

Residents may choose to do either "containerized green waste" pick up OR "loose-in-the-street green waste" pick up. The City is no longer picking up "loose-in-the-street" piles from containerized yard waste customers, however our Solid Waste Division offers eight free "loose-in-the-street" pickups during selected high leaf season weeks throughout the year for all customers.

If you would like to participate in the City Containerized Yard Waste Program or withdraw from the program, please call 311 to enter your request. 
As part of the redistricting process, the City of Sacramento has developed, free to the public, online tools and resources to create, share, and submit district plans to the City.

The tool is available at the City of Sacramento's 2011 Redistricting website http://www.cityofsacramento.org/ redistricting/. The community will have until May 16 to develop and submit plans.

Submissions will be reviewed by the Sacramento Redistricting Citizens Advisory Committee and City Council. The community can continue to participate by attending the Committee meetings or Council meetings.

Every 10 years following the U.S. Census, the City of Sacramento is required to redraw the Council District boundaries to balance the population among eight Council Districts. This process of balancing population is referred to as "redistricting."



Know your neighbor Chris' Cottage Cheese was early business on Broadway

When it comes to telling the history of Broadway, which extends eastward from the Sacramento River to 65th Street, it is important to include details about the Fulster family.

After all, the Fulster family's history as business owners on this historic street dates back to the days when part of what is now Broadway was known as Y Street.

During the Depression – 1933 to be precise – a former Crystal Cream and Butter Co. employee, named Chris Fulster, Sr., opened Chris' Cottage Cheese at 2432 Y St., across the street from a gas station owned by Grady B. Craig and just a block east of the Sacramento Grade A

Milk Producers Association building.

Prior to Chris, Sr.'s opening of his cottage cheese business, local resident Walter Jackson had operated a curtain cleaning business at 2432 Y St. Jackson was managing the same business just a storefront away at 2434 Y St. when Chris, Sr. opened Chris' Cottage Cheese in 1933.

By the time that Chris, Sr. opened his business, he had already worked in the dairy industry for a decade.

Soon after emigrating from Germany at the age of 18 in the early 1920s, Chris, Sr. was hired to work on a dairy farm in Seattle.

In 1932, following three years of working for Crystal at 1013 D St., Chris, Sr. established his own dairy delivery business from his home at 2613 N St. And with his

wife, Alma, a native of Santa Rosa whose parents were from Switzerland, he would



deliver milk, table cream, pastry cream, butter, eggs, cottage cheese and buttermilk.

Chris' Cottage Cheese, which Chris, Sr. operated with Alma and later with his children, Chris Fulster, Jr. and Joan Fulster (now Joan Drake) and various other employees throughout the years, relocated to 2520 Y St. in 1937. And it appears that the business's original building was thensoon demolished, since its address does not appear in city directories after 1936.

Although it has been many years since Chris, Sr. and Alma passed away, fortunately for the sake of history, Chris, Jr., who is approaching his 80th birthday, remembers many details about the second location of his family's cottage cheese business.

"In the front (of the business) were the vats on the left hand side, where we made the cottage cheese," said Chris, Jr., a member of McClatchy High School's January Class of 1950. "In the back was where we had the cream and the separators and we made the buttermilk (for Home Milk and Ice Cream Co. at 1700 21st St.) in the big refrigerator and where we packaged the cottage cheese, and then we had a platform where the truck came in and we dumped in the milk from the milk cans."

In the early years of the business, which also provided cream for the ice cream of Borden's Capital Dairy Co. at 1301 S St., Chris, Sr. would pick up milk from dairies located south of the city, but eventually this work was transferred to Chris, Jr.

The milk was picked up in the early morning hours in 10-

gallon cans from dairymen in Point Pleasant, Bruceville and on Franklin Boulevard, north of the town of Franklin, and placed on a flatbed truck.

Depending upon the day and time of the year, somewhere between about 125 and about 150 cans of milk were picked up from these dairies per day.

Although various people would randomly walk in and purchase cottage cheese directly from the business, Chris' Cottage Cheese was mainly a commercial operation, which delivered to all the major Sacramento groceries stores - Raley's, Stop-N-Shop, Lucky's, Cardinal, etc. except Safeway. Deliveries were also made to Folsom.

Chris, Jr., who also has a sister named Carol (Fulster) Schauer, a wife named Mary, two sons, Chris III and Craig, and three grandsons, Craig, Ir., Chase and Skyler, said that his sister, Joan, dedicated a lot of her time demonstrating products at local grocery stores.

In being that Chris' Cottage Cheese concentrated on a single product, the business was able to reach such a high degree of excellence with its cottage cheese manufacturing that it won 17 California State Fair gold medal awards for making the best cottage cheese in the state.

Like many businesses of Sacramento's past, Chris' Cottage Cheese had its own bowling team.

The team, which bowled at Alhambra Bowl at 1221 Alhambra Blvd., won several championships, including its 1950 Alhambra American Bowling League championship.

Five years later, the team won the Orselli Memorial Championship with its members, Chris, Sr., Mel Pratt, Chet Kitlas, Del Healy, Jack Ertle and John O'Connell.

In addition to bowling, Chris, Sr. enjoyed hunting, fishing, and golfing at William Land Park.

During his retirement years, Chris, Sr., who lived at 2810 3rd Ave. for the last half of his 80 years of life, had a very special caddie, a golden retriever, named Tiny, who would pull his golf bag and clubs on a cart.

Chris, Jr. remembers his father as an intelligent man who spoke English, German, French and Chinese, never used a calculator and was a perfectionist in all of his activities, including sports. Additionally, Chris, Jr. not-

ed that his father patented several items during his life, including a metal duck decoy, twin stabilizers for small boats, a combined duck decoy and stabilizer and the Hand-E boot hanger and carrier.

In 1957, Chris, Sr. sold Chris' Cottage Cheese to Crystal, which continued the business under the same name for the following two years, after which time, Dick and Dora Culp opened D&D Saw Shop at 2520 Broadway.

Sacramento Appliance Rentals was the last business to occupy this address and the building, which was replaced by a Department of Motor Vehicles parking lot, was demolished in about 1968.

Chris, Jr., who opened Broadway Bait, Rod and Gun, which is currently located at 1701 Broadway, more than 40 years ago, said that he does not know if there is a family who has been connected with Broadway for as many years as his own family has been directly associated with the historic street, with the exception of the Setzer family of Setzer Forest Products at 2570 3rd St., just south of Broadway. The Setzers opened their business at this site six years prior to the opening of Chris' Cottage Cheese.

"My parents came here (to today's Broadway) during the Depression and I grew up on Broadway back when it was a two-lane road," said Chris, Jr., who even owned a dog named Broadway during the 1980s and 1990s. "I grew up in a house direct-ly behind (Chris' Cottage Cheese) and I went to Sierra School (at 2815 24th St.) and I worked at (Chris' Cottage Cheese) doing everything. I picked up milk, I delivered cottage cheese to all the grocery stores and I made the cottage cheese. I've spent most of my life working on Broadway."

Janey Way Memories Going to Edmonds Field with my father

Before the Kings came to Sacramento, before the Sacramento River cats began playing at Raley Field, Sacramento had another venerable sports franchise: the Sacramento Solons triple A baseball team.

In the 1940s, '50s and early '60s, the Solons played ball at a storied old wooden ballpark named Edmonds Field located at the intersection of Riverside Blvd. and Broadway.

Unlike the Kings, the Solons actually won a Pacific Coast League title in 1942.

Back then, Hall of Fame players with names like Joe DiMaggio and Duke Snider and Ted Williams took their first cuts in the Pacific Coast League. So, when I was growing up in the 1950s, attending a Solons game at Edmonds Field with my dad was always a memorable experience. The structure itself stood out like a sore thumb on little old Broadway. At full capacity it accommodated about 10,000 fans, a pretty big venue for its time. Fans attending the Solon games parked for free all along the north and west sides of the park and entered the stadium from a main gate located on its northwest corner.

Vendors lined the underbelly of the park, selling hot dogs, sodas, Cracker Jack and peanuts: all the traditional baseball fare.

From there, fans proceeded up through arches lining both sides of the field to the stands. From home plate, the right and left field lines stretched out 330 feet to an 18 foot high fence. The center field fence stood 400 feet away from the plate, so a home run hit to that part of the field had to carry about 450 feet.

Some of the home runs I saw hit at Edmonds Field were memorable, towering blasts. I can remember the sounds of the fans cheering as if it were yesterday. Going to the games at Edmonds Field with my father was memorable for other reasons.

My dad grew up in Sacramento and because he was a policeman, he always encountered lots of friends from all walks of life at the ballpark. People with monikers like Izzy, Tiny and Lefty.

He always started his conversation with them by saying, "This is my oldest son Marty, you remember him." The guys would reply, "He's grown up a lot since the last time I saw him Mart," and I would swell up to my tallest possible height. Then we headed up to the stands to watch the game.

During their whole tenure, the Solons won only one championship, but they always competed and fought hard for every victory. I remember the outstanding center fielder, Al Heist, injuring his knee, making a diving catch to save a no-hitter for his pitcher.

In this modern day of cash-register sports, you don't often see that kind of effort anymore. My dad actually played several games in Edmonds Field with the Sacramento Police Department baseball team. They competed once every year in a charity game with the San Francisco Police Department team.

I served as a mascot for the local police team. One year as the teams played, I did a dance atop the dugout like good mascots do. In doing that, my enthusiasm got the best of me, and I fell off the roof down to the floor of the dugout. Fortunately, I fell right into the open arms of my dad's good friend, Lefty Rogers who shrugged and said, "What are you doing here, Marty."

That might have been the best catch Lefty ever made.

The days of Edmonds Field and the Sacramento Solons are a long forgotten memory now. They leveled the field and built a grocery store at the site almost 50 years ago. But I, for one, have not forgotten the old ballpark. Now it's another inspirational Janey Way memory.

the board of directors at Mercy High School in Burlingame.

In a phone interview, Paul said she is eager to get to Sacramento and start her new job at Jesuit High School.

"My husband and I moved to Dixon about two years ago, and I'm tired of commuting to San Mateo," she said. "I had hoped to get back into working at the high school level again, and when this job came open, I knew it was something I wanted to explore. Then at the interview, I came away so impressed with the school and the community that I was really hoping to get this job." An educator for three decade, Paul said she was inspired to go into the educational field by some of her high school instructors.

"In high school, I thought so highly of some of my teachers and how hard they worked and how they gave back to their communities, that I knew then that teaching was what I wanted to do," said Paul.

As assistant principal at Jesuit High School, Paul's job will focus on improving the school's curriculum.

"We will be assessing everything, asking ourselves, 'Is what we're doing effective for our students?' Paul said. "We'll be looking at everything from the classes to the school personnel to the resources available on campus to make sure we come together for the needs of this school in the future."

Paul said she is particularly eager to start working alongside Brianna Latko, Jesuit High School's principal.

"I came away from my interview really impressed with (Latko)," Paul said. "She is a woman of vision and commitment and she brings great leadership to the school." In a Jesuit High School news release announcing Paul's hiring, Latko shared Paul's enthusiasm for their new partnership.

"Lorraine brings extraordinary experience and commitment to Catholic Education," Latko said in the press release. "She will be a great asset to our community."

Finally, in other Jesuit news, Jordan Blair, the school's director of communications, briefly addressed the latest rumors that the all-male JHS might be going coeducational.

"That rumor is not true," Blair asserted. "We here that rumor a lot, especially with the recent closure of Loretto High School (an all-girls Catholic high school that closed in 2009), but it's not true. We plan to remain an all-boys school."

It would seem that McClatchy High School senior and baseball player Max Cordy was built to excel athletically. At 6'4", Cordy remains someone that most of his peers literally look up to. And while one might be quick to label his early athletic prowess a product of his size, Cordy continued to work and show that his skills surpassed even his impressive frame. In fact, he got so good that he rode his skills to a scholarship from UC Davis for next year.

Cordy, a Pocket area native, began to play baseball when he was just four years old for Pocket Little League. He grew up watching the game of baseball and before long he got good – really good. A lot of kids have cartoonish numbers in Little League, but Cordy brought those ridiculous stats to the high school level.

Through his team's first 22 games (the stats for the final two games of the regular season were not posted by press time), Cordy managed a .493 batting average with three home runs, 40 runs batted in and a nearly unfathomable 1.351 on-base plus slugging percentage.




