# How 'the Pit' changed as I grew up

I moved to Janey Way in 1952 just after celebrating my fifth birthday.

The day after I arrived, my next door neighbor, Butch, took me down to play in the "Pit," a vacated sand and gravel site which abutted the back yards of the houses on the east side of Janey Way.

It must have looked like the Grand Canyon to a five-year old boy. The site sank about 30 feet into the ground and stretched in an L pattern from M Street on the south all the way over to Elvas Avenue on the north, then across to 62nd Street on the east. It covered about 40 acres of the land on which the St. Francis Catholic High School now stands.

At that time, a dirt road snaked down into the bottom of the Pit from the M Street side of the site, just behind the Petrocchi house at the beginning of Janey Way. Big trucks entered the Pit almost daily to dump their contents in an effort to backfill the big hole. They dumped things like broken pieces of concrete, waste lumber and dirt.

We used this debris to build forts to play in. We also did things like racing our bikes over and around the mounds of dirt left by the trucks, playing cowboys and Indians and staging mock battles between pretend armies.

The Pit was our playground and because it changed shape daily that made it all the

But the Pit went though many changes as we grew up. By the late 1950s, the entire east end of the pit was level ground. In 1959, the East Sacramento Little League built a baseball diamond on that section of the site. It was a beautiful diamond with bright green fences all around, builtin dugouts, stands for the fans on both sides of the field and a two story structure behind the back stop for a snack bar and a public address system. I played my first and only year of Little League baseball in

Soon after that, all the rest of the Pit was leveled to look like a large vacant lot except for a tall mound of dirt in the middle we called Mount Everest. We played often on that hill. We used it as lookout, as a hide out, and as a stage for great military maneuvers. The younger Janey Way kids actually staged gladiatorial fights on the top of Mount Everest.

On July 4th, we lit fireworks on top of Mt. Everest even before Red Devil and Freedom fireworks were sold in town. Dom Costamagna lit flares and popped fire crackers. Once he even shot off a naval flare which turned the night sky red over the top of our Mt. Everest. However, soon after that even Mt. Everest disappeared.

By the mid 1960s, the Diocese of Sacramento constructed St. Francis High School on the area we once called the Pit. We had grown up then and our days of playing army, riding bikes and building forts had long since ended.

Now the Pit is just another cherished Janey Way memory.

## Fight the bite: Mosquitoes are already out

It might only be January, but the warmer than usual temperatures and dry weather have created the ideal conditions for mosquitoes.

"We're starting to see many mosquitoes now," said David Brown, district manager of the Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito & Vector Control District. "Mosquitoes that had been resting for the past few months are already out and aggressively biting, ready to begin their life cycle."

The above average rainfall total for December has left many potential water sources in and around homes, requiring regular household water management to prevent mosquitoes from developing later in the season.

"We urge all residents to check for mosquito breeding sources around their home," said Brown.
"It is important to empty containers that may collect water, such as buckets, flower pots, bird baths, cans and old tires. This will go a long way in ensuring that mosquitoes are not breeding on your property."

With the continued depressed economic market and high number of foreclosed homes in the area, neglected swimming pools are of special concern for the District. Pools can be a significant threat because if left unattended, they can produce thousands of mosquitoes - and can infect an entire neighborhood. The District continues to work closely with residents and city and county agencies to identify homes with neglected pools so potential problems can be addressed quickly and efficiently.

# Vocation of serving, healing others finds daily higher purpose

Every morning, Billie the dog wakes up in his doggie bed, stretches and looks for his human to get the day started. The beagle/fox terrier mix knows the basic routine. His human does important work

at Kaiser Social Services in adult psychiatry, and helps others by visiting them, too. Today will be a visiting day. He's excited, because he knows he will meet new people and old friends today.

His human, Sister Catherine Connell, SSS, has already been up for an hour of prayer. She says it is "really essential, so I can be present to those I am serving and see God's presence in them. As well as helping them see God's presence then in me in the work I am doing to help them come to healing."

Sister Catherine's day begins early, at 4:40 a.m. After her hour of prayer, she and Billie have their breakfast and a morning walk in Land

Each day is dedicated to the service of others, and has been ever since Sister Catherine, a licensed clinical social worker, became a member of the religious order known as the Sisters of Social Service. It is a calling she heard when she was a teenager in the late 1950s.

#### The Call to serve

"I entered at the age of 19," Sister Catherine said. "I'd never heard of the Sisters of Social Service until I wrote to a 'Q&A' column in the Davenport Catholic Messenger when I was 18. I didn't include my name because I was really trying to keep this call quiet. Monsignor Conway wrote a response in the newspaper, suggesting this order. So, I wrote to Sister Frederica Horvath, our foundress in the U.S. She wrote back with the expectations of the order, which included a health exam. I still re-

member the doctor's report: 'Perfectly normal, healthy

The middle child of five children, she grew up in a Catholic family. Still, "a lot of communication went back and forth" between the sisters at the Sisters of Social Service and the teenager before she approached her parents for their blessing. It also meant having to tell someone else about the call she was hearing to dedicate her life to

"I had a steady boyfriend at the time," Sister Catherine said. "He wanted to marry me, but I felt I needed to check this (calling) out first. It was a strong feeling that I needed to go and pursue this to see: is this is what God really wants for me?"

The two parted as friends. He later married another girl and had a happy marriage.

When she left her home in Muscatine, Iowa for the "Mother House" in Los Angeles, "it was quite a send-off with my grandparents, parents and three priests," she said. "It wasn't until I was on my way to the airport that I burst into tears because I realized I was leaving.


When she entered the "novitiate" stage on Feb.1, 1959, Sister Catherine began a journey that would include religious studies, a college education and hands-on field work, known then as "family visits" in parishes.

"It was a wonderful preparation," she said. "The prayer, the classes, the different assignments. You learned the focus of living a spiritual

The Sisters of Social Service value education. Sister Catherine graduated from

## Sister Catherine: Lifetime of service giving dignity with love and compassion to others

Mount St. Mary's College with a degree in sociology, and from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. with a master's degree in social work. She took her final religious vows of poverty, chastity and obedience in

Her field work took her around the nation, from working at Holy Name Parish near the Watts area of Los Angeles ("During the Watts Riot, I went to work anyway,") to working at Walter Reed Army Hospital during the Vietnam War ("I worked in a ward of 80 men. Every last one of them was missing legs, arms, eyes...There were major disabilities,") and finally, to Sacramento, where she became known for her work in opposing the state's death penalty and for her support for making state prisons true places of rehabilitation. Last year, she was honored by Death Penalty Focus' Friends Committee on Legislation.

#### Wellspring Women's Center

In the 1987, Sister Catherine and Sister Claire Graham founded the Wellspring Women's Center in Sacramento. Wellspring Women's Center is a dropin center for women and their children established to foster the innate goodness and personal self-es-teem of all who enter its doors. "Hospitality with dignity and love" is the foundation on which Wellspring is built.



Sister Catherine Connell's first assignment was to Holy Name Parish in Los Angeles. She was working with families there during the Watts Riot of 1964.

Guests at Wellspring are diverse in age, personal background, and ethnicity. Many guests are young mothers seeking adult companionship or a break from child rearing. Wellspring provides a sense of "family" to older single women without a support system. Administered today by the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the center will celebrate 25 years of service to the community this year.

#### Cancer survivor

A new phase of Sister Catherine's life would come in 1998 that would change her life forever, when a visit to the doctor came back with a diagnosis of ovarian cancer.

"I began a year of chemo in 1999," she said. "Dr. Ernie Bodai was my doctor. He is wonderful."

She beat the cancer, but four years later she learned

# 'Tower of Power' celebrates 40 years with new album release

It's rare for a car to last forty years. Some marriages don't make it that long.

So it's unusual to hear about a band that is celebrating forty years in the music business.

But that is just what a local Sacramento area band, Tower of Power, has done. To mark the occasion, they threw a party and planned to release a CD and DVD.

"Someone came up with the idea 'Let's get everybody together who's ever been in the band,' and so we did," said longtime band member, Roger Smith. "We had the ten of us onstage (current band members) plus another 23 alumni for an amazing concert." The set list was over two hours long, and the band played favorite hits for young and old alike.

"We played everything," Smith said. "It was exhausting, but so much fun. The Fillmore was packed with friends and family and fans, some from as far as Denmark."

That concert was held at The Fillmore in San Francisco in October 2008, but because of editing challenges and a failed business agreement, the CD and DVD will be released this spring.

The DVD will include footage from the concert, a history of Tower of Power and shows the founding members, Emillio Castillo and Doc Kupka visiting some of the band's old haunts.

This will be the 25th album the band has produced, although the band's famous horn section

has been featured on a myriad of albums from other artists, from Elton John to Santana to Josh Groban.

Tower of Power still tours worldwide some 150 to 180 days a year, and is still producing new music. The band's most recent album was released in 2009.

"Our sound is unique," Smith said. "There's not another band like it. We didn't try to sound like Chicago or Earth Wind and Fire."

The band's sound has been called a fusion of funk, jazz and R&B.

"Every one of these guys is an excellent musician," he added.

In addition to his full-time job with Tower of Power, Smith has another career. He writes



## East Lawn Tennis Club: Nine decades of tennis traditions

Rich with history, East Sacramento is home to various notable sites, which conjure up memories of days gone by. And among the more historical sites of the area is the Sutter Lawn Tennis Club.

Founded in 1919, the private, family-oriented tennis club is not only the capital city's oldest continuously operating tennis club, but it is also one of the oldest tennis clubs in the state.

The story of the club began with a group of 10 East Sacramento and midtown Sacramento prominent residents who raised \$20,000 to have the club constructed at its current location of 3951 N St. The group acquired these funds by selling 2,000 shares at \$10 each.

These founders, who purchased the block of land bordered by 39th, 40th, M and N streets, had been regularly playing tennis on a court located in the yard of a local dentist at 21st and I streets.

As reported by The Sacramento Bee, a groundbreaking ceremony for the club was held in late April 1919, as the first shovelful of dirt was turned by Sacramento Chamber of Commerce President Charles E. Virden.

Hanging on a wall near the fireplace in the original portion of the Sutter Lawn clubhouse is a framed, enlarged copy of the article, which marks this proud moment in the club's history.

Accompanying the article is a photograph from the groundbreaking, which shows Virden standing next to the club's directors, including Joseph I. Brunschwiler, who served as the club's first president.

Opening later in the year with seven courts and a membership limited to 200, the club began to build its rich legacy, which includes serving as the site of several notable tournaments.

#### Important tournaments

Sutter Lawn's first tournament, an event featuring the tennis great, Helen Wills (1905-1998), was the predecessor of the Central California Tennis Championships.

This tournament was an important event for tennis players, who were working their way up in the rankings.

Although it is not as notable as it was in the past, the Central Cal, which was first held at Sutter Lawn in the 1940s, continues to be held at the club today.

Another earlier tournament held at Sutter Lawn was the National Hardcourt Tennis Championships, which was sponsored by the U.S. Tennis Association.

This tournament, which was held from about 1962 to about 1973, once drew some of the professional circuit's premier players, including Stan Smith, Arthur Ashe, Ille Natase, Tony Trabert, Alex Olmedo, Billie Jean King, Nancy Richey and Rosemary Casals.

And although he was not well known at the time, Bjorn Borg played as a 16-year-old in the tournament, which at its peak had prizes for its players totaling \$37,500.

In bleachers that were set up near the fence lines, about 1,200 fans would gather to watch these high lev-

years old in 1948, described the magnitude of the event.

"We had the national championships, in which there were four in the country," said Demas, who was once a nationally-touring player. "One was the grass court at Forest Hill, the indoor in New York, the clay courts in Cincinnati and the national championship here in Sacramento (at Sutter Lawn). It was fantastic and it was a lot

Demas added that one of the many highlights involving the tournament, which was the last major tournament before the U.S. Open, was Sutter Lawn's negotiation to host the 1968 United States Davis Cup team.

'We brought the United States cup team to Sutter Lawn in 1968," Demas said. "That Davis cup team consisted of Charlie Pasarell, Arthur Ashe, Stan Smith, (Bob) Lutz, Eric Van Dillon and Donald Dell."

#### Recent tournaments

More recently, the Swanston Challenger, which is now held at the Natomas Racquet Club, was held at Sutter Lawn from 2005 to 2008.

Among the top players to participate in this tournament, which was sponsored by the now-late Sutter Lawn member Bert Swanston, were: Mark Philippoussis, John Isner, Sam

Querrey and the homegrown talent, Sam Warburg.

For most of Sutter Lawn's history, the club has been home to five courts.

#### Swim history

During the Depression, when a section of the Sutter Lawn property was sold to assist with the club's financial difficulties, one of the courts was eliminated. And in 1951, another court was removed and replaced by a swimming pool, thus marking the beginning of the club's recreational swimming and swimming tournament history.

Bob Reid, who served as the club's manager from 1974 to 1976 and was the club's swim coach during the 1960s, said that Sutter Lawn has experienced other changes, while also maintaining various traditions.

"It's a very East Sac club and in the past – a Fab '40s club," said Reid, who grew up swimming and playing tennis at the club during the 1950s. "Now it is a much more broad membership with family orientation. We are still very much interested in tournament

Other changes to Sutter Lawn, which had Ronald Reagan as one of its members during his governorship from 1967 to 1975, were a major remodel of the clubhouse in the 1980s and the addition of an exercise room in the 1990s.

Former Mayor Burnett Miller, world-renowned artist Wayne Thiebaud and prominent real estate developer John "Jack" Bowker are among the club's more notable members.


Miller, who began playing tennis at Sutter Lawn in about 1956, said that he joined the club due to its proximi-

ty to his house.
"I moved to 40th Street and I started playing tennis and spending some time (at Sutter Lawn) and it has existed the same for my whole life," Miller said. "It has always been a wonderfully democratic organization. You have far more pleasure out of the place if you play tennis, and the better you play tennis, the more people you have to play with. It's a hang out for the whole family."

Additionally, members of Sutter Lawn are much like one big family, considering that the club only allows 50 more members than it did in its earliest years.

Membership costs are \$105 per month and new members pay a \$1,500 initiation fee. Currently, the club, which is led by its president, Roy McDonald, has a waiting list for new memberships with about 15 names.

Although memberships are generally required to play tennis at Sut-





# Third annual 'Young @ Art' show open to all Sacramento area middle school students

The Third annual Young @ Art' show for middle school students in the Sacramento region is calling for entries on Feb. 10 and 11.

The highly attended art show is sponsored by St. Francis Catholic High School, which is known statewide and nationally for its programs in the visual and performing arts. Although St. Francis is a high school for young women, entries from both boys and girls are encouraged. The competition is open to students from public, private and home schools.

The limit for submissions is up to 20 pieces per school and one work per student.

All mediums and sizes of art are accepted. In the art world, one is limited only by human imagination.

This year I know we have quilts coming in from a youth quilt class," said Elizabeth Danielson, arts executive director and producer at St. Francis High School."The show is open to all 6th through 8th graders from the Sacramento area. Schools from Davis, Auburn, Woodland, Granite Bay and El Dorado Hills have participated in the past."

A few details: students and schools should deliver art works to the St. Francis High School Art Theatre Complex Foyer on Thursday, Feb. 10 or Friday, Feb. 11 between 3:30 p.m. and 5 p.m. Artwork will not be accepted after Feb. 11. The campus is located at 5900 Elvas Avenue in Sacramento, just off 65th Street and Highway 50.

The show will be held at the St. Francis High School Arts Complex on Wednesday, Feb. 23 from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. Awards will be presented to students and teachers at 6:30 p.m. All artists, teachers, parents and families are invited to the opening.

There are some pretty good prizes for students who enter "Young@Art," too. The grand prize is a full scholarship to a St. Francis Summer Arts Workshop worth \$350. Other prizes include \$100 gift certificates to University Art and Utrecht art supply stores, a sketchbook and charcoal, a St. Francis Arts t-shirt, thank you gifts for teachers and more.

The arts are viewed as an important part of the curriculum at St. Francis High School, according to Danielson.

"Creativity is an exploration of one's thoughts put on paper or other media," she said. "It uses brain skills that other more academic' classes may not tap. For many, art can be a calming stressreliever and others find it more interesting to express themselves through art than through writing. Offering the arts to students allows them to find out about themselves, how they best communicate to others, how to appreciate and interpret art, and how to enjoy the process. It makes for a well-rounded and interesting person."



