





Project Hope: bone marrow drive searches for donor matches

Volunteers turned out in good numbers for the first annual Project Hope bone marrow drive, held July 17 at the McKinley Park Rose Garden in Sacramento.

With a simple cheek swab, potential donors were registered into the National Marrow Donor Program. If matched with a potential recipient, a donor would next be asked to donate blood for stem cell extraction - from which new bone marrow can be cultured.

The drive was especially meaningful to Anna Marie Kramer, owner of Zuda Yoga, which sponsored the event with Blood Source. Those who came to register their bone marrow were treated to free yoga class-

"This is just a great event for a great cause, the yoga community coming together to help everyone out," Kramer said. "We were inspired to do this because one of our friends and teacher at Zuda Yoga, Jessie Quinn, has leukemia. So this is for her."

Blood cancers like leukemia and lymphoma affect people worldwide, but are especially devastating to persons with diverse ethnic backgrounds in this country. According to the National Marrow Donor Program, over 10,000 patients hope for a cure though a

'Hipsters' group disbands after many decades

A phone call out came out of the blue the other day from a woman who identified herself as Land Park resident Martha Curry. She said she was calling on behalf of the Sacramento Hipsters, and she invited my wife and me to attend what she described as the orgameeting.'

For just a moment, the invitation hung precariously on a plateau of mystery, but the fog quickly cleared and I totally remembered the Hipsters and what this organization was all about.

The Hipsters were part of a story that began for me in 1971, when my wife and I were driving from down-

nization's "final, farewell town to our South Land Park home, and were hit head-on by a drunk driver. My wife happily suffered only cuts and bruises but an ambulance took me to the Kaiser Hospital on Morse Avenue where I spent the next seven weeks receiving treatment for a smashed left hip and a shattered lower right leg.

> Eventually I was able to get around painfully with a cane. After about 15 more months, an orthopedist at Kaiser took me aside and told me about a new medical procedure that was just becoming available—something called a hip replacement. The shattered hip bone and socket would be replaced by an artificial new hip of plastic and other materials, he said, and this would be accomplished surgically at the Kaiser hospital on Geary Boulevard in San Francisco. The procedure was not yet being done in Sacramento.

And so it went. As soon as the surgery was over in September of 1973, the pain around my hip magically disappeared. After all, plastic rubbing against metal doesn't hurt. Soon I was

able to travel, ride a bike, play golf and engage in other pursuits that had seemed totally out of reach for the preceding year-and-a half.

As the years rolled on, the prosthesis wore out and loosened: first in 1987, and for a second time in 2003. Both times the necessary "repairs" were made at the new South area Kaiser hospital on Bruceville Road. On the day after the 2003 surgery, I recall

that Arnold Schwarzenegger had entertained the patients and hospital staff by announcing his candidacy on TV to unseat Gov. Gray Davis on Jay Leno's "Tonight" show.

It had probably been around 1980 that I first heard about the Hipsters, an organization composed of hip replacement veterans. A member named Annie Beagler phoned to invite me to become a member, which I did. Hip replacements had been growing in popularity, Annie said, and the Hipsters were scheduling regular member meetings to learn all they could about hip surgery medical advances.

For several years, I went to the meetings on a regular basis. They were held at various venues, but finally took over a permanent site at the UC Med Center. I attended the meetings for around 10 years, but finally dropped out, mainly because of access problems for me at the med center.

Finally, the 2003 hip replacement came to a sudden end for me after my wife and I emerged from a July 2005 performance of "The Music Man" at the 24th Street Theater. I tripped over a rise in the sidewalk and crashed to the pave-

ment. When I tried to climb to my feet, it turned out to be impossible. An ambulance took me to the South area Kaiser where I underwent a fourth hip replacement, along with a repair of the broken femur.

By this time I'd learned that my chief early-day contact at the Hipsters, Annie Beagler, had died, and I put the organization out of my mind.

And so it remained until this past month, when Martha Curry phoned to extend her invitation to a "final" Hipsters' meeting. It would be held at Luau Gardens, a Chinese smorgy across from the Arden Fair mall. The Hipsters had been meeting there regularly during the past few years.

When my wife and I arrived, there were about 50 people on hand, none of whom I recognized. The emcee was Bill Oliver of West Sacramento, a retired state Water Resources employee and an early Hipsters member. He shared that his one hip replacement – the

result of a school days football injury – had lasted virtually intact for close to 30 years.

After a toothsome excursion by all through the Luau Gardens' array of won ton, chow mein and other oriental goodies, Oliver told the audience that the Hipsters were coming to an end primarily because membership has been declining for some years. The group's information programs about hip replacements (and most recently, knee replacements) had been taken over by the hospitals themselves.

Also, recent advances in joint replacement technology have attracted younger patients, were less inclined to attend Hipsters meetings. As a result, there was a sharp drop in the more than 200 members who attended regular meetings in the past, Oliver said.

The Hipsters' featured speaker for its final official meeting was a local medical superstar in the development of artificial knees and

hips to replace joints that function with severe pain: Dr. William L. Bargar, an orthopedic specialist who practices primarily at Sutter Hospital.

A one-time engineering student, Bargar is among the first U.S. surgeons to use robotic procedures that were developed abroad. These procedures and the use of titanium as a metal for the prostheses, have simplified the technique that Bargar calls "Robodoc," or robotic surgery.

During the actual surgery using Robodoc, Bargar said, a robot precisely mills the bone surfaces, ensuring a precise fit and position of the implant based on a plan developed before the operation. This assures the surgeon that the final bone preparation will match the pre-operative plan exactly, he added.

A suggestion to hold an annual Hipsters reunion was warmly endorsed by all. That get-together—probably at Luau Gardens—will be held in July, 2011.

Broadway comes to Janey Way

One summer on Janey Way in the hot days of August, boredom hung over the neighborhood like a cloud. The younger members of the Janey Way gang needed something interesting to do. Mary Puccetti had an idea. "Let's stage a show like they do on Broadway," she said. Her buddies, Diane Viani, Bernadette Tomassetti and Tom Harte, agreed and volunteered to perform. Her big brother Randy agreed to work backstage, and Lou Viani, one of the older boys, said he would direct the production. They were off and running.

Within days, Randy Puccetti began putting a set together – nothing complicated, just banners and small props. The performers practiced their songs, including old standards like "Yankee Doodle Dandy" and "God Bless America." Louie, acting like George M. Cohan himself, paced the yard and hollered out directions to the cast. Slowly, but surely, the production came together. In the meantime, the kids hand delivered invitations to every house in the neighborhood. Soon the show would take place. But

would anyone come?
On the day of the show, Randy hurried around his backyard making final preparations. The performers, Mary, Bernadette, Tom and the others, ran through a final rehearsal of the show. Volunteers stood at the gate to the yard waiting to collect the 25-cent admission fee and seat people. The neighbors began to arrive about one half hour before the show began. First one or two, then more, then the whole neighborhood showed up. The kids were dumbfounded and a little scared. They did not expect this big of a crowd.

"Oh my God, it's time to begin."

Lou made the call of "Let the show begin," and the cast came marching out in their patriotic costumes blaring out "God Bless America." One by one, the cast performed each number perfectly. The neighbors cheered louder after each new song. To end the production, the cast performed a rollicking finale, almost as good as one of those Busby Berkeley show tunes. The cast received a standing ovation from the people of Janey Way. The show was an unqualified success.

The kids learned something in the process: There are no limits, only those that we place on ourselves. They had set out to do a successful Broadway-style production and they succeeded beyond their wildest dreams. Another inspirational Janey Way memory.

The story behind the Guy A. West Memorial Bridge

Just about everyone in Sacramento is familiar with the orange/gold-colored suspension bridge that gracefully spans across the American River, near Sacramento State University. But not everyone knows the name of this structure or why it received this name.

Built in 1966 to link the campus with the then-new, Campus Commons college-community development, the 1,144-foot-long, 16-foot-wide pedestrian bridge is officially known as the Guy A. West Memorial Bridge.

The name of the bridge, which was built at a cost of \$636,000 and was recognized as the longest pedestrian suspension bridge in the United States, was selected in honor of the founding president of Sacramento State College, as the university was then known.

Born Guy Ashley West in Pine Bluff, Ark., West grew up in New Mexico, where he later graduated from New Mexico Western College.

He continued his education at the University of Colorado, where he received his master's degree, followed by the University of California, Berkeley, where he received his doctorate's degree in educational psychology.

Although attempts to create a four-year college in Sacramento date back to the 1920s, it was not until the summer of 1947 that, through the efforts of California Sen. Earl Desmond, the state Legislature approved the establishment of such a school in the capital city.

In July 1947, shortly after Gov. Earl Warren approved the future creation of the university by signing SB 1221, West was appointed as Sacramento State's first president. West's position, however, was labeled as acting president until he was officially named the college's president in July 1949.

West had previously served for 14 years as a faculty member and administrator at Chico State College – now California State University, Chico.

Under West's leadership, Sacramento State began with the absence of a campus of its own, as the school officially opened in rented structures at Sacramento Junior College – today's Sacramento City College – on Sept. 22, 1947.

The school held its first graduation on June 3, 1948,



when one student graduated at a ceremony held on the junior college's campus.

With West at its helm, Sacramento's long-awaited, fouryear college steadily advanced in its early years, as it continued to share a campus with the junior college, which had been established in 1916. After more than five years in its first location, Sacramento State relocated to its present site – a primitive version of today's much more developed campus.

In celebration of the school's first non-shared campus, a 150-car parade, which included a convertible with West and Warren as its passengers and a sign with the wording, "Go East with West," made its way from downtown Sacramento to the then-new campus.

By the time the new campus opened in 1953, Sacramento State had grown from its initial 235 students to about 2,400 students. And with a 289-acre campus, the

school had plenty more room for growth.

During West's 18 years of leadership, Sacramento State expanded to include nearly 10,000 students.

As president, West encouraged students to utilize the college educational experience to help change the world.

In welcoming a then-record group of about 1,400 new students to the campus in 1957, West used Thomas Jefferson as a role model example in a speech, in which he encouraged students to strive for excellence

Telling the incoming students that the world needed

more people like Jefferson, West said, "(Jefferson was) a gentleman of 32, who could calculate an eclipse, survey an estate, tie an artery, plan an edifice, try a case, break a horse, dance a minuet and play the violin."

And West was far from a man who only spoke words, but showed no action. To the contrary, he led by example, as is indicative of his college degrees, as well as the fact that during his life he was also a student of German, French and Latin, was nearly fluent in Spanish and studied psychology to assist him with his volunteer counseling.

West also served as president of the Western College Association, was a member of the commission on accreditation for teacher education of the state board of education and co-authored the book, "Twentieth Century American Education," an evaluation of school trends at the time.

By the time West announced his retirement at the age of 66 on Feb. 26, 1965 before faculty members in the school's Little Theater, he had spent 42 years as an

As a show of appreciation, Sacramento State's faculty and alumni associations and advisory board held a recognition dinner for West at the Hotel El Dorado - today's Radisson Hotel at 500 Leisure Lane – on June 7, 1965.

But many people felt that West, for what he meant to Sacramento State's development, was deserving of much more than a simple farewell dinner.

Because of this fact, it was determined that his name would be memorialized through the name of the nearby bridge, which with its 87-foot-tall twin towers and golden color resembles the Golden Gate Bridge, albeit a much smaller version.

The bridge, which extends across the river with about 600 feet of steel, was designed by the Spink Engineering Co. of Sacramento and was constructed by the longtime Sacramento business, A. Teichert and Son, Inc.

A special dedication of the bridge was held on Thursday, April 6, 1967 and was attended by West and his wife, Bernice, and representatives of the college, local government, the state Legislature, the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce and Campus Com-

As part of the ceremony, which began at 12:30 p.m. and was aired on three local television stations, ownership of the bridge was transferred to the city of Sacra-

Although West left Sacramento after his retirement to reside in Dallas, where he passed away at the age of 85 on July 12, 1983, his spirit never left the campus, which he so dearly loved.

Following West's death, Austin Gerber, who served as Sacramento State's interim president from April 1983 to July 1984, said, "The impact of the decisions (West) made are reflective today - near two decades after his retirement - in the excellence of the institution he helped

bring into being. California State University, Sacramento stands as a monument to his vision and hopes."

Despite making statement 27 years ago, Gerber's words, as many would agree, could have been just as truthfully spoken today as they were in

Even in the humble ways of West, who never liked the idea of his photograph hanging in the lobby of the administration building, with some decoding, he acknowledged a job well done at Sacramento State.

In speaking to about 350 faculty members in 1965, he uttered his now-famous, humorous words regarding his time at Sacramento State, saying, "I came, I saw, I was conquered.

Julie Thomas, special collections and manuscripts librarian at Sacramento State's Special Collections and University Archives, said that having such a grand memorial to West is very fitting.

"Guy West was kind of like the gold standard of college presidents," Thomas said. "He

started the college and he was able to finagle getting faculty and space. He was a mover and a shaker. He got us into this location and he set the bar high for all future presidents at Sac State. I don't know if Sac State would be what it is today without Guy West as its first president. So, I think (the bridge) is a fitting tribute to him."

Teen: Plan for regular check-ins, be it by phone, text, Facebook, Skype or email

you become less of an authority figure and more of a guide. After all, your teen will soon be making the vast majority of decisions on his or her own. It is important for them to begin this transition before they leave. I'm not suggesting letting your teen stay out all night and having full access to the wine cellar. You still need rules and expectations. But if they make poor choices, focus

more on discussion and guidance than on consequences.

As much as your college-bound teen will be pulling at the reins, seemingly full of confidence, remember that they're also fearful and anxious about leaving home. When you sense this, reassure them that they'll be fine and you'll be there to help, if they need you.

So plan for regular check-ins, be it by phone, text, Facebook, Skype or email. Along with this, plan your teen's visits home. By doing this, your teen will have the reassurance of knowing that you'll communicate regularly.

It is also important for parents to share some of what they are feeling. You want your teen to know how proud you are and how much you're going to miss him/her. Don't overdo it. If your teen gets the feeling that their departure is going to overwhelm you, then leaving will be more difficult. Share your more intense feelings others.

After your child leaves, you'll have many different feelings, and most are normal and OK. Perhaps you'll feel depressed, empty and lonely. Or you might feel happy and relieved. Be patient, the feelings will get easier. If necessary, seek out the support of friends and family to help with your transition.

You will also have more free time now that you aren't going to games and monitoring homework. You need to figure out what to do. One option is to stay home and wallow in your feelings. Or you can find new things to do. It's your time to explore and do what you've always meant to do but couldn't find the time.


If your teen doesn't contact you as frequently as you'd like, try not to take it personally. Your teen is in a period of extraordinary change and excitement, and staying in-touch won't be a priority. Be patient and continue checking-in. Even if your teen seems disinterested and gives one-word responses, rest assured that your communications are helping with the adjustment.

When you do communicate, celebrate what's going well and offer to help with what isn't. Work hard not to judge and lecture. If your teen gets the message that you are there to guide rather than criticize, they'll be more likely to speak openly and seek your support.

When a teen leaves

for college a family is thrown into a period of great challenge and transition. If parents and teens don't work hard to make it a positive experience, relationships can be strained or even damaged. However, if parents help their teens to prepare prior to departure and support them once they're at school, along with taking care of their own emotional needs, the likelihood of a successful transition for teen and parents is high.

In my next article, I will focus on how parents can help their younger children when their older siblings go to school.

Organic produce available at McKinley Park fruit stand

It's not hard to find a fruit stand around the Sacramento area. Depending on the season, you can probably find any number of stands that sell the produce you're looking for. But not many of these stands can boast that they are certified organic with all produce coming from a collection of local farms.

Since the beginning of July, however, McKinley Park has been home to such a stand.

Soil Born Farms, the organization that runs the stand, has sold produce around the Sacramento area for the past three years, according to Carolyn Reuman, coordinator of the McKinley Park stand. In looking for a place to put a new stand, Reuman said that the organization

needed to find a financially viable destination and a place where many people from East Sacramento and beyond come together. If the first month's returns are any indication, the park

might be the best place they could have picked.

"(McKinley) Park draws from a wide population," Reuman said. "It's been really popular so far."

So popular, in fact, that there may be a need to add more vendors to catch up to demand. Reuman said that the workers welcome suggestions from the community when it comes to what else people would like to see at the stand. Coffee has been the main suggestion thus far.

Some of the things currently for sale at the stand include carrots, beets, peaches, corn, bok choi, tomatoes, lettuce, cucumbers, onions, eggplant and watermelons. But there is an odd piece of produce currently making its way into the bags of many shoppers.

"Ground cherries are very popular right now," Reuman said.

ground comes naturally wrapped in its own little husk that is peeled away to reveal the cherry tomato-sized fruit. Reuman called the taste a cross between a tomato and a pineapple. Many people arrive at the stand unaware of the fruit's existence and end up walking away with some in their bags.

The stand opened on July 1 and will run through October 30 at its location in front of the McKinley Library on Alhambra Boulevard. İt is only open on Saturdays from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. With produce flying off the shelves and no end to the demand in sight, Reuman and her associates have kicked around the idea of keeping the stand open during the winter months in some capacity.

"We are looking at options to keep it open during the winter," she said.

She is unsure of how exactly this can be done with the threat of inclement weather, but the idea is very much alive.

The potential extension was music to the ears of Sacramento residents Darla and Will Lackey. They keep coming back for more of the high quality produce they have found at the stand. The bags of mustard greens, bok choi, beets, tomatoes, peaches, corn and yes, ground cherries that they carried away from the stand spoke of the couple's loyalty.

"It's so great to have this," Darla said. "We'll continue to come back."

In addition to the McKinley Park stand, Soil Born Farms prides itself on getting the word out to as

many people as possible about the benefits of organic produce. The 501(c)(3)nonprofit organization offers many educational opportunities for youths, high schoolers and adults.

Soil Born also contributes to a cause called Harvest Sacramento, a group that collects unwanted fruits and vegetables from backyards across Sacramento and donates them to local food assistance programs for the less fortunate. On the group's website (www. soilborn.org) there is a place

to donate to the educational fund as well as the Harvest Sacramento fund. They also ask for donations of functional gardening equipment such as shovels, wheelbarrows and weed whackers.

The stand sells produce from small farms and growers from Sacramento, Yolo, Placer, El Dorado, Yuba, Sutter, Solano and San Joaquin counties. People are encouraged to bring their own bags with which to fill up with produce. According to the stand's brochure, proceeds from the stand are

used to "subsidize prices of food for others in our community who need assistance."


