middle and high schools open for visitation days, tours

Events help parents learn of options before Open Enrollment Ian. 28- Feb. 8

Sacramento City Unified School District middle schools and high schools are hosting a series of tours, showcase nights and visitation days to help parents learn their options before Open Enrollment next

Visiting a school is often the best way families can determine if a campus is right for them. During visits, parents can observe teachers and students at work in classrooms, talk to administrators about the school and its programs and talk to other parents.

Open Enrollment (January 28 through February 8) is an opportunity for families that live within the boundaries of Sac City Unified to apply for enrollment to SCUSD middle and high schools. Acceptance is contingent on seats available and, in some cases, student eligibility. For example, West Campus High School, the Humanities and International Studies Program at C.K. McClatchy High School and John F. Kennedy High School's PACE (Program in America and California Explorations) have eligibility criteria that must be met for admission

In addition, SCUSD has several specialized small high schools that are geared toward specific careers or employment fields. These include Health Professions High School, Sacramento New Technology High School and the School of Engineering and Sciences. Other choices in SCUSD's portfolio of schools include George Washington Carver School of Arts and Science, one of only two Waldorf-inspired high schools in the country, and The Met Sacramento High School, which connects classroom learning to real-world experiences through internships.



# **Volunteers work to restore Jensen Botanical Garden**

The volunteer group "Friends of Jensen Botanical Garden" was asked by the Carmichael Recreation and Park District to restore/rejuvenate Charles C. Jensen Botanical Garden and since January 2004, when FJBG went into action, the volunteers have logged more than 6,051 hours clearing ivy, privets and bramble, replanting existing beds, adding a few new beds, installing 11 new metal benches and two wheelchair accessible picnic tables. Since December 2005, they have planted more than 6,000 tulip

In 2013 FJBG will switch from development to maintenance mode, say volunteers. The primary tasks will be mulching, pruning, weeding and always planting more tulips.


Instead of the previous years' monthly work days, FJBG will host quarterly work days on the second Saturday in March, June, September and December. A fund raising plant sale will be held on the last Saturday in March. The annual October plant sale is canceled. All funds raised/donated are used strictly in and for Jensen Garden.

Volunteer Pat Rhine said the reason for the cancellation is because gathering and nurturing plants to sell is a lot of work and the two people providing most of the plants for sale are minimally available beginning in 2013. # SJUSD launches online tool to help students plan their future

One of the hardest questions anyone ever gets asked is, "What do you want to be when you grow up?"

For high school students faced with literally thousands of different career options, this question can be a bit overwhelming.

That's why San Juan Unified School District launched in September 2011 a tool called Naviance to help middle and high school students begin to plan their

According to Bruce Armes, lead counselor for SJUSD, Naviance is an online educational planner for students from seventh through 12th grade throughout the district that helps them plan their high school courses, look at career options, and research colleges and universities.

Armes says Naviance was purchased by SIUSD two years ago through a state grant, and is part of the district's strategic plan. It's an interactive tool for students to plan their academic activities in collaboration with families and staff as parents can also log in to Naviance to view their student's information.

## What to Take

One of the main parts of Naviance is the ability for students to plan their high school courses electronically

Armes says the system gives students a four-year planner for their course planning, as well as a listing of all their grades for an online transcript. "Students have total access to them all the time, and parents can review them with them," Armes adds.

For Scott Evans, a counselor at Del Campo High School, moving from doing course planning on paper to something electronic helps cut down on students losing a paper planner or it never getting to a parent. "So the good thing about Naviance is kids do it, they get the information into their account, the counselors can view it and parents can view it," he says.

Additionally, Evans says having it online makes it easier for counselors to keep track of the progress students are making as they go through each year in high school."Now we just say log on to their account – are you still on the path that you had planned last year, has anything changed, have your goals changed," he explains. "It just makes it easier to update as well."

#### What to Be

Next comes to the career portion of Naviance. Armes says students have access to career assessments that help them narrow down their choices for possible careers, which they can then access information on, such as what they would do in that career, skills necessary, and national wage average.

Armes says Naviance gives students the chance to begin taking a look at where their interests lie and giving them some direction of things they may want to do after high school. "Even for the students that have a really good idea of what they want to do, it allows them to really research that area," he explains. "There are thousands of occupations that are there, (and) it's trying to open up this world of work for students to really let them know there's a ton of options out there."

## Where to Go

Then directly connected to the career assessment portion of Naviance is the college search. Evans says once students complete a career interest inventory on the system, they automatically get to see not only career options, but associated college majors to get their college search started. "So here I can open up a student's account and I can see what career they're interested in, they'll create a list of colleges of interest, and it's all in one place," he adds.

For Karen Garcia, a counselor for Casa Roble and Bella Vista High Schools, Naviance gives her a quick resource to help students narrow down their secondary education choices. "When a student comes in and says I want to play lacrosse, I want to go to college, and I want to be on list," she says. "It's making it more efficient for me to help kids out."

Armes says for parents unsure how to access Naviance, they can contact the counselor at their student's school for help. Additionally he advises parents to keep an eye out for parenting training sessions, which he hopes the district will begin offering.


