



The Christmas season is a time of hope. All around the community, there are sounds of good tidings and cheer – and the hope for peace in every heart.

When one is walking through the Valley of the Shadow, however, it is sometimes hard to realize that the Good Shepherd is there. That others do, indeed, care.

Nicole and George Carollo of Sacramento are reminded of this every December, when they celebrate their oldest daughter's life in a special way. They have turned a personal tragedy into something that gives hope to others.

In 2004, little Rosalia Ann Carollo lost her battle with a catastrophic childhood illness – a rare childhood epilepsy called infantile spasms. She was almost two years old. George and Nicole were devastated. It was a loss they never anticipated.

Three years after Rosie's death, Nicole and George came upon a way to celebrate Rosie's life with their family and the community at large.

"George and I were walking through the neighborhood, looking for ideas on light decorations for our new house, and an idea came to us," Nicole said. "We noticed that some families had barrels in their front yards for food donations by those who would come by to enjoy the Christmas lights. We thought, 'Let's do something for Rosie. Let's do toys and give them to the children at Sutter Memorial Children's Hospital."

So, with just a sign on the lawn and one email, the Carollos started their first annual Rosie Carollo Christmas Lights and Toy Drive in 2007. The results were astounding.

"We had 741 items donated that one night," Nicole said. "And \$236 in cash donated also. George and I looked at each other and said,

'Wow, look at what Rosie has done!"

Each year following has brought more donations of toys and funds for the Child Life program at Sutter Memorial – a total of nearly 2,500 items and \$3,676. The Carollo family hands out cookies and hot chocolate while taking donations of new and unwrapped toys that are later delivered to the children's hospital.

Several hundred guests show up every year to enjoy the light show, quaff some hot chocolate and donate a toy to help a hospitalized child. It has become quite a community event. This year's display includes a full size nativity scene, flying reindeer, a gingerbread village, 40 foot tall Christmas trees choreographed to music, and much more. The Carollo home is located at 3961 Fair Oaks Boulevard in Sacramento, at the corner of Fair Oaks and San Ramon Way.

Despite the loss of their beloved Rosie, George and Nicole have no regrets. They believe that their daughter's brief life on earth continues to have great meaning and purpose, especially through the annual light show and toy drive.

"Without a doubt, this is the most joyful night of the year for me," Nicole said.

Stop-N-Shop markets were leaders in city's grocery industry

Anyone remember Stop-N-Shop grocery stores and supermarkets? It goes without question that just about anyone who resided in the Sacramento area any time from the Great Depression to around the days when the motion picture "Jaws" and disco were considered hot topics certainly answered, "yes," to this question.

One wonders how many longtime, local residents still drive by the old Stop-N-Shop building across from Vic's Ice Cream on Riverside Boulevard in the Land Park area and reminisce about when they used to shop at this once grand supermarket.

Considering that Sacramento was home to 13 Stop-N-Shop markets, there are undoubtedly many people who remember at least one of these stores.

Furthermore, many longtime, local residents assuredly still remember the store's popular jingle, which featured the familiar lines: "Let's go down to the Stop-N-Shop and push the cart around 'n' round. Let's buy all of our groceries there. They have the best in town. Let's go down to the Stop-N-Shop and push the cart around 'n' round. You get a lot more for your money there than anywhere else in

Sacramento grocery leaders

Although there are currently several Sacramento area convenience stores that use the name, Stop N Shop, these stores are not to be confused with the Stop-N-Shop stores that were once leaders in the city's grocery industry.

The Stop-N-Shop stores highlighted in this article were established by the Kassis family, with the first of these stores being opened in 1928 at 2800 Y St. (present day Broadway).

The roots of Stop-N-Shop stores began with A.G. Kassis, who emigrated with his wife, Maggie, from Lebanon to the United States in

Lebanese immigrants

Upon their arrival in America, A.G. and Maggie, who were Christian Lebanese, made their way to North Dakota, where they eventually had five sons. These sons, in order of seniority, were Frank, Lew, Ed, John and Walter.

A.G., who purchased farmland in Williston, N.D., began his own grain farming operation, which proved to be unsuccessful.

As a result of this failed endeavor, A.G. joined his four brothers - Abe, Charles, John and Eli - in the op-


eration of a billiards parlor in North Dakota. A.G. also added to his income through other business ventures, which included the operation of a small grocery

After about 20 years of living in North Dakota, A.G. and Maggie decided to move their family to Rio Lin-

da, Calif. This decision was based on the poor health of John, who suffered from vitamin deficiency and would be better suited living in a warmer climate.

In Rio Linda, A.G. sold chickens and eggs and raised fruits and vegetables,

which he sold from roadside stands.

The source of the majority of A.G.'s income ended abruptly, however, when a fatal disease eliminated A.G.'s chickens.

Subsequently, A.G. attempted to achieve success by operating a miniature golf business and a livestock feed store, but neither were very successful.

Son finds first location

Fortunately, Frank, who regularly took a train into Sacramento and then rode by streetcar from 12th and H streets to Sacramento High School, was able to find work at the Del Monte cannery at 17th and C streets, where his mother was also employed.

It was also Frank who discovered a commercial corner in Sacramento that, in his own description, "intrigued" him.

This corner at the aforementioned 28th and Y streets proved to be the site of the first Stop-N-Shop store, as A.G. leased a former retail ice business at this street corner from Preston F. Reed, a carpenter and building contractor who lived at 2545 28th St.

After traveling into Sacramento each day, the Kassis family eventually moved to the capital city, residing at 2522 28th St.

Stop-N-Shop, A.G. operated with the assistance of his sons, was not the first Kassis-owned grocery store in Sacramento, since A.G.'s brother, Charles Kassis, who resided in Rio Linda, had partnered with Rio Linda resident Anna Bohamera to own and operate Del Monte Grocery at 1730 C St.

Quick growth

The area around the first Stop-N-Shop store grew quickly with the assistance of the opening of the Shasta Ice Cream Co. at 2814 Y St. Additionally, Scotty's Service Station, which was located across Y Street from these two businesses, aided in bringing people to the area.

Pocket area resident Dick Ryder, a 1947 graduate of McClatchy High School, said that he remembers seeing the first Stop-N-Shop location during the 1930s.

"I lived (at 2800 Regina Way in Land Park), near California Junior High, and I remember the first Stop-N-Shop," he said. "It was kind of

like the picture at the (California Automobile) Museum of the first Raley's (grocery) store in Placerville. It had all the fruits and vegetables out in front of the place."

The success of the Y Street store, which had a dirt floor and initially sold cold watermelon, ice, beverages and wood blocks, was achieved through the Kassis family's reputation for providing quality food and service.

This success led to the establishment of Stop-N-Shop, Store #2, at 1330 16th St. in about the early 1930s.

As the prosperity of the Stop-N-Shop stores increased, A.G. Kassis transferred ownership of his stores to four of his sons.

Of the five sons of A.G., only John ventured outside the family's grocery business, as he instead opted to go to medical school. Eventually becoming Dr. John Kassis, John practiced family medicine in Sacramento for nearly a half-century.

The number of Stop-N-Shop stores continued to increase as a Del Paso Heights store was added in about 1939 and three years later, the 2000 I St. market opened.

Following his service in the Army during World War II, Eli's son, Bill Kassis, who formerly worked at the 16th Street store and opened the 20th and I streets store, opened the Land Park area Stop-N-Shop store, which was located at 3231 Riverside

'Store of tomorrow'

The two-story Riverside Boulevard building, which was built by the Erickson Construction Co. and included a warehouse elevator, opened in late 1947.

The Riverside Boulevard store, which Theodore H. Richards of the Bercut-Richards cannery referred to as "the store of tomorrow," was locally unique for its time, as this early supermarket served as the anchor of a wide variety of businesses.

Doris (Lopes) Yager, a 1938 graduate of McClatchy High School, said that her

mother, Gloria Lopes, was one of the very first customers of the Riverside Boulevard store.

Doris added that by 1950, she had moved into her mother's house at 1250 Marian Way in the Land Park area and had begun to shop at the Riverside Boulevard store.

When I got married, I lived with my mom for several years and İ did all my shopping at (the Riverside Boulevard) Stop-N-Shop," Doris said. "It was the only grocery store in the neighborhood, so naturally everybody shopped at Stop-N-Shop. It had such things as a meat counter, a fruits and vegetables department, a post office, a drug store and Swanson's Cleaners was there, too, so you had everything in the one store. And Bill Kassis was there all the time and he was a very nice gentleman, as I recall. İt was quite the grocery store for its

Bill, 88, who is now the patriarch of the Kassis fami-

East Sacramento centenarian discovers classic family photos

For someone who has lived as many years as East Sacramento resident Genevieve Cobb, it is surprising to many people how little she owns. But fortunately, a small collection of photographs from the early part of Genevieve's life are among her few keepsakes.

Oddly, however, it was not until last week that Genevieve, who last June turned 102 years old, was aware that she had these photographs in her possession.

Explaining that she had never had any children and that it was her belief that no one would ever want her old photographs, Genevieve made the decision to throw away her old, family photographs about two years ago.

Forgotten photo album

Last week, while looking through a photo album from her 99th birthday celebration, she was surprised to come across a dozen black and white, family photographs, ranging from 1908, which was the year of her birth, to 1948, the year she married her nowlate husband, Rodney Cobb.

"I was surprised that I had these (photographs) and that they hadn't been in the 'throw outs," Genevieve said. "If they had been in the drawer where I had all my other pictures, they would have been thrown out. Nobody wants them, so finally I just went through the drawer and tossed

When asked why she had not valued her old, family photographs for her own remembrance, Genevieve quickly responded, "Well, I don't ever look at them. I hadn't looked at this (99th birthday photo album) for so long, I didn't know these (old family photographs) were in (the album)."

Although Genevieve said that she has no regrets about throwing away her other family photographs, she was pleased to come across the few that are still in her possession.

Moore and Effie Belle (Wotring) Moore, lived the first three years of her life in Greeley, Colo.

Although Genevieve said that she does not have any memory of residing in Colorado, she can now observe five different photographs from this time in her life.

Among these photographs is a 1908 image that includes the less than one-year-old Genevieve, her parents and her grandparents on her father's side of her family.

The photograph is especially significant, since Genevieve believes it represents the only existing photograph of any of her grandparents.

In a similar manner to this photograph, Genevieve's photograph of herself and Rodney is also unique. Taken on June 8, 1948 – the day after their wedding – the photograph is possibly the only image of her late husband.

Roseburg, Oregon

After leaving Colorado, Genevieve resided with her family in Roseburg, Ore. from about 1911 to about 1915.

While in Oregon, Delbert, a former railroad worker, supported his family by cutting wood in the forest. In Roseburg, the family had a farm. And to help the financial stability of the family, who Genevieve said was poor, Effie, in Genevieve's words, "canned fruit like mad."

Oklahoma in the 1920s

With hope of improving their finances, the family relocated to Oklahoma, first residing in Skiatook and then moving about 20 miles away to the town of Bigheart.

Delbert was able to obtain employment in Oklahoma as an oil field worker.

Genevieve said that she remembers when Bigheart was renamed Barnsdall in 1922.

"They changed the name to Barnsdall, because the Barnsdall (oil) refinery was there," Genevieve said.

After graduating from Barnsdall High School in 1926, Genevieve graduated from the University of Oklahoma, became a teacher at Skiatook Elementary School, worked in the registrar's office at the University of Oklahoma and met her future husband. She also turned down an offer to become the principal of Skiatook Elementary School.

Soon after Genevieve's marriage, she was left alone, as Rodney served in the Army in Panama for 13 months.

Eventually, Genevieve moved to Fresno, where Rodney was stationed.

Following the war, on Dec. 24, 1945, Genevieve and Rodney moved to Colorado Springs.

Attending Colorado College in Colorado Springs, Rodney obtained a bachelor's degree in botany.







Due to Rodney's desire to earn a master's degree in botany at the University of Washington, the couple eventually moved to Seattle.

The suitcases were packed once more, when Rodney, after earning his master's degree, obtained employment at the world-famous seed supplier, W. Atlee Burpee and Co., in Lompoc, Calif.

East Sacramento

In 1953, Genevieve began the first year of her more than half-century of residing in East Sacramento, as Rodney was hired to work for the Department of Agriculture.

After residing for 10 months in downtown Sacramento, Rodney and Genevieve purchased a house at 89 Coloma Way, off Elvas Avenue, in East Sacramento in November 1953.

Genevieve also became employed by the state, first working for the Division of Highways. For the majority of her 13 years with the state, she worked for the California Public Employees' Retirement Sys-

Both Rodney and Genevieve retired from the state on July 1, 1969.

Mercy McMahon Terrace

In 1995, Genevieve and Rodney moved into Mercy McMahon Terrace, an independent and assisted living facility at 3865 J St., near Mercy General Hospital.

Although Rodney passed away at the age of 93 in 2000, Genevieve has continued to live at Mercy Mc-Mahon and has a reputation of being an outstanding person, as well as an excellent bridge player.

Genevieve, who is of Dutch and Irish ancestry and is related to the second U.S. president, John Adams, said that she appreciates the opportunity she has had to live such a long life.

Good genes and good food

She added that she mainly attributes her family's genes to her longevity.

"My mother lived to be quite old," Genevieve said. "She didn't live to be 100, but she was in the upper 90s and her family was long-lived. My father died young, 65, but he had some health problems. His sister lived, I guess, to be in her 90s and my sisters are in their 90s. But I know genes are what do it. Also, I never smoked or drank and (growing up) I just had the food that our family could raise or buy. It was quality food and never junk food."

Active centenarian

Genevieve, who has been very active in the resident council and is Mercy McMahon's only centenarian, is well known among residents and staff at Mercy McMahon as a model of longevity and one of the facility's most kind-hearted and friendly peo-

Among the residents who are most impressed with Genevieve is Sheila Mahoney.

'You wouldn't even know she's 102," Maloney said. "She does everything. She does her own laundry. I'm 92 and I don't even do my own laundry. She is quite a lady."

Nicki Bagley, assistant administrator at Mercy McMahon, said that she is also very impressed with

"She is a very amazing woman," Bagley said. "She represents her generation quite well. She's a very classy woman and kind of old-fashioned in her being. She's also very bright and still very alert mentally. She is certainly as bright as anyone 20 years younger. We are so fortunate to have Mrs. Cobb here at Mercy McMahon."

Karen Lakey Buckwalter is internationally known for her handbell compositions, including "Season of the Heart." This piece is rich in melodic and harmonic content.

"I've Got a Gal in Kalamazo" by Henry Warren was originally performed by Glenn Miller and his Orchestra, along with Tex Beneke and the Modernaires, for the movie "Orchestra Wives." It was nominated for an Academy Award in 1942.

Traditional carols include: "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen,""O Tannenbaum,""Carols and Bells," "We Three Kings," "Go, Tell It on the Mountain," and a sing along of Christmas carols and Hanukah songs.







Janey Way Memories



Roller derby in the halls of Phoebe **Hearst School**

Roller derby first appeared on local television in 1961. It featured teams with names like: the San Francisco Bay Bombers, Portland's Rose City Rollers and the San Diego Thunderbirds.

They played weekly on a local UHF television station. The four man teams, two blockers and two jammers, thundered around a short, elevated, banked, wood track. The goal of the competition involved getting the smaller jammers past the big and brutish blockers which resulted in points scored.

Competitors sometimes flew right off the elevated track into the fans. We marveled at the athleticism of the skaters and the violence of the headknocking competition.

So, naturally, we had to have our own roller derby matches.

We held our roller derby events in the smooth cement halls of Phoebe Hearst elementary school. Our track started in the covered hallway running down the center of the school, then turned right into the open pathway running in front of the classrooms, rounded the side of the building then up the pathway along the back of the classrooms, only to return the covered center hallway.

We played four man teams just like the real roller derby: using the big boys as blockers and the smaller boys as jammers. Games lasted four quarters and the team with the most points in the end, won the competition.

Because the front and rear classroom hallways were so narrow, virtually all the passing took place on the wide, covered, center hallway. This made for some bone-bruising spills, but no serious injuries ever occurred. However, we often suffered scrapes, bruises and cuts in these enthusiastic competitions. I recall bouncing right off the walls of the building into oncoming skaters which led to bodies flying all over the halls of the school.

By the end of a hard-fought match, we were fully ready for a trip over to Bossie's Drive-in or to the A&W root beer stand for a tall soda pop where we reviewed the events of the day and argued over which team actually won or lost the match - no champagne for the winners of the roller derby.

Eventually, like all things in the world, roller derby left the Sacramento airwaves and we lost interest in playing the sport. This probably spared us from suffering some sort of serious injury.

But the passage of time has not blurred the memories I have of these competitions - another bonebruising Janey Way memory.

ly, remembers the store with much passion and detail.

He emphasized that the Riverside Boulevard building, which also included a barbershop, a beauty shop, a Green Stamp redemption center and a location of the locally-famous Hart's Pastry, was fortunate to have Ash Rutledge and his Vic's Ice Cream across the street at 3199 Riverside Blvd.

"We were very good friends and actually, we depended on each other," Bill said. "I'd have lunch there every day."

A 1965 city directory shows the continued expansion of Stop-N-Shop, as the number of its store locations had reached 11 by this time. These stores included the River Park store at 5491 Carlson Drive and stores at 4065 McKinley Blvd. and 5815 Stockton Blvd.

Overall, the Kassis family eventually operated 13 stores, yet in a similar theme to buildings that do not designate a 13th floor, the store numbers jumped from Store #12 to Store #14.

Surpassing the popularity of the chain's Riverside Boulevard location was one of the last Stop-N-Shop stores to be constructed – the then-very modern Fort Sutter Shopping Center supermarket at 2815 L St., where Sutter General Hospital was later built. The market structure also included candy and coffee shops

and laundry and shoe repair businesses.

Bill said that Stop-N-Shop was well represented in the north area of Sacramento.

In addition to the Del Paso Boulevard store, north area Stop-N-Shop stores were located at 4120 El Camino Ave., Fulton and Marconi avenues, where Honey Baked Ham is located at the present day address of 2875 Fulton Ave., 2312 Watt Ave. at Country Club Plaza and 1765 Arden Way at the Arden Fair Mall.

Greg Kassis, the son of Lew Kassis and a Stop-N-Shop employee for most of the years of 1954 to 1975, said that he most fondly remembers the Fulton and Marconi avenues

Greg added that he first provided assistance at this store when he was 7 years old.

"I used to ride my bike to work (at the Fulton and Marconi avenues store)," Greg said.


When asked about the north area Stop-N-Shop locations, Bill was quick to describe the uniqueness of the Watt Avenue site's Gourmet Lane, which included Frank Fat's restaurant, La Fiesta Mexicatessen Restaurant, Hart's Restaurant, Frank's Fisherman's Wharf Restaurant, T&T Burger Bar, Farmer Joe's Restaurant and Keller's Doughnut

"As far as I remember, (Gourmet Lane) was one of the first food courts that was opened anywhere in the country," Bill said.

Although Stop-N-Shop stores once held a very high position in the world of Sacramento grocery stores, their heyday gradually ended as the stores were individually sold at separate times due to competition from other grocery stores and financial struggles related to other Kassis family business ven-

Despite the absence of any Stop-N-Shop stores in Sacramento by 1975, the fond memories of Stop-N-Shop markets continue to live on today in the minds of the Kassis family and their stores' many former customers.
