



Walking to the old California State Fair

Back when I grew up, the Cal Expo only existed as a blue print on

somebody's drawing board. Instead, we had the California State Fairgrounds. It stood proudly at the intersection of Stockton Boulevard and Broadway in south Sacramento.

The stately brick building called the Governor's Hall covered that corner and marked the entrance to the fair. Old Merlino's Orange Freeze was right across the street from that entrance to the fair.

The old fairgrounds stretched for almost a mile north and east from that intersection. The western border of the fairgrounds stretched north from Broadway all the way up to X Street where it went east up to 48th Street then snaked in a southerly direction back towards Broadway. Unlike the modern Cal Expo, which seems a little cramped to me. The old State Fair spread out across a vast expanse of land.

We attended the old State Fair annually, usually on Kid's Day (the first day of the fair) when kids got in for free. We always entered the fair at the north gate on approximately 48th Street. From there, we walked south down a broad avenue past a line of stately buildings.

First came the Hall of Flowers. We loved entering that building, not only be-

cause of the beautiful flowers on display, but because they kept it very cool to preserve the fresh cut flowers. A watery mist always seemed to fill the air in that building.

Next came the Counties Building, another beautiful brick edifice which featured exhibits from every one of California's 58 counties. The theme of each county exhibit reflected the agriculture and industry which characterized that county. Placer County always featured a 49er panning for gold. Yolo County had rice and tomatoes. Los Angeles County showcased - what else - movies. The exhibits changed yearly and always fascinated us.

Next in the line of buildings came the Hall of Industry with vendors hawking their various wares including: blenders, choppers, window cleaners, etc. We loved that building because the vendors always offered samples to all, even the kids who never bought anything.

From there, the street through the fair turned east, headed for the carnival, our favorite stop, but not before passing the race track on the north, and livestock barns on the south.

Strangely enough, we loved walking through the livestock barns. The cows, sheep and pigs always fascinated us: a bunch of city boys who only saw animals at the zoo. Here we could literally reach in and pet the critters. Somehow that made them seem a lot more real than at the zoo.

Finally, came the carnival where we spent our hard-earned dimes and quarters on rides like the Ferris Wheel, the Hammer and the Tilt-a-Whirl. We played games like the Derby which emulated a real horse race. We drank soda pop, ate corn dogs and saw mysterious things like the two-headed boy and the bearded lady.

At night, they held outdoor dances adjacent to the carnival for the teen aged kids like we were at the time. In the early '60s, the bands at the fair played surf music. Remember Wipeout? How about Dickey Dale and Deltones? A friend of ours, Danny Blakolb, actually played with a surf band at the fair. We danced, sang along and generally had a blast

at 9 p.m. They shot them off above a lake in the center of the old race track. Seeing the beautiful, if short, display always capped a great day of fun and adventure. It wasn't Disneyland, but it was one heck of a lot of fun.

Our days of fun at the old State Fair are noth-

ing but a long past memory to me now. I rarely attend Cal Expo. Somehow, its concrete structures don't measure up to the brick buildings and tree-lined streets of the old fair – yet another cherished Janey Way Memory.



Jazz Jubilee to pay tribute to late Land Park resident

This year's edition of the Sacramento Jazz Festival and Jubilee will include a variety of new and returning acts, as well as a tribute to one of the Sacramento Traditional Jazz Society's former executive directors, the late Land Park resident, Gene Berthelsen.

Berthelsen, who passed away on April 10 after a seven-year battle with cancer, played an important role in the success of this famous Sacramento event for many years. And in his memory, the jubilee's opening day parade, which will be held on Friday, May 27 at 11:45 a.m., will feature Berthelsen, in spirit, as its honorary grand marshal.





Vivian R. Abraham, the jazz society's business manager and event coordinator, who worked with Berthelsen and many others in assuring the success of the annual jubilee during the past 28 years, said that she was so touched by Berthelsen's kind spirit, good-natured attitude, sense of humor and dedication to the event that she was inspired to write a script about him that will be read during the parade.

As a bit of a sneak preview, the script includes the following words: "His 'Life is a Cabaret' approach to life is legendary and in many of our hearts, he will remain a legend and our 'old chum."

Berthelsen's longtime dedication to the society began when he first volunteered his time to the society and the jubilee in 1975.

Eventually, Berthelsen's love for the society and the jubilee led him to accept a greater role with the society as a member of its board of directors. And in 2008 and 2009, he served as the organization's executive director.

In addition to helping to assure that the jubilee was a great success each year, Berthelsen, who was the son of a Danish-born father and a California-born mother, was also part of the show.

In 1980, Berthelsen, who previously earned a master's degree in government at Sacramento State University, formed the Catsnjammer Jazz Band, and along with his infectious onstage personality and creative, yet often corny, sense of humor, the band quickly became a festival favorite.

And as a tribute to their band's founder, Berthelsen's former Catsnjammer band mates, as well as the group's recently added pianist, Mark Allen Jones, plan to pay tribute to Berthelsen during their performances.

The band is scheduled to perform Friday at the Holiday Inn Ballroom (K Street Mall and 3rd Street) at 7 p.m., Saturday at the Yolo Room (Sacramento Convention Center, 15th and J streets) at 11:30 a.m. and at the Delta King Paddlewheel Saloon (1000 Front

St.) at 7 p.m., Sunday at the Firehouse Courtyard (off Firehouse Alley, between K and L streets in Old Sacramento) at 11:30 a.m. and at the Golden Eagle Room (2nd Street, between K and L streets) at 5:30 p.m., and Monday at the Embassy Suites Ballroom (100 'Capitol Mall) at 2:30 p.m.

Laura Martin, a former Sacramento Magazine photographer, who later worked with Berthelsen through the society, was also among the many people who were inspired by Berthelsen's life.

When asked to describe what Berthelsen meant to her. Martin was certainly eager to comply, as she described a man who was both her mentor and her friend.

"I designed the jazz (jubilee) program (through

Sacramento Magazine) for seven years under Gene's direction, as he was editor of the program for 25-plus years," Martin said. "I also became a volunteer photographer under his direction and helped organize an entire team of photographers that are still volunteering their services to this day. After losing my job at the magazine in 2007, Gene took me under his editorial wing and guided me through the editing/ writing side of the program in 2008.

"He was a fantastic mentor and it was because of his guidance that I solidified my decision to pursue the editorial side of the publishing industry. I couldn't thank him enough for his kindness and words of wisdom, which he always had for me. With Gene's passing this year, the editorial torch was officially passed down to me, and I am now the official editor/creative director of the annual Jazz Festival and Jubilee program. He left some pretty big shoes to fill, but like with jazz music, my intentions are not to mimic his style, but rather simply improvise around what he originally created."

Martin said that she will always remember when Berthelsen took the time to give her his bit of advice when she turned 40 in

In reflecting upon his own memories of his life in his 40s, Berthelsen told Martin, "I think my 40s were probably the best time of my life. It was a time when I really came into my talents and realized all of my abilities, yet still had the energy and strength to use them. It certainly was the most productive time in my state job (with Caltrans) and my musical careers. Life definitely does not end at 40."

And Berthelsen, who is remembered by many people for his pleasant de-meanor and great smile, was living proof of these words, as he was full of inspiration and energy into his early 70s, just prior to his passing.

An example of this inspiration and energy is evident by the fact that shortly before his death, despite issues with his health, Berthelsen con-tributed to part of this year's jubilee program, which includes the event schedule, summaries and photographs of performers and other festival-related information.

Greg Willett, executive director of the jazz society, also speaks highly of Berthelsen's life and dedication to the society and ju-

"Not only was he just a super nice guy, but from everyone else's explanation, (Berthelsen) kind of had an encyclopedic knowledge of traditional jazz," Willett said. "The guy knew hundreds of jazz songs. Music was the number one most important love of his life and

outside of his work career, I think most of his time was dedicated to playing music or presenting music. In the early days, he might be building the stage in the morning, but definitely playing on it later on in that afternoon. The fact that he became executive director, I think it was just because he was so passionate about the event. There were some challenging years (for the jubilee) and I think Gene's mission was to make sure that we lived on to see another year. Frankly, because of his work, we're still alive







Second chance cats: Happy tales from Happy Tails

Land Park News writer

The longhaired, blue-eyed punk scaled a 30-foot tree and got himself stuck in the canopy for eight days. He made the evening news. A tree-trimming crew bagged the bad boy and rappelled him down. He then spent time in the pokey until Happy Tails bailed him out. With three of his nine lives ticked off, he is one lucky kitty.

Cats like Tarzan are "second chance cats" and they are Happy Tails Pet Sanctuary's specialty.

Rescued from an uncertain fate at the Sacramento City Animal Shelter, he was brought to Happy Tails on Folsom Boulevard for a second chance at adoption. He was cleaned up, microchipped, checked, vaccinated and neutered.

Happy Tails won't refuse a cat.

"But first do everything you can to help us out," says Cathryn Rakich, events coordinator. "Ask everyone if they'll adopt the cat. Try to find the owner. People should know that we are bursting at the seams."

Established in 1993, and located at 60th Street and Folsom Boulevard, the Sanctuary is a no-kill facility (all cats are kept until adoption or death, no euthanasia). An all-volunteer team of 300 people, with 50 foster homes, moves a continuing cycle of cats, like Tarzan, through a careful adoption system.

From cage cleaner to board member, there are no paid positions.

Volunteers can work from one to 20 hours a week. There are no set requirements for volunteers. People do what they can.

About 70 percent of the felines come from the Sacramento area community and about ten percent are rescued from other shelters. These are cats like Tarzan - with lots of character and pizzazz that deserve a second chance.

Happy Tails also has an adoption partnership with PetSmart. The store provides a holding room, bank of cages, food and litter for adoptable felines. The Happy Tails team maintains the Arden and Watt PetSmart location and shows animals for adoption at the on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and on Sundays from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Kitty out!

A brindled tabby squirmed quickly through an open condo door.

"Kitty out!" several volunteers shouted. The crew hustled to secure the middle and exterior doors to catch the escapee. Speed saved the day and



the cat (with a surprised look on his face) was returned.

The Folsom Boulevard site includes exam and intake rooms, a sick bay and a triple secure door system: interior, middle and exte-

The residents aren't kept comfortable in cages, instead there are seven glass walled enclosures, or condos, that divide different populations. One is for the more senior residents, two are for adults and four are for special needs cats.

Special needs include positive tests for cat leukemia, FIV, or social challenges and provides sick cats 'assisted living until they're back on their

Every room is decorated with toys, cat trees and ample bedding. Cleaners keep the rooms clean and the cats are relaxed.

Kitten season

The saddest time of the year for cats may be spring.

Traditional kitten kicks in when the weather warms up," Rakich said. "It used to be primarily May through July but now it runs late April through September.'

This is the time when unsprayed mom cats give birth to kits that are very hard to place in good homes. The cat population swells, as do deaths and abuse.

Happy Tails kittens are kept in foster homes. On the day this writer visited, there was a wiggling carry bag on the floor.

"A homeless man found four abandoned kittens and put them on the conveyor belt at PetSmart," said Joelle McChesney, Adoption Center coordinator. She gently poked a rubber nipple into a grey kitten's protesting mouth. These are young, maybe three weeks old.'

McChesney will be a surrogate mom, feeding and loving the babies, until they are old enough to be put up for adoption.

The bag of kittens was on its way to a foster home because the sanctuary is not equipped for kitten needs. "Each kitten takes more than \$100 to move through the adoption process," said McChesney.

Life on the edge

Feral cats also fall under the protection of the shelter.

We have two secret feral cat colonies in Sacramento," said Rakich. "We practice catch and release - spay and neuter, and feeding. The sites are secret so people won't dump cats near the area.

"A hard life does not make a grumpy cat," Rakich continued, stroking and hugging a chubby black tom named Bronco. He was moved into the sanctuary from the feral population. Purring and limp, Bronco carries a ragged neck scar from a collar that had grown into his skin. His frayed ears and nicks made him look like a hardened felon.

"We have to have thick skins," said Rakich. "We never get used to (the cruelty). We want all cats to be safe, sound, nurtured and have a home to blossom in."

Help needed

Happy Tails needs any help the Sacramento community can offer, but it especially needs homes for the cats.

Potential adopters are screened carefully and some balk about the shelter's no outside cat rule. All new owners must pledge to keep the cat indoors, no exceptions.

"It's just safer for the cat," says Ra-

Rakich ponders the plight of the animals.

"People say it's not their responsibility...'I just found it,... or 'I'm just helping to get it to the shelter,...I believe it's everyone's responsibility to help these ani-

By the way, Tarzan, the bad boy acrobat - he's happy, fluffy, reformed and waiting at Happy Tails for a loving forever-family.

He is now exploring the exhibit and getting to know the Zoo's three female Reticulated giraffes, Val, Skye and Goodie.

"You may not see him often during his first weeks out; it will depend on how comfortable he is with the exhibit on any particular day," said Harrison Edell, general curator. "Introductions between animals can sometimes be challenging, but once those introductions are complete, we can look forward to seeing him explore his surroundings with his new herd."

Born Dec. 1, 2009, Chifu stands approximately 11 feet tall and is expected to reach between 16 and 19 feet. Chifu's name comes from the Swahili word for "Chief." Keepers have found that Chifu loves Pony Pops, a molasses and grain-based treat.

The Tall Wonders giraffe habitat was designed with the capacity to hold up to six adult animals. Working cooperatively with the Association of Zoos and Aquariums' Masai Giraffe Species Survival Plan®, the Zoo will acquire a female Masai giraffe in the future. The three female Reticulated giraffes will remain at the Sacramento Zoo but will not breed with Chifu.

The Masai giraffe is the largest giraffe subspecies and is found in southern Kenya and Tanzania. Aside from a difference in size, Reticulated and Masai giraffes tend to have slightly different spots. A Masai giraffe's spots are usually darker and irregular in shape.
