

The 5-story Hotel Land, which had the address of 1106 10th St., was built at the same site and was opened on Aug. 20, 1910.





# McClatchy baseball 'Coach D'

The baseball field of Mc-Clatchy High School has been the backyard of Mike de Necochea since he was a kid. Now as a father of seven watching his youngest child and only son preparing to embark as a freshman at his alma mater, he plans on staying around at least for a few more years.

"The joke was that I'd high school, but I can't believe that's next year already," de Necochea said. "With my son and his friends entering high school, I hope I can keep coaching here for another four years."
