

Sacramento Children's Home provides help for kids, families in crisis

Since 1867, the Sacramento Children's Home, located at 2750 Sutterville Road, has been known for its residential program. But there is more to this facility than meets

Christine Airola, director of fund development and communications for the Children's Home, said the facility has evolved over the years to adapt to the community's needs, providing additional services beyond housing for kids in need.

We (now) have seven campuses, ranging from pre-natal care to transitional age programs for children traditionally in the foster care system," Airola said.

The Sacramento Children's Home offers several arrangements for kids in need, including a crisis nursery program, a residential program, after-school education, "wrap around" programs, counseling, family resource centers and a transition age program. These programs strive to help kids - and their families - to heal.

Crisis Nursery Program

The Children's Home offers two crisis nurseries, one in the north area and one in the south area. Services are set up for infants and toddlers, ages zero to five. Any parent (s) in crisis may leave their child from two hours to thirty days without the risk of having the child removed from their care.

Residential Program

The Sacramento Children's Home used to house up to 100 children. Today, just 30 children reside there. This is because the focus today is to reach out to families before they get to the point of losing children.

Ray Alexander, CEO of the Sacramento Children's Home, said the national trend is to reduce the number of children in group homes or foster care.

"Our first priority is to place the child with another family member or a non-family member considered part of the family but not blood related, before placing in foster care," Alexander said. "Our programs here are designed to keep kids out of the system.

With the increase in trying to keep families together, Airola said the Children's Home is seeing fewer referrals to outside sources. The Children's Home is a level 12 facility; which means they see the kids who have been bounced from 10 to 12 different foster families. Airola said with each placement change, there is trauma. They receive the most traumatized children, who have not been successful in the family environment. Airola said they try to stabilize these children and heal them to a point where they can be reintroduced to a family at some point.

After-School Education Program

The Children's Home offers reading programs and preparation for preschool and kindergarten, with a strong focus on early education. Often these children do not own a book and have not been exposed to reading or educational activities.

Our program is phenomenal," Airola said. "It bridges the gap for kids that live here."

An important part of this program is that the children are kept in their school of or-

Land Park Pony Rides owner operates dog and cat rescue

Lynn Hagemann, whose pony rides business at William Land Park was featured in the Aug. 11 edition of this publication, has a love for animals that extends well beyond ponies

For the past 23 years, she has operated a dog and cat rescue business, known as Hagemann Rescue. And in those years, Hagemann has found homes for about 1,200 dogs and about 800 cats that would have otherwise been euthanized.

In speaking about her efforts to save the lives of animals, Hagemann said, "We go to the pound to see whose time is up and that's who we choose."

Hagemann, whose love for animals began during her childhood, said that her road to establishing her dog and cat rescue business mainly began when she was a United Parcel Service driver.

"I've always rescued dogs and picked them up off the streets and stuff like that," Hagemann said. "I worked for UPS and my mom (Fran Pederson) worked in a veterinary hospital and people would have their dogs and they wanted to put them to sleep, because they couldn't afford the bill. My mom would tell me about certain dogs and I'd ask people on my UPS route and try to find them homes, which I did."

In an attempt to assist more animals, Hagemann went to the local animal control shelter at 2127 Front St. and inquired about providing volunteer

After being turned away, because the shelter did not accept volunteers, Hagemann discovered an advertisement for the Yolo County Animal Services.

"The Yolo County animal control, they advertised that they wanted volunteers, so I went in there and I started taking animals down to (William Land) Park," Hagemann said. "I talked to the people who run my contract there (at the park) and they said as long as they (obtained approval of) everyone around the area—the zoo, the animal control, the SPCA, everybody

Rescue: Adoptable dogs, cats popular with visitors to the Pony Rides

spayed and neutered, I could have them (at the park)."

Today, most of the animals available to the public for adoption through Hagemann's rescue business are dogs that she acquires from the Sutter County Animal Control shelter in Yuba City.

Hagemann said that she feels especially good about taking animals out of the Yuba City shelter, because the animals at this Sutter County facility are housed in very tight quarters.

Generally, Hagemann selects mixed breed dogs, since purebred dogs are more likely to be adopted from animal control shel-

The dogs and cats of Hagemann Rescue are strategically placed within a gated area near the entrance to the Land Park Pony Rides, in order that these animals receive the best exposure to guests of the pony rides and the nearby Funderland.

Hagemann Rescue animals are popular with many park guests and many times people arrive at the pony rides area sim-

- and (the animals) were ply to visit the dogs, and cats, if any are present.

In a show of appreciation, many people who have acquired animals from Hagemann return to visit her at her place of work.

Hagemann recalled that a woman recently visited her with some photographs of

"A lady came here and she had pictures of her little Chihuahua mixed dog, and they have two acres, and she was telling me how this dog sleeps on her husband's arm at night on their bed and how spoiled it was and how they loved the dog," Hagemann said. "And that's what happens all the time with the dogs that people get here. And I love it when people get dogs here, because we get to turn around and get anoth-

When asked whether she is active with any hobbies, Hagemann was quick to mention that her involvement with animals is her hobby.

"(Working with animals) is in the blood, I guess," said Hagemann, who in addition to her ponies, horses and mule, owns six "keeper dogs," three cats and various geese and chickens on her property in Sheridan in Placer County. "I've always loved animals from the time I was a little kid. I'm not sure whether my mom and dad loved animals. Maybe that's where it came from, but I love almost any kind of animal. I'm not real big into reptiles, but anything with fur on it."

"My interest is animals and that's why I give the pony rides, because I love animals and that gives me an excuse to have (the ponies), and they pay for themselves pretty much. And I never get tired of going to the pound and getting new dogs to take home and teach them how to walk on a leash, and (working) with them."

Considering that Hagemann said that she does "not make a penny" on placing dogs and cats in new homes, it is evident that she operates her rescue business because of her love for animals.

We put (the animals) up for adoption for the money that I have into them," Hagemann said. "So, actually they cost me, because I'm not like most of the rescue groups that charge for going to get the dogs, their time, gas and everything else. I just charge for the price of purchasing the dogs and shots, (de)worming and that sort of thing. There's no money in it. This is my hobby. I don't drink beer, alcohol or anything like that, so I feel that if I don't get all the money out of the dogs, that's okay, because it makes me happy."

On average, the cost of adopting a dog from Hagemann is about \$60, and a cat from Hagemann costs an average of about \$40.

Children's Home: Intergenerational cycles of abuse are broken

igin. If they "jump" schools, there is a loss of records and it becomes hard to determine where they left off in their education.

We drive the children to 17 different locations because we fully believe in commitment to education." Airola said. "The child deserves to be in the school that fits his or her educational needs. We want integrity for the child.

After school, Airola said the big focus is educational advocacy, bridging the gap between education at home and education at school. She said foster children have no one to stand up for them. The Children's Home takes over that role. An educational advocate meets with teachers and administrators, to ensure the children receive the attention they need and don't fall through the cracks.

"They have so much potential," Airola said. "We don't want them to get lost in the school system.

The Children's Home provides tutoring and assistance with homework. Caregivers at the Home know the students' assignments. According to Airola, the Children's Home was recently chosen by the United Way to be partners in the foster literacy program. Children in grades one through three, behind in literacy, are given referrals by their teachers. A tutor is provided for each child, to bring the child up to grade level within a year.

Airola pointed out that certain states gauge their prison population by their reading level as third graders. She said this has proved to be a strong indicator of truancy, completion of high school, college, and entering the criminal justice system. She said they want to reach these children before they get to that point. Airola said they use third grade literacy because up to the third grade, children are learning to read. In the later grades, they are reading to learn.

Another program developed with Children's Home Services and Walmart is called "A Book for Every Child." Airola said Walmart provides a book to every child in the household.

'Often this is the child's first book," Airola said.

The Children's Home provide education in many languages, educating a diverse group of families. Sacramento is a very diverse community, and the Children's Home works to meet each family in the language and culture where they are.

Wraparound Program

Children living at the Home, typically stay between eight months and a year, Airola said. Their ages range from 6-18-years old.

"The goal is to find permanent homes for these children, so they are not dependent on this place," Airola said.

The Children's Home often goes back to the family to find a cousin or aunt or even back to the original family to place a child - if the family has done adequate work and progress and are willing to work the program to improve their parenting skills. Airola said they call this their Wraparound program, designed to take children identified as being healed enough that they can potentially live with a family.

"We wrap that family in services," Airola said. "We provide therapy for the family and the child. We have individual parenting classes and provide community resources."

Airola said one of the stumbling blocks in bringing a child home is not having a bed for that child. There is an agreement a bed must be provided for the child before he or she can move into the home. Airola said Sleep Train has a program that provides beds for these children.

Airola said they give the family a realistic snapshot of what it is going to take to bring

a child home permanently and form a family unit that is going to be strong enough to withstand past traumas and residual behavioral challenges in the child. After a child is placed in a permanent family, Airola said the Children's Home continues to wrap that family in services, until they have determined the family is strong enough to stand alone, and has a support system as a

Airola said this is an effective program. In the past, children used to be removed from families. Now the methodology used is keeping families together and educating them. This helps the parent to change the family dynamics.

Airola said a big barrier in this program is change. The families are not used to these types of parenting methods, and there is great resistance to change in some environments. The parents feel they will be seen as different because they are changing their parenting style. Airola said sometimes relatives see the family moving from traditional roles and think they are no longer respected. She said there have been occasions when other family members disengage themselves because there is a sense they are doing something wrong. Airola said the

mindset is that you have to break the expectation of what is OK and what's not OK.

Family Resource Centers

The Family Resource Center program is focused on infants and children ages zero to five and is partially funded by the First Five Commission. There are three family resource centers. Airola said these centers have been placed in areas identified by the county as the highest risk for incidents of child abuse and neglect. Airola said their purpose is to provide parenting education and outreach classes.

Child Protection Services provided these services prior to the budget cuts. Airola said the Children's Home stepped in and took over these servic-

CPS provides the Children's Home with a list of families at risk. The Home provides home visitation and intervention. Most at risk families participate and are often grateful for the services provided. They learn alternate ways of parenting. Airola said the outcome is very positive, breaking intergenerational cycles of child abuse. She said most of these young parents were in foster care themselves.

Many hands, many hearts support Sacramento Children's Home

Four auxiliaries support the Sacramento Children's Home. These are: the Casa Garden Restaurant, the Crisis Nursery, the Sacramento Home Guild and the Los Amigos Group.

Over 700 dedicated volunteers work in the four auxiliaries - a powerful statement of community support for the Home. A host of additional volunteers work with the kids as well. The volunteers are dedicated and committed.

"We see them as an extension of the staff," Airola said. "We could not provide as much as we do to as many children as we do with-

Coaches come to teach basketball skills. Others rock babies or read books to the

An active board of directors, made up of highly committed individuals, brings a myriad of talent and skills to the organization. Airola said she is constantly amazed by their dedication and willing-

"It is refreshing to see the level of commitment and dedication and true altruism," she said. "To give us their precious time is phe-

Airola said she believes with the down economy, people are realizing volunteering is what is going to sustain the Children's Home well into its next century of serving Sacramento area children and their fami-

Part of the program includes home visitation. Once a week, a Children's Home worker goes to the home, observes the interaction between the parent and child, and offers positive feedback.

SCH Counseling Center

The counseling center is moving on campus this fall, according to Airola. The Children's Home accepts referrals from Sacramento County in general, and from the mental health clinic for children and families. The Children's Home has a grant to work with the mental health system in violence prevention and family intervention through school districts. It is similar to the reading outreach program, with school counselors and administrators identifying children exposed to violence, having trouble in school or becoming violent or the family is exhibiting some behaviors of violence.

Transition Age Program

Airola said children in a group home or foster home setting lack a model of acceptable standards of behavior. For example, paying bills, how to find a job, talking to a landlord.

We work with them on life skills, teaching them how to live in a community,"

The Home is always trying to grow its residential program. There is a vocational program working with teenage boys. The boys respond well to working on campus. Providing incentives has proven to be effective.

"We recently have done something not done before in Sacramento," Airola said. "We found private funding for the 6-to-12 year-old age group."

The Yocha DeHe Tribal Board generously granted funding for CPS referrals in the 6-12 age group, according to Airola. This age group is a huge subset of the neglected population. Now the Children's Home has the ability to provide services and a referral base.

"I am really excited about this," Airola said. "The program begins in September. If we can touch these children's lives, that is what we are here for. We are constantly evolving into what we think and feel the community needs," Airola said. "We meet each family where they need us to be."





Christian Brothers has high hopes to make it to the playoffs this season

After a somewhat disappointing 6-5 record last season, Christian Brothers' varsity football team has a new head coach with some big goals set for 2011.

Long-time assistant George Petrissans has taken over for Andre Johansen and wants his team to win a few playoff games instead of being eliminated in the first round like they've been the last four seasons and in five out of the last

Petrissans lost a lot of seniors from last year's team, but does have some key players returning, most notably senior quarterback Ryan Peabody, who was a part-time starter a year ago. With the graduation of Jerimiah Sims, the job is Peabody's.

"Ryan has a mixture of intangibles," Petrissans said. "He's extremely intelligent and is athletic and he's a leader that brings a lot to the team."

Peabody is excited to be the No. 1 guy this year.

"I'm definitely very excited for the season," Peabody said. "Our head coach was the offensive coordinator last year and he's put some new things in to spread the ball out. We're looking pretty good and we're trying to get better."

Joining Peabody in the backfield is senior fullback Chris Hedum and junior running back Avante Yarber, who will miss part of the season as he recovers from a fractured ankle. Until he returns, Petrissans said it will be running back by committee, led by junior Cory Lutz.

"Avante has great speed and quickness and a unique set of talents," Petrissans said.

Petrissans is also high on his receivers, juniors Jalen Walker and Omari Gray alongside senior tight end Chris Lusich, who played fullback a year

"I think Jelan is someone to watch out for," Petrissans said. "He's fast and has good size (6'0", 175 pounds) and can go up and get the ball."

Up front senior Alex Wagstaff is the leader of the offensive line at left tackle, while senior right guard Kyle Castaneda is another return-

ing starter. Michael Rose will start at center and Vinny Johnson plays right tackle. Either Justin Cappello or Nate Ashby will start at left guard.

After running the ball about 80 percent of the time last year, the Falcons plan to do some more passing this year.

Four starters return on defense, including Lusich at inside linebacker and Wagstaff at defensive tackle. Senior Jonathan Lockwood also returns at inside linebacker and lines up next to Lusich, while senior CJ Goodier returns at cornerback.

Hedum joins Wagstaff on the interior line with Johnson and Castaneda playing on the ends. Senior Marcos Raymundo plays outside linebacker, while junior Avery Baker starts at cornerback. Danlee Hightower starts at

One thing the Falcons have going for them is that they're developing nicely into a team instead of bunch of individu-

"We're young, but we've come together," Wagstaff said. "We have no superstar. We will play hard and all of us love football. We're more cohesive this year and because we have no superstar, that will force us to play as a team."

The Falcons placed third in the Capital Valley League last year behind Del Campo and Casa Roble. Petrissans wants a league championship and a playoff win. He says Del Campo and Casa Roble are always tough opponents, while Rio Linda and Oakmont will also be in the mix.

"Coach is always talking about how hard work pays off," Lusich said. "He's been preaching togetherness and teamwork and with that we will overcome and adapt to adversity.

Peabody added, "I think the key for us is execution. When we execute our game plan on offense and our defensive strategies, we're pretty good."

While the Falcons are looking for playoff success, there's also a big nonleague game on their schedule every year that holds great importance and that's the Holy Bowl, the annual battle with Jesuit High School.

'When you get close to 18,000 people at the game, you know it's a big rivalry game," Petrissans said. "No matter what people think of the talent on either team, the game's always close. There's a lot of emphasis on the game. If we play hard and play with enthusiasm and with good energy, good things will happen."

The players for sure love the Holy Bowl.

"In terms of football it's just another game, but it's always fun to play in front of that many people," Peabody said. "It's an exciting game."

"It's obviously an important game," Wagstaff said. "It's a whole different experience as a junior. You get to feel what the rivalry is all about."

Lusich added, "It's definitely a fun game to play in. You have the drumline leading you in and there are 18,000 fans and your adrenaline is pumping. It's a pretty amazing feeling; one you won't forget."

Jesuit Varsity team young, inexperienced...but loaded with potential

It's been four years since Jesuit's varsity football team has had a winning record.

For some programs, that might not be a big deal, but to Jesuit it seems like a lifetime since the team went 8-3 and made a trip to the postseason in 2007. The following year the Marauders slipped to 5-5 and the past two years the Marauders have posted 4-6 records.

This year head coach Dan Carmazzi is hoping a switch to the spread offense will help the team put some more points on the scoreboard, and the Marauders will also have to improve defensively if they want to reach the postseason.

"Record-wise (4–6) is not what we shoot for," Carmazzi said. "Obviously, we'd like to have a better record than that. We had a really solid offseason and the kids did a great job in the weight room and we also did some passing leagues."

The Marauders lost 30 seniors off last year's squad and have only 16 players returning so young and inexperienced are two words that describe this year's squad. Junior Thomas Sperbeck, last year's junior varsity quarterback, and senior Mason Pigman are battling for the starting job at quarterback. Sperbeck, son of Sac State coach Marshall Sperbeck, is the odds on favorite to be the starter.

"Thomas is very mobile and he's a competitor," Carmazzi said. "He's accurate and makes good decisions. He's a great athlete, as he reached the section meet as a long jumper and a high jumper last year."

Senior Cameron Todd is the team's top returning rusher, while Pat Barrientes returns at fullback. Fellow seniors Scott Rogers and Parker Abercrombie will start at wide receiver with senior Jared Elenberger holding down the job at tight end along with senior John Frank. Sophomore Lake Lutes, all 6-foot, 5inches of him, will see plenty of action at wide receiver and could be a big threat for the offense.

Abercrombie, who also starts at safety, said he likes this year's offense.

"Offensively, both quarterbacks are capable to step up and both have good leadership qualities," Abercrombie said. "We hope to catch some teams off guard with our spread package, as we have a

lot of playmakers on offense, including a strong receiving core."

The offensive line is led by senior George Vrame, a returning starter at left tackle. Senior Blake Rogers will start next to Vrame, while the center will either be senior A.J. Calnero or junior Rafael Aguilar. Garrett Strohmaier, a junior, starts are right tackle, while the right guard position is still being decided.

Perhaps the top offensive player is senior kicker Andrew Nave, who Carmazzi said might be the school's top recruited player.

The Marauders have several two-way players, as Todd (outside linebacker), Barrientes (cornerback), Abercrombie and Sperbeck (safety), Blake Rogers and Strohmaier (defensive tackle) and Calnero and Vrame (defensive end) play key roles on defense.

The leader on defense is senior middle linebacker Nathan Zielke. At 5'9" and 170 pounds, he's not going to physically intimidate opponents, but make no mistake, he's all business.

"Nate's our top returning tackler and his motor is always running, Carmazzi said. "He's undersized, but he's tough and aggressive."

If Zielke is the team's top tackler, Frank is right behind him at safety. Junior Casey Reilly will play defensive end, while junior Connor Frey is a starter at outside linebacker. Junior Matt Ternan will play a lot in the secondary, while senior Steven Tavenner starts at cornerback.

Defensively, our line is solid and we've got great camaraderie, we talk a lot and we pursue and attack the ball," Abercrombie said.

After finishing tied for third place in the Delta River League a year ago with Oak Ridge and Sheldon with a 2-3 record, the Marauders know to finish higher, they will need to beat the playoff teams. Last year the Marauders picked up league wins over Ponderosa and Sheldon, while losing to Oak Ridge, Folsom and Pleasant Grove.

'We've got to beat the playoff teams," Carmazzi said. "We haven't been able to beat the top-ranked teams and that's our goal this year.'

Abercrombie added,"I have high expectations for this team. "We're definitely planning on making the playoffs and pushing for a section title run. We want to win Holy Bowl, which is big for us, and we want to beat some of the top teams in our league."

Jesuit did win a big non-league game a year ago, when they defeated Christian Brothers, 18-15 to win the annual Holy Bowl.

"The Holy Bowl is a great tradition that I've been apart of on both sides since I graduated from Christian Brothers and now coach at Jesuit," Carmazzi said. "It's great to go out there and play in front of 12 to 15,000 fans and the kids eat it up. Both teams get great community support and it's one of the highlights of the year. Whenever I talk to alumni, they don't ask what our record is; all they want to know is if we won Holy Bowl."

"It's a very emotional game and both teams leave everything on the field," Abercrombie added. "There are a lot of emotions going into that game and it's something that we'll tell our kids about someday."
