Dec. 12 event to benefit kids at Sutter Memorial Children's Hospital

The Christmas season is a time of hope. All around the community, there are sounds of good tidings and cheer – and the hope for peace in every heart.

When one is walking through the Valley of the Shadow, however, it is sometimes hard to realize that the Good Shepherd is there. That others do, indeed, care.

Nicole and George Carollo of Sacramento are reminded of this every December, when they celebrate their oldest daughter's life in a special way. They have turned a personal tragedy into something that gives hope to others.

In 2004, little Rosalia Ann Carollo lost her battle with a catastrophic childhood illness – a rare childhood epilepsy called infantile spasms. She was almost two years old. George and Nicole were devastated. It

was a loss they never anticipated.

Three years after Rosie's death, Nicole and George came upon a way to celebrate Rosie's life with their family and the community at large.

"George and I were walking through the neighborhood, looking for ideas on light decorations for our new house, and an idea came to us," Nicole said. "We noticed that some families had barrels in their front yards for food donations by those who would come by to enjoy the Christmas lights. We thought, 'Let's do something for Rosie. Let's do toys and give them to the children at Sutter Memorial Children's Hospital."

So, with just a sign on the lawn and one email, the Carollos started their first annual Rosie Carollo Christmas Lights and Toy Drive in 2007. The results were astounding.

"We had 741 items donated that one night," Nicole said. "And \$236 in cash donated also. George and I looked at each other and said, 'Wow, look at what Rosie has done!"

Each year following has brought more donations of toys and funds for the Child Life program at Sutter Memorial – a total of nearly 2,500 items and \$3,676. The Car-

ollo family hands out cookies and hot chocolate while taking donations of new and unwrapped toys that are later delivered to the children's hospital.

Several hundred guests show up every year to enjoy the light show, quaff some hot chocolate and donate a toy to help a hospitalized child. It has become quite a community event.

This year's display includes a full size nativity scene, flying reindeer, a

Former Sacramento Solons umpire, World War II veteran reminisces about his eventful life

Many longtime Sacramento area residents have fond memories of attending baseball games at the original ball park at the corner of Riverside Boulevard and Broadway. And among such locals whose memories extend to America's pre-World War II era in the capital city, they almost undoubtedly have seen Roseville resident P.R. "Tony" Tonelli.

Although the name Tony Tonelli is not a familiar name for the majority of local baseball fans of this era, those who attended baseball games at this local stadium at just about any time during the years 1939 to 1941, likely have at least a vague recollection of seeing Tony.

This is a certainty when considering that Tony was a regular at these games, as he called balls and strikes from behind home plate, which was located at what is now the northwest corner of the Target parking lot.

At 88 years old, Tony admits that many of his memories of his days of working as a Pacific Coast League umpire have faded with time.

Love of the game

But that does not take away his love for this part of his life or his place in the grand history of baseball in Sacramento.

As a baseball city, Sacramento was once home to a large, 10,000-seat, mostly wooden stadium that was home to the Pacific Coast League's Sacramento Senators or Solons, depending upon the era.

Originally known as Moreing Field and later receiving the name Sacramento Ball Park, then Cardinal Field, Doubleday Park and lastly Edmonds Field, the stadium stood at the corner of Riverside Boulevard and Broadway from 1922 to 1948. A second Edmonds Field opened at the same Land Park site in 1949.



It was the first Edmonds Field, however, where Tony spent three seasons working behind the plate.

As a PĈL umpire, Tony never resided in Sacramento, as he instead lived in Oakland, which was one of the six California cities that were home to PCL teams.

Although the league consisted of eight teams, includ-

ing teams in Portland and Seattle, Tony said that he only umpired games in California.

In addition to its teams in Sacramento, Oakland, Portland and Seattle, the league, during this time, included teams from San Francisco, Los Angeles, Hollywood and San Diego.

Among the Sacramento players who Tony recently re-

called from his years of umpiring were: Art Garibaldi, Gene Handley, Robert "Buddy" Blattner, Walker Cooper, Al Sherer, George "Red" Munger, Max "Milo" Marshall, Herman Franks and Averett "Tommy" Thompson.

Tony, who was born and raised in Cottonwood, Ariz. by his parents, northern Italy immigrants Peter Tonelli and Julia (Arigoni) Tonelli, also recalled Pepper Martin, the former Major League All-Star who became Sacramento's manager in 1941.

Although Tony does not immediately recall the names of former Sacramento players and managers, he was certainly quick to name Dominic "Dom" DiMaggio as his alltime favorite baseball player.

Dom DiMaggio, who was the brother of the legendary New York Yankees slugger Joe Dimaggio, played for the PCL's San Francisco Seals from 1937 to 1939. He later had a lengthy Major League Baseball career with the Boston Red Sox.

Despite maintaining a longtime involvement in baseball, Tony said that he did not play baseball during his childhood.

"I was probably 19 when I first started playing baseball," Tony said. "I was a catcher. My father passed away when he was 42 in 1932 and I was the only boy. I was 10 years old at the time. I had two sisters, Margaret and Mary, and one half-sister, Eleanor. We

Tonelli: A baseball umpire in pre-WWII Japan was viewed as 'upper class'

owned a motel - we called them cabins back then - so, I had to help my mother out with the business.

Tony said that his road to becoming an umpire included his coaching of a youth team in Southern California.

"There were about three complexes in the area and all the kids had one team and we were undefeated for two years," Tony said. "I wish I could remember the name of the kid that was on the team, but he ended up playing on, I think it was the San Diego Padres. His (batting) average in Major League Baseball was about .280."

Pre-WWII ump in Japan

Tony said that his time as an umpire began through his friendship with a man, named Chris, whose last name, to the best of Tony's knowledge, is spelled, "Peliciutus."

"(Chris) asked me to be an official at a baseball game at Korakuen Stadium in Tokyo," Tony said. "He said, 'I have letters from people over there who would like to see an American umpire. So, we went to Japan. I was (umpiring) behind the plate and (Chris) was (umpiring) at first base. That was something. There were probably 10,000 people there. I naturally got butterflies and so did Chris, but we thought it was great."

Tony said that Chris wanted him to work as the home plate umpire due to his ability to speak Japanese.

"I spoke enough Japanese to get by, so that's why I went behind the plate," Tony said.

In addition to learning English and Italian in his childhood home, Tony developed a fascination with languages at a young age and he eventually learned Japanese, Spanish and Portuguese.

Although he was only working as a guest umpire for one game, Tony said that there was nonetheless added pressure to be accurate on his calling of balls and strikes.

Japanese are very fanatic about being precise on their calls and umpires are considered upper class in Japan," Tony said.

Due to his friendship and baseball experience with Chris, Tony, who also umpired community baseball games in Southern California, was asked by Chris to be a PCL umpire. And to become qualified for this position, he spent six weeks attending an umpire school in Florida.

World War II

Tony's time as a PCL umpire ended with the U.S. involvement in World War II.

Having joined the Navy on June 6, 1939, Tony said that he was called to sea in 1942.

"I had orders (from the Navy) to go to sea," Tony re-called. "I went aboard the U.S.S. Saratoga, CV-3, which went from Long Beach to the Pacific, between the states and Hawaii. I was aboard the ship for two and a half years.

Tony's subsequent duties included assignments on the USS Midway, USS Coral Sea, USS Ticonderoga and a converted carrier, known as USS Salvo Island.

Altogether Tony spent 42 years in the Navy and also worked as an attorney at law and was a dedicated parliamentarian.

Today, Tony enjoys spending time with his wife Dorothy, participating in USS Saratoga Association and Fleet Reserve Association of the West Coast Region gath-

erings and annually donating funds to Easter Seals.

Reminiscing about many experiences in life, Tony said, "In knowing what I did, I'd do it all over again. That's how much I loved the work that I did."







Roller derby in the halls of Phoebe Hearst School

Roller derby first appeared on local television in 1961. It featured teams with names like: the San Francisco Bay Bombers, Portland's Rose City Rollers and the San Diego Thunderbirds.

They played weekly on a local UHF television station. The four man teams, two blockers and two jammers, thundered around a short, elevated, banked, wood track. The goal of the competition involved

getting the smaller jammers past the big and brutish blockers which resulted in points scored.

Competitors sometimes flew right off the elevated track into the fans. We marveled at the athleticism of the skaters and the violence of the head-knocking competition.

So, naturally, we had to have our own roller derby matches.

We held our roller derby events in the smooth cement halls of Phoebe Hearst elementary school. Our track started in the covered hallway running down the center of the school, then turned right into the open pathway running in front of the classrooms, rounded the side of the building then up the pathway along the back of the

classrooms, only to return the covered center hallway.

We played four man teams just like the real roller derby: using the big boys as blockers and the smaller boys as jammers. Games lasted four quarters and the team with the most points in the end, won the competition.

Because the front and rear classroom hallways were so narrow, virtually all the passing took place on the wide, covered, center hallway. This made for some bone-bruising spills, but no serious injuries ever occurred. However, we often suffered scrapes, bruises and cuts in these enthusiastic competitions. I recall bouncing right off the walls of the building into oncoming

skaters which led to bodies flying all over the halls of the school.

By the end of a hard-fought match, we were fully ready for a trip over to Bossie's Drive-in or to the A&W root beer stand for a tall soda pop where we reviewed the events of the day and argued over which team actually won or lost the match – no champagne for the winners of the roller derby.

Eventually, like all things in the world, roller derby left the Sacramento airwaves and we lost interest in playing the sport. This probably spared us from suffering some sort of serious injury.

But the passage of time has not blurred the memories I have of these competitions - another bone-bruising Janey Way memory.



Edwards Break flood of 1904 caused sudden chaos for Riverside-Pocket area residents

It has been more than a century since a sudden flood caught Riverside-Pocket area residents by surprise and left them with

complete disillusionment as to where they would go from their flooded homes and how they would sur-

This flood, which was known as the Edwards Break, began at the sharp

turn of the Sacramento River, near what is today the intersection of Sutterville and Riverside roads.

Four-legged levee de-

This tragedy happened as a result of a levee being weakened due to the burrowing of gophers and squirrels.

During a heavy storm on Feb. 27, 1904, water penetrated the burrows to the extent that the water's force caused the levee to break and flood the area.

Due to the magnitude of the flood, news about this occurrence spread beyond the Sacramento area.

One such report was a Feb. 29, 1904 article in The San Francisco Call, which included the following words regarding the flood: "The fact is, simply, that there has been a bad break in Reclamation District 535 (later known as Reclamation District

673), south of (Sacramento), and that it has flooded probably 10,000 acres of the richest land in the

This break was wide enough that large objects such as boats and a barge entered the opening of the break and flowed down into the Pocket.

In one incident, the home of Antone Perry, who resided on the present day Park Riviera Way with his

family across from today's Lewis Park, was struck by the aforementioned barge.

Traveling southward on the floodwaters, the barge made a sudden, swirling turn and then sharply struck the back corner of the Perry home, which was thus forced off of its foundation.

Present within the home during this incident were Antone, his wife Amelia, and their six children.

Another very notable house in the Pocket was the home of Manuel Seamas, owner of the area's well known Grangers Dairy.

As a result of the Edwards Break, the Seamas house was flooded up to the ledge of the first floor window, which was located about 5 feet from the ground.

The flood also toppled the ornate, white, wooden fence that bordered the Seamas property and ruined the family's renowned, spacious gardens, where gala parties were held with many guests.

Selfless acts of heroism

Although the majority of the residents' animals were drowned in the flood, fortunately, with the exception of a man who was killed at the site of the levee break, those living in the area were able to survive this tragedy.

This fact was made possible through the selfless

efforts of various men of the area.

Upon seeing the water rising to a dangerous level, men in the Riverside-Pocket area used their rowboats to rescue people who were stranded in their homes.

One such man was John Machado, who was known as "Jaoa Alvert" ("John Albert").

Taking his rowboat from an area near his front porch, Machado transported his wife and infant daughter to the Reichmuth dairy area on high ground, which is known today as South Land Park Hills.

Machado then proceeded back to the Pocket to rescue area residents and take them to higher ground on the levee, where others had their homes. One of these homes was the home of his in-laws, Antone Perry, Sr. – the father of the aforementioned Antone Perry – and Mary Gloria Perry.

Machado, who was a tall, strong man, joined other men from the area who rowed their boats throughout the night in their efforts to bring stranded residents to higher ground.

Individual emergency preparedness

Although the Edwards Break flood took Riverside-Pocket area residents by surprise, this did not mean that they were without preparation for such a tragedy.

With an impending break of the levee in mind, the local rescuers referred to above, purposely kept their rowboats nearby their homes.

Additionally, most of the area's homes were constructed with two levels with the lower level being for a cool storage area for perishable food and also possibly the kitchen area, which included a wood burning stove and perhaps a coal oil stove.

The upper level of such homes consisted of bedrooms, which were separated by a hallway that led to the front porch and stairway.

Some families in the area had their rowboats attached directly to these upstairs porches.

Area families were also educated with the knowledge of how to help save their homes during a severe flood.

One such method was to lean out a home's upper windows or porch and break the lower windows with heavy objects or tools that were tied to long ropes.

The purpose of this action was to purposely flood the first floor, instead of running the risk of having the house carried away in the floodwaters.

Built on higher ground

In addition to the construction of ground level, two-story houses in the area, some people in the area also prepared for possible major floods by bringing in soil and building their homes on mounds.

On some occasions, soil for such houses was provided via dredgers that were used to build and repair the local levees and keep the river channel open for passenger and freight boats.

A dredger's leverman would swing the boom, which transported large buckets of silt and soil, over the top of the levee and deposit the soil on the property. The soil would then be leveled to the desired height of the home builder.

Pocket historian Dolores Greenslate said that she believes that among the area's residents who built their houses on mounds was a Portuguese man, named Joe Lewis. This belief appears to be factual when considering that Lewis was known by the nickname, "Joe da Cabeco" ("Joe of the Top of the Hill").

Following the break in the levee, several weeks passed before the floodwaters finally receded and people were able to return to their homes.

The most fortunate people of the flood proved to be

those who prepared themselves by having their entire living quarters on the second level of their homes.

For those who kept their homes in this manner, their post flood work only involved repairing the foundations of their houses and their ground level, cool storage area.

Fortunately, unlike the people who resided in the Riverside-Pocket area during the flood of 1904, with the strengthening and higher level of the levees, people living in this area today are no longer constantly worried each winter about the possibility of major flooding.
