


The Army proved greatly beneficial to me. I came back a more mature and enlightened person. I was ready for my return to Sac State.

Once there, I excelled, making the Dean's Honor List three of my last four semesters. I graduated with honors, in June of 1975 thanks to great professors like Ken Donaldson (history), Alex Garber and Tom Kando (Sociology) and Marc Bertanasco (English).

My academic experience benefited me immediately at my work with the State of California. I soon earned a promotion from Statistical Clerk to Research Analyst. My education did more for me than that. It helped me continuously advance throughout my state career. Now, my time attending Sacramento State College, the school right across from my home, is just another, inspirational Janey Way memory.



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

# **Innovative management, modern upgrades** keep historic Dante Club 'Forever Young'

**By BONNIE OSBORN** 

It seems Joy Reinhardt, general manager of Sacramento's historic Dante Club, was destined for a career feeding and entertaining guests, as hard as she fought against that path in her youth.

Her father was a chef who served as personal chef for a Saudi prince in Riyadh for 20 years; her mother was a waitress, and her stepfather owned a beer and wine bar. "I swore I would never go into hospitality," Reinhardt recalls today. "My parents were both militant about teaching me how to cook, testing me on different flavors. I couldn't help myself: I grew up in the business."

After growing up in Redding and following a military career that took her to Germany and Belgium and a foray as a Washington, DC, restaurateur, Reinhardt wound up back in her home state, where she's spent the past couple of years shepherding Sacramento's venerable Italian social club, site of countless weddings, anniversaries, reunions and holiday parties, to new exciting new growth.

Dante Club, which will celebrate its 80th anniversary in 2016, has undergone a series of updates and renovations under Reinhardt's management. Improvements include updated lighting, new carpeting, a new flagstone walkway leading to the venue's beautiful outdoor gazebo and more. "My first vision was to add some sparkle here and there while preserving the rich tradition of this venue that has played

#### Streetcars? By the numbers...

(the latest of 5 blogs about streetcars in Sac)

The Numbers: 1,1,2,60 and 15 (One, One, Two, Sixty; Fifteen) One: That's the number of streetcars that travel at a time; not 2 or 3 cars strung together as you'll often see with Light Rail.

*One:* That's the number of dollars it will take to ride the Streetcar. **Two:** Your ticket would be good for 2 hours

*Sixty:* That's the number of people that 1 street car can transport.

And Fifteen: That's how often Streetcars will come by your stop, about once every 15 minutes. MORE NUMBERS... 1.67 = 1

\$1.67 a day: That's about what it will cost residential property owners if the assessment district is approved. That works out to approximately 1% of the cost of the project.

So let me get this straight; up to 60 people per trip could be traveling throughout the Downtown/Midtown and West Sac com unities. At a cost to residential homeowners of less than 1/2 the cost of a Starbucks coffee!

How many passenger cars will that take off the Downtown/Midtown streets? And what will that cost?

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There's a lot of talk locally about Airbnb (Air Bed and Breakfast), the website for renting temporary lodging. 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



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It has been written in this publication before about Tahoe Park resident Joey Garcia's deep-rooted connectedness with the human experience through her writing for the Sacramento News and Review, teaching at St. Francis High School, and also by the work she does helping children in her home country of Belize.

For years, she heard stories of her home country which prompted her to visit extended family, and by her 30s, she finally did for the first time since a toddler, an experience that kept her coming back. During those vacations, her desire to help others manifested when after 10 years, she formed Rise Up Belize!, which is an advancementthrough-education nonprofit organization that serves fourth through sixth graders by honing their skills at tuition-free academic summer camps. Sacramento-area teachers volunteer to conduct three-day trainings meant to advance the skills of Belizean primary school teachers.

Γ'here is no free education in Belize it's all tuition- and fee-based—so we help Belizean youth pay for high school," she says. "One young Belizean man who received an RUB scholarship is now a police officer, another is in law school. One young woman who received an RUB scholarship is a nurse, another is a teacher. It's exciting to make a difference, one person at a time."

Training for teenagers in the Rise Up Belize! Academy of Student Teachers includes workshops in cultural competency, curriculum development and classroom management, facilitated by experienced

Airbnb started in San Francisco in the 2008 election year when roommates Brian Chesky and Joe Gebbis couldn't afford their flat rent. They got three air mattresses, placed them on the livingroom floor, and advertised. They also served partisan, election year cereal breakfasts--Obama O's or Captain Mc Cain's, and thus launched their now world-wide business.

You don't have to make special cereals if you do Airbnb these days. The coffee and muffin is enough, and you don't even have to do that.

Before joining the Dante Club event team in 2014, Reinhardt's early career path took her far afield. After her military service, Reinhardt landed in Washington, DC, and joined the staff of the local Hard Rock Café, where she served as manager for five years. TRUTH The MPAA has rated this R

Sony Pictures Classics brings us "Truth", a drama set in 2004 in the New York CBS newsrooms where the television show "60 Minutes" is produced. Writer and director James Vanderbilt based his screenplay on the Mary Mapes book "Truth and Duty: The Press, The President, and The Privilege of Power".

Mapes is the central figure in this story of a woman holding the highest ideals of producing whilst struggling to get out the truth in the corporate structure of television news, which remains influenced, if not controlled, by big money. Mary Mapes is played by Cate Blanchett, and the movie opens with a visit to an attorney, which will set in motion the story, told in flashback.

Mapes produced many pieces with long time friend and legendary broadcaster, Dan Rather. Famously, it is the controversy over one of the most long running and respected news magazine format programs in the history of television, "60 Minutes" in which she and Rather were involved, that created her undoing. Alternately known as "Rathergate" or "Memogate", it was a controversy over what was known as the Killian documents. These six documents related to President George W. Bush's time served in the Texas Air National Guard in 1972 and 1973. This movie tells the story of the discovery of the documents, and how CBS, under Mapes direction, presented them.

Playing Dan Rather is Robert Redford. While he looks nothing like Rather, he has captured the newsman's verbal phrasing perfectly, and a strange thing begins to occur as you watch the picture. Both iconic men are similar in age and stature, and after a while your mind swaps one iconic face for the other, and you forget you are watching Redford. Seems Redford still has the chops.

From this moment on the picture deals with the discovery of the documents, and the subsequent investigation of them by the news department under Mapes' direction. Along the way you'll encounter solid performances by Dennis Quaid, Topher Grace, Dermot Mulroney, Mad Men's Elisabeth Moss, and that great scene stealer, Stacy Keach as Lt. Colonel Bill Burkett, who was the source of the documents in question.

As the investigation continues, the once central pieces of evidence are discredited after the story ran on television. The Killian documents were found to be forged, after the additional analysis of typography and type-writer experts. Things become difficult for Mapes and the pressure is on, prompting a visit from Dan Rather who tells her something she does not want to hear.

This is a terrific movie with solid and great performances, engaging and thoughtful. Everything comes together as it should, which so rarely happens with movies. It is a reminder that you really can't believe what you read or see in the media, and that all news should be carefully considered before digested. This really is Cate Blanchett's movie, she is fantastic, and you should not miss it.
