

McClatchy High School student chosen as concert master of Sacramento Youth Symphony Premier Orchestra

Concerto winner Ariana Fong has been playing the violin since she was five years

Fong has competed and won many solo competitions. Most recently, she was chosen as Concert Master for the 2011 Winter Concert, performed by the Sacramento Youth Symphony Premier Orchestra.

"I didn't choose the violin," Fong said. "My sister, who is older, started out on violin and ended up not liking it very much, so it got passed down to me.

"The violin fits me, I am open, loud, opinionated and I like my voice to be heard just like the violin likes to be heard in an orchestra," Fong said.

Fong said she practices the violin an hour each day during the week and three hours on Saturday and Sunday.

Wistfully, she says she had to give up tennis, one of her loves, because it was just too much of a time commitment to play tennis and play the vi-

Fong said as much as she loves playing the violin, she

does not plan on studying it at college. She said she would like to continue playing the violin on the side. Her goal is to either become a dentist or a civil engineer like her mom. though she is leaning towards dentistry. She has been accepted to the University of the Pacific in Stockton.

Fong, like many orchestra players who are violinists, had to work her way up to be becoming a concert master. She has been a part of the Premiere Orchestra for four years. She started out her freshman year of high school as a second violinist, she then moved up to first violinist. Later she became an associate concert master and last year moved up to concert master.

Fong said it takes a lot of experience to get to this point. She said you have to really want to play the music perfectly the first time.

She says she does not get nervous during a performance, but she does get nervous the whole month before the performance.

"The moments before I go on stage is torture," Fong said. "As a violinist, I have to rely on muscle memory to get through a concert."


Ariana Fong has been selected to be the concert master for the Sacramento Youth Symphony Premier Orchestra.

Veteran orchestra conductor shares details about his career in music

Maestro Michael Neumann sat down with *The Land Park* News – the community newspaper published closest to his Curtis Park home – last week to discuss his career in classical music.

During his exclusive interview with this publication, Michael presented a chronological summary of his personal musical journey, which began in Durban, South Africa.

Michael said that he was born in South Africa, because his parents, Gary and Lilo Neumann, had fled there during World War II.

ing World War II.

"I was the son of basically refugees from the Holocaust," Michael said. "They came from (Berlin) Germany and went to South Africa.

"There are many, many young people in Sacramento and the surrounding vicinity who want to play music, and especially now with the school systems, as many schools don't even have an orchestra, because of the budget cuts, etc. We provide a very high quality musical education for our young people."

That's why I was born there (in South Africa in 1948)." a young age by Maria Neuss, the great-great granddaughter of the famous Czech composgained a love for classical music through concerts that he

It was not until the early 1960s that Michael immigrated to America with his

family, which also included his brother, Frank.

Michael's family eventually resided in San Francisco, where Michael was enrolled in the prestigious Lowell High School.

Continuing his schooling through a music scholarship, Michael studied at San Francisco State College (present day San Francisco State University).

During his first semester at San Francisco State, Michael applied for and received a fullride music scholarship from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music for violin performance.

After receiving a bachelor's degree in violin performance at the Cincinnati university, Michael earned a master's degree in orchestral conducting at the same institution.

Shortly after receiving his master's degree, Michael obtained employment with the Birmingham Symphony in Alabama. For about five years during the 1970s, he played in this symphony's first violin section and conducted the Birmingham Youth Symphony.

Michael's longtime connection with Sacramento followed his time with the Birmingham symphonies, as he was hired in 1978 as the assistant conductor and as a violinist in the orchestra for the now-defunct Sacramento Symphony.

A year later, Michael began the first of his 32 years as the conductor of the Sacramento Youth Symphony.

Additionally, Michael continued his work with the Sacramento Symphony, which promoted him as its associate

conductor, a position he obtained in 1989 and continued until the symphony disbanded in 1997.

Fortunately for Michael and the Sacramento Youth Symphony, the youth symphony filed for independence prior to when the Sacramento Symphony was discontinued. The youth symphony became its own nonprofit organization, which is still in existence today and is led by Michael as its artistic director.

Michael, who is the conductor of the youth symphony's premier orchestra, said that he made a very conscious decision to dedicate himself to and develop the youth symphony, which debuted as the Northern California Junior Philharmonic Orchestra in 1956.


"I could have used (the youth symphony) as a stepping stone to look into other situations, but I had family here, etcetera," Michael said. "I thought, 'OK, this is home. I'm going to make this (work) and I'm going to develop and build this orchestra."

With the support of the youth symphony's board, Michael has contributed greatly to the youth symphony's success.

Since the time that Michael became involved with the Sacramento Youth Symphony, the symphony has grown from 55 youth and one orchestra to 400 youth, three 90-piece orchestras, a summer chamber music workshop, flute and clarinet ensembles and a beginning string orchestra, called the Vivace Strings.

And next year, the youth symphony will add a begin-

Michael, who has a wife named Allison and two sons, Gary, who is a guitarist, and Joshua, who plays cello in the nationally touring, major label band, Brandi Carlile (visit www.brandicarlile.com), explained that the Sacramento Youth Symphony, which has performed in several countries outside of the United States, offers a very important educational opportunity for many youth in the Sacramento region.

"There are many, many young people in Sacramento and the surrounding vicinity who want to play music, and especially now with the school systems, as many schools don't even have an orchestra, because of the budget cuts, etcetera, etcetera," Michael said. "Well, we provide a very high quality musical education for our young people."

In addition to his work with the Sacramento Youth Symphony, whose performances have included tribute concerts such as its popular Veterans Day concerts at the Sacramento Memorial Auditorium, Michael is also the music director and conductor of the Folsom Symphony and is occasionally a guest conductor around the country.

As a well accomplished and highly recognized conductor, Michael has received many awards, including the "Arts Educator of the Year" award from the Arts and Business Council of Sacramento - an award which he received last

Michael said that one of his favorite items of recognition that he has received is a handcarved, wooden gate that leads to his former one-car garage, which was converted into his home studio in about 1999.

"There was a gentleman whose daughter took violin (lessons) from me and whose daughter was in the (Sacramento) Youth Symphony and he was so grateful for what I was doing that he said, 'Michael, I do woodwork and I want to make you a gate, because I want to show you how much I appreciate what you do." Michael said. "He said, 'I'll put anything you want on (the gate) and all you have to do is pay for the lumber."

Pointing to the hand-carved portion of his gate, Michael, whose favorite composer is



Beethoven, said with an upbeat tone to his voice, "This is the opening of Beethoven's 9th. This is the violin part."

In reviewing his career in music, Michael said that he is grateful to have spent so many years working in a field that he loves.

There's a certain satisfaction level that I feel (working in music)," Michael said. "When I see people in their work, in their jobs, who hate their work and look at (the clock) and say, 'In another 10 minutes, I'm out of here,' well, I'm never on a podium going, 'In 10 minutes, I'm out of here.' So, I'm grateful to be doing what I've set my mind and my heart to be doing. There's a great deal of satisfaction in that."

For those interested in attending a performance by Maestro Neumann and the Folsom Symphony, the symphony will perform a special concert, called "Land That I Love," at Three Stages at Folsom Lake College, 10 College Parkway, in Folsom on Saturday, May 14 at 7:30 p.m. For tickets and information, call (916) 357-6718 or visit www. folsomsymphony.com.

sister, Francesca, plays the cello. They are members of the Laguna Baptist Church and play as part of the Praise team. Fong plays the piano, electric guitar, drums and the Irish penny whistle for her church. She started taking piano lessons at age three.

When Fong plays during performances she does not concentrate on the notes.

"You either have it or you don't," Fong said. "I think about my surroundings and who is in the audience and how I am feeling at the moment."

Fong graduates from McClatchy High School this spring and said she and her friends plan on playing a contemporary piece at the ceremony.

Fong almost quit the violin four years ago when she switched teachers. Fong's teacher is renowned violinist, Zaven Melikian, a retired professor of violin at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. Fong said he is "really intense."

For almost a year, Fong said Melikian made her play a series of technical exercises. Melikian told her she had to rework her technique. Fong said at first it was discouraging, but in the end it paid off. She realizes now that she needed to practice these exercises for a sound foundation. She said she is really glad she didn't give up. She said she remembers practice being very boring. She also explained how she had to stretch her hand muscles every day and at times it was quite painful.

"Fong is a good student," Melikian said. "She is very talented and an ideal student."

Melikian said he would like to see her continue to study music in college, adding he will be disappointed if she doesn't, but knows it is her choice.

Fong said she had to build up endurance for the bigger

concerts. She said Melikian is like a second father to her, his style and personality is very honest. She said she was really happy when she got through a lesson without any criticism from him because she knew it was genuine.

"I get my joy from performing and showing people what I can do," Fong said.

For fun, Fong said she is involved with her church youth group on Friday nights, leading a small group of girls in discussions.

Fong said her friends finally understand why she can't always do things with them. Many of her friends attended the concert she performed at in February. She said they were impressed.

Fong's next performance will be at a Pops Concert being held on May 7. It will feature the *Star Wars* movie theme, music from the musical *Oklahoma* and the theme from the movie, *Titanic*. She said she loves playing the *Star Wars* theme. Fong said it is a fun, though difficult piece to play.

Sophia Tong, a friend since second grade, said Fong has gone through a lot and sees the passion in Fong when she performs.

"She has determination," Tong said. "She practices every day, but is still thoughtful and sweet. The younger kids at our church want Ariana to teach them how to play the violin."

"My advice for young musicians starting out, is to practice when you don't want to," Fong said. "Nobody likes to practice. It isn't fun, but don't give up."

Fong said playing the violin takes focus and managing your time and not giving up till your perfect.

SMUD Invites Public Input on a Proposed Rate Restructuring

The Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD) is holding a preliminary public hearing, two public workshops, and an additional public hearing to discuss the proposed restructuing of electricity rates. These proposals would not raise system average rates or increase SMUD revenues. Instead, the main proposals will better align SMUD's true cost of electricity with the delivery of power. The open access transmission tariff and distribution wheeling service rate would go to effect July 22, 2011. The retail rate changes would go into effect January 1, 2012.

Most customers would see only minimal impacts to their electric bills on an annual basis. And SMUD rates would remain more than 20 percent below those of PG&E on average.

The General Manager Report and Recommendations include:

- Time-of-use rates for small commercial customers during the summer billing season.
- A modest increase to the system infrastructure fixed charge, which covers
 maintaining poles, wires, customer service and other infrastructure vital to
 reliable service, moving that charge closer to actual costs for small commercial
 and residential customers (except those on the Energy Assistance Program
 Rate).
- Revert to standard residential rates for customers on the Energy Assistance Program Rate instead of discount rates after usage exceeds 600 kilowatt hours in excess of Base Usage allowance.
- Shortening the summer billing season from six months to four months for residential and small commercial customers.
- · Decrease current standard residential kilowatt-hour charges in all months.
- · Decrease current small commercial kilowatt hour charges for all "off-peak" hours.
- Institute a late fee of 1.5 percent of overdue charges.
- Re-word language on bills to more clearly define specific charges.
- Creation of a new tariff for wheeling power across SMUD's distribution lines and other minor clarifications in SMUD's Rules and Regulations.
- Update the open access transmission tariff to provide generating projects with better access to electricity markets outside of SMUD.

Every 15 Minutes program impacts St. Francis campus community

"Dear Mom and Dad,

"Every 15 minutes, someone dies as the result of an alcohol-related collision.

Today, I died, and I never got the chance to tell you..."

Possibly the worst news parents can ever receive is that their child was killed as a result of teens involved in drinking and driving. The number of lives affected is staggering, as is the profound sense of loss... and the waste of lives cut off, too soon...too senselessly.

In an effort to prevent loss of lives and to change student behavior, a partnership of many organizations began in 1995 to bring a program to high school campuses that would show students the

consequences of drunken and now also distracted – driving. The program was titled "Every 15 Minutes," (EFM) because at that time there was an alcohol-related death in a traffic collision every 15 minutes.

On April 5 and 6, the EFM program came to St. Francis High School in Sacramento. The program involved the California Highway Patrol, Sacramento City Fire Department, UC Davis Hospital, the Sacramento County Coronor, the Sacramento Law Enforcement Chaplaincy and a year of planning by a small group of students and staff who worked in secret to plan the day of the initial

The reason for the secrecy is to give students

the opportunity to experience the same emotions they would encounter if confronted with the loss of a loved one, a friend or acquaintance. It involves students seeing a "re-enactment" of a drunk driving crash with a fatality on their campus.

Students were called out of their classrooms after a "shelter in place" security drill and were instructed to go to the softball field by the student parking lot. Blue tarps covered two vehicles. They sat down, wondering what was up.

Suddenly, the tarps came down to reveal a horrific scene of twisted metal, broken glass...and blood.

The young women were riveted. And dead silent.

The enactment followed in the same steps as a real car accident scene, with one notable exception: the event was narrated by a CHP officer, who put every event into context for the teens.

"What you see here won't be real," they were told. "But the emotions you will experience are real.

The Troubies heard a 911 emergency call from an hysterical Troubie driver...saw law enforcement and fire fighters respond to the scene.

They saw a car cut open to extract injured teens. One student was so badly "injured" that a Med-Evac helicopter was called in to rush the student for immediate medical care at UC Davis Hospital. A passenger, who had been "ejected" onto the hood of the car, was covered by the fire fighters with a blanket. She was "dead."


The "drunk" student was subjected to a field sobriety test...which was failed. As happens in many of these situations, the drunk driver only suffered cuts and bruises...but the consequences of one person's decision to drink and drive were devastating.

The outdoor part of the event concluded with one student being sent to the hospital via helicopter, another to UC Davis Hospital by ambulance, one headed to the morgue for identification, others treated for bruises and one student headed to the county jail. The day would continue with one student being removed from class every 15 minutes, and an assembly the next day would mourn the loss of real loved ones who had perished in drunk driving fatalities some also involving texting and driving.

The Troubadours were quiet as they departed. Some looked stunned.

And that was the point - to learn from experience





EFM: Program brings awareness to teens of the consequences of one bad decision

without actually "experiencing" an actual fatality.

Parents who agreed to participate in the EFM program with their daughters were also impacted.

"As parents, we visited our child (Mia) in the hospital. She was seated beside the 'drunk driver' during the accident, and was found to be 'brain dead,' and 'passed away' shortly after the event," said Clarence Macaspac, a Troubie parent. "We were anxious about the 'acting' portion of the program, but the nurse in charge told us that the emotions will come naturally. They did. The experience was genuine, and the emotions were real. This program gave us a taste of losing a child, albeit it was make-believe, but the event was real."

The event was emotionally draining and life-changing for the Macaspac fam-

'(It was an) amazing experience," Macaspac said. I did not think it would affect me that much: (I) had nightmares for two days and stress-related pains. Now we are recovering from the experience and appreciate those who shared with us stories of their losses due to alcoholrelated vehicular accidents. We are now very vigilant against driving in a diminished capacity at all times, reminding and reinforcing

each other's decisions behind the wheel."

Because of the cost of producing this event - which can approach \$50,000 -EFM is only held on the St. Francis campus once every four years. It is paid for with a grant that is available for all high schools. The CHP is in charge of the overall coordination of the grant and insures compliance for the provisions of the grant.

"The EFM program is funded by the Nation-al Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHT-SA), who gives money to the state Office of Traffic Safety (OTS)," explained Michael Bradley, public information officer for the CHP South Sacramento. "OTS then gives the CHP the grant specifications. Each high school throughout the state who wants to run the EFM can apply for the grant through the

One benefit to the community by holding EFM at St. Francis is that it spreads in the crash scene," Dean the program's message throughout the region quickly.

"With St. Francis High School being a private school, there are students from all over the Sacramento region," Bradley said. "Each student is able to take back to their neighborhood friends what they learned and experienced about alcohol/drug and distracted driving related deaths while driving."

According to Aaron Dean, firefighter with Sac City Fire and coordinator of the EFM program, this program saves lives.

"This program has touched many, many students. Often I have students approach me at a local store or restaurant and tell me how they have made different decisions in their lives due to witnessing or participating. Also, parents on the fire department have shared with me they graduated from 'XYZ High School' and volunteer to assist said. "Often times, their children attend the same high school they did or another local Sacramento area high school that participates in this program. This program has a far-reaching effect within families and the commu-

Macaspac agrees. He cited the drop in fatalities since the program began 16 years ago.

"Due to the effectiveness of this program, that every 15 minutes is now down to about every 37 minutes," Macaspac said. "Not that we should rest on our laurels - now or ever.






