

Amazing, educational and offbeat, Annual Turtlerama is July 16

Turtles and tortoises and terrapins, oh my! The shelled, slow-footed Chelonians will serve as the stars of the annual Turtlerama event put on by the membership of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club. This year's event will take place from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Saturday, July 14, at Belle Cooledge Library, located at South Land Park Drive and Fruitridge Road. The free event will include live turtles and tortoises, educational displays, and turtle adoption opportunities.

Felice Rood, founder and president of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club, is the driving force for the annual event, which marks its thirtieth anniversary this

"I created it back in 1981 after rescuing turtles in the area before that," she said recently by phone. "The people who'd bring rescue turtles to me encouraged me to start a club, and now here it is, 30 years later."

As the organizer of a successful event that has lasted for three decades, Rood said she knows what works and has no problem with trying to keep the event's vibe the same year after year.

"We'll have all kinds of educational information provided by our club members,

we'll have tons of displays, and all the animals will be outside," she said. "It's always taken place right there at the Belle Cooledge Library. We never change things; everything stays the same because it's so popular the way it is."

A sense of permanence is also one of the things that Rood most appreciates about turtles and tortoises.

"I like that prehistoric look they have to them," she said with a chuckle. "I used to live in Dayton, Ohio, and my kids started bringing home box turtles all the time. Then one day, they walked in with this gigantic tortoise and my heart just started to sing and it hasn't stopped singing since then."

One such gigantic Greek Tortoise, known as "Jim the Jerk" (it's an affectionate nickname, Rood swears), will be one of the show's featured attractions. The cranky old male just last year helped to father quintuplets after a lifetime of less than amorous behavior around plenty of females.

Rood dedicates herself to educating people about turtles and proper tur-

tle ownership, emphasizing that owing a tortoise or turtle is a long-term commitment.

"Not all people know or realize that, and so they get something little for a pet and then they're caught off-guard when it grows into something huge," she said. 'That's when they have to call me."

Another point Rood stresses is that pet turtles need natural habitats.

"I always say aquariums are for fish and artificial light is for plants," she said, the tension in her voice evident as she recalled cases she has seen where a turtle's growth was limited to the point of deformity by being kept in an undersized glass tank.

Rood expects the show to draw a good crowd to Belle Cooledge Library; she said mails about 850 newsletters four times a year to the membership of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club, with mailers going as far away as New York, Florida, and even the United Kingdom.



Cruising on an active, busy K Street

Back in the 1950s and '60s Sacramento seemed a much different place.

Its population totaled only about 150,000. The downtown area featured no tall buildings. The Sacramento Convention Center did not exist, so all of the main streets ran one-way up to, or down from, Front Street on the Sacramento River.

On Saturday nights, kids did things like going to drive-in movies, enjoying rock and roll at high school dances or pulling in for a burger and a shake at their local drive-in restaurant.

And, oh yes, they headed downtown to cruise K Street.

During those times, K Street was a really happening place: a one-way street cutting right up the middle of the sleepy Capitol city. So, every Saturday night, teenagers drove their cars – some hot, some not – down to K Street to cruise.

This made for a scene right out of "American Graffiti." You saw every kind of car: shiny blue and white 1957 Chevrolets, fast, red Ford convertibles, hot rod model A's, and maybe even my 1963 Volkswagen beetle.

People cruised K Street for a lot of different reasons.

The guys with the cool cars wanted to show off their rides. They sped from one light to the next. Then, as their engines idled, they revved them up loudly. The noisier, the better. When the light turned from red to green, they peeled out leaving a line of rubber on the street. Sometimes they raced other cars from one light to the next.

Fortunately, with lights on almost every street, you couldn't get going too fast, so accidents rarely oc-

The police, however, had different ideas about how much noise cars should make or how fast they should go. Drivers always ran the risk of getting a ticket for exhibition of speed or just making too much noise.

This seemed to have little effect on the cruisers.

Another reason for cruising K street was to meet, or to pick up girls.

I did that pretty often, usually cruising in my VW with my friend Jim Ducray. He seemed to have a way with words that attracted the girls. When we did meet some girls, we got them to follow us back to Janey Way, or to some older friend's apartment or maybe even over to the Mel's Drive-in on 19th and I Street.

It was all pretty harmless fun. This was before the "sexual revolution," and

hey, we were only in our teens.

It was a lot more innocent time.

Whatever your reason was for cruising K Street, you almost always had good time. Sometimes fights took place, but the police were there to settle disputes quickly. You never heard of guns being fired. The really bad boys might occasionally flash a switch-blade knife, but stabbings too, rarely happened.

These days, times have changed a lot in Sacramento.

It has grown to nearly 500,000 residents: almost a big city. Kids have a lot more things to do: going to River Cats games, attending rock concerts, or seeing movies at a multitheatre complex.

Back in the old days, we had to make a lot of our own fun. Now the days of swinging and swaying on lower K have become just another Janey Way memory.

Pioneer cemetery once sat at the site of East Sacramento's Sutter Middle School

Editor's Note: This is part one of a two-part series regarding the history of East Sacramento's former New Helvetia Cem-

When it comes to local history, many longtime Sacramentans can proudly tell those of younger generations how they remember when East Sacramento's Sutter Middle School, which is located south of McKinley Park at the corner of Alhambra Boulevard and J Street, was the site of a city park. But few people today can recall seeing the site during its pre-park years.

It is somewhat ironic that the only evidence at this site relating to this earlier era is a tombstone-like marker, which describes the property's former existence as a pioneer cemetery, which included many large markers.

Indeed, a full-fledged cemetery, complete with stone and wooden headstones and large monuments, once covered the site where the school grounds are located today, as is evident by the information provided on the non-cemetery marker which sits along the fence line of the school's Alhambra Boulevard side – as well as a variety of historical documentations.

The fact that the cemetery was established in the 1840s as the burial plot of Sutter's Fort is sufficient enough information for one who has at least a general understanding of Sacramento's roots to realize that the school sits on one of the city's most histor-

Referred to in some references as being initially called the "Sutter Fort Burying Ground," this former, private 20-acre cemetery, which was renamed the New Helvetia Cemetery in 1850 in recognition of its location within Captain John Sutter's Mexican land grant by the same name, became the burial place of deceased pioneers of the

According to an article in the Nov. 12, 1873 edition of The Sacramento Union, after some confusion as to who was the first person to be buried at the cemetery, it was deter-

mined that this notoriety belonged to Major Cloud, a paymaster in the United States Army, who died in July or August 1847 - a day after falling off his horse about a half-mile southeast of Sutter's Fort.

Also significant in the cemetery's history was the existence of a burial site that included the remains of many of the victims who died during the city's cholera epidemic of 1850.

In the northeast corner of the cemetery was property designated for Chinese buri-

This area was divided into four, 50-foot by 50-foot sections, two of which were surrounded by iron fences and the other two with wooden fences. And in each lot was a furnace for burning clothing and property of the deceased and incense.

The cemetery was purchased from Sutter by Dr. R.H. McDonald in 1850, and

seven years later, it was sold to J.W. Reeves.

During Reeves' ownership of the New Helvetia Cemetery, in 1860, it was reported by The Union that the cemetery had totaled 420 interments.

Reeves later deeded the cemetery to the city of Sacramento for use as a public cem-

In 1885, the cemetery was overhauled, as very large trees that were believed to detract from the beauty of the burial grounds were removed, smaller trees were trimmed, weeds were cut down, driveways were improved and aging redwood markers were refurbished.

A year after the cemetery's major facelift, however, the Sacramento Record-Union reported that the writing on many redwood markers had been "obliterated by the rains

Cemetery: First cemetery occupant was buried in 1847, after fall from horse

of succeeding winters" and in one corner of the property, headboards "blackened with age" stood so close together that they had the appearance of a "stubble field" a field where plant material such hay has been cut and left with short stubble.

On May 12, 1887, the Record-Union described the cemetery as being under the management of Nicholas Mohns, who was reported to have prided himself in "keeping everything scrupulously neat."

During the same time, Mohns, who resided at 2830 O St., was also in charge of the Jewish cemetery, which was established on the opposite side of J Street in 1850.

Although there is no complete record of the interments of the New Helvetia Cemetery in existence, various records reveal the names of those who were buried at the cemetery.

For instance, preserved in the 1909 "Souvenir History of the First Methodist Episcopal Church" - a book written for the 60th anniversary of the church – is a biography of the Rev. Elijah Merchant, a pioneer preacher and pastor whose ashes were placed in the New Helvetia Cemetery 153 years ago.

A rare photograph from the cemetery appears in the book and features Merchant's old headstone, which was engraved with the words: "Elijah Merchant, member of the Cala Conference, Died at Los Angeles, Oct. 26, 1857, aged 28 years, 'I have fought a good fight."

The book also notes that the ashes of other preachers who participated in the annual "California Conference," which was referred to on Merchant's headstone, were consecrated within the same plot at the cemetery.

Additionally, the 1909 First M.E. Church book refers to a then-current and now historical part of the cemetery's history, the possible removal of the cemetery.

Due to flooding during the cemetery's early years and eventual development in the area, discussions regarding the abandonment and potential elimination of the cemetery continuously resurfaced.

The cemetery officially operated until 1912, despite the fact that the city had previously discouraged any future burials at this cemetery and suggested that many of the existing remains at this site be relocated.

In the midst of the wellpublicized efforts to transform the cemetery into a park, the city purchased the Chinese portion of the cemetery for \$3,020 in 1917 and the Chinese remains were removed.

Work to eliminate tombstones from the old cemetery for a future park resulted in only 15 tombstones being present at the site in early July

Although the park plan was approved by the city's park board in January 1920, efforts to replace the site's monuments with small markers was a lengthy process, as nine graves still had monuments on them as late as July 1922.

The remaining tombstones were eventually removed and

the park became known as Helvetia Park.

However, the fact that most of the graves were still located at the park was not entirely lost, as the park remained a cemetery, included markers, and many of the city's annual directories listed the site as Helvetia Cemetery Park.

The site remained a park until the early 1950s, and in the mid-1950s, the remains of 5,235 people were

removed from the park and relocated to other local cemeteries, in anticipation of the construction of Sutter Junior High School - presently Sutter Middle School – at 3150 I St.

Summer barbeques, bathing suits, boating...the buzz of mosquitoes

With the warm weather upon us, the buzzing of mosquitoes is everywhere. Late rains and hot temperatures create the ideal conditions for mosquitoes to breed. Mosquitoes are not only annoying, but they can also transmit serious diseases like West Nile vi-

You can prevent mosquitoes and protect yourself from bites by following these tips:

- Mosquitoes need water to live; they especially like water that is dirty and not moving. Drain all sources of water around your home that may become a fertile breeding ground for mosquitoes.
- + At least once a week, walk around your property and check around your yard for any containers that may collect water. Empty all buckets, flower pots, children's toys, cans or wheel barrows.

- + If you are going to enjoy the outdoors around dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active, dress appropriately in pants and a light long sleeved shirt to prevent mosquitoes from biting you.
- Any time you're outdoors when mosquitoes are out; protect your skin from mosquito bites by using an effective insect repellent. There are many varieties of repellent including lotions, sprays, oils, towelettes, etc. Repellents have various active ingredients such as DEET, Picaridin, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus, and IR3535 (from the AVON products). The most important thing to look for in a repellent is the percentage of the active ingredient which can range from five percent and up. The more active ingredient it contains, the longer it will keep you protected and will need to re-apply less often. For example, if a repellent has seven per-

cent of the active ingredient, this will provide approximately two to three hours of protection. You may also consider the activity you will be engaging in. For example, an everyday walk to the park will require a lower percentage of the active ingredient however if you are going camping where there are other biting insects, a stronger repellent will be necessary.

- Do not over water your lawn and utilize yard waste containers for grass clippings and other
- · Change water in pet dishes and bird baths frequently.
- · Stock ornamental ponds, fountains and animal water troughs with mosquito fish.
- Dispose of old tires in your back yard.
- Keep hot tubs or spas clean or covered.
- · Run the filter and skimmer in your swimming pool to keep it





College Greens Gators a founding team in the Sacramento Suburban Swim League

It's not whether you win or lose; it's how you play the game. There is no "I" in team. It's not the size of the dog in the fight, it's the size of the fight in the dog. These are some of the mottos that could apply to the College Greens Gators recreational swim team in East Sacramento.

The Gators, founded in 1965, are the smallest team in the eight-team Sacramento Suburban Swim League. And while the relatively small size of the team may keep the Gators from scoring as many points as the larger squads, the 162 members at College Greens (roughly half of which reside in East Sacramento, the others come from Arden and the surrounding area) continue to thrive in the water while setting different goals beyond just winning and losing.

This year the team is much better," said Coach Pat Daniels. "There are more things in place to improve the team.

Daniels, who is in his second year as coach of the Gators, said that the team has been able to retain more swimmers than in past years. The team has had problems in the past with members quitting the team.

The Gators may not pose a significant threat to the teams with 300-400 members, but Daniels has implemented ways for his swimmers to be successful.

"What we take away (from competition) is individual im-

provement," he said. "We may also shoot to score a certain amount of points in a certain age group." He also said that he and swimmers will set goal times rather than worry about the

> competition. "If we reach our goal times, it will result in scoring points."

He also posts the "Top 10" times in the previous year's championship meet in different events so that the kids have something to shoot for that they can see.

Daniels swam in the very same league when he was a

child (for the El Dorado Hills Tazmanian Devils, nicknamed the "Taz") before moving on to swim for the Sierra Marlins Swim Team (SMST) year round when he was 14. He went on to swim at Oak Ridge High School and for two years at UC Davis.

After each team faces off head to head with the other seven team in the league, the season ends with a league championship meet at Sierra College that includes all eight teams competing together. With less than half of the members of some of the other teams, the Gators

simply cannot score enough points to come out on top as a team, but that doesn't mean that the team is without gifted swimmers.

One such swimmer, whom Daniels said consistently wins her races, is 15-year-old Morgan McClure. McClure, who recently finished her freshman year at Rio Americano High School, has been in the water since she was only four years old. She learned how to swim with the Gators up until the age of eight. She com-

peted with the Arden Hills Swim Team, a USA Swimming team, from ages eight to 14 and is now in her second year back with the Gators.

McClure still holds four all-time team records in her age group from when she was eight years old and younger and holds six records in the 13-14 age group.

While she may very well be one of the best swimmers on the team (if not the best), Mc-Clure is quick to push away any praise heaped in her direction.

"I just go to practice and work hard," she said. "I guess I have some natural ability, but (success) comes from training."

She also enjoys the social aspect and family atmosphere of the College Greens Swim and Racquet Club where the team practices.

"It's a really nice community. Everyone is friendly and no one is ever left out," she said. "I've made a lot of friends in my time here as well."

McClure's mother Linda was a member of the Gators from ages of 10 to 18. Linda said she moved to Sacramento when she was nine or ten and swam all the way up until the age cut-off at 18. She also remarked on the family vibe at the club and that it has a nice community atmosphere.

The team does a few fundraisers throughout the year in order to pay for some team expenses, according to team president Tom Monette.

"We have an adult social for the parents as well as a Swima-thon where kids swim as many laps as they can in a certain amount of time and there are pledges made per lap," he said.

This year's Swim-a-thon took place on July 6.

Many of the current team members have parents and siblings who swam for the team years ago. The Gators are made up of seven different age levels (6 and under, 7-8, 9-10, 11-12, 13-14, 15-16 and 17-18).




