Kennedy High registrar to retire after 36 years of service

Although it has often been said that we are born of change and there is nothing permanent except change, when something good that was once a constant positive in our lives finally fades away, such change is not always easy to accept.

And thus is the case with the news of Jan Matisco, the long-time, popular John F. Kennedy High School registrar, who announced that she will officially retire on June 30.

After beginning her career working with students at John Bidwell Elementary School in 1963, Matisco was hired to work at Kennedy High in July 1973.

Matisco, who said that she is leaving her position due to health complications, has built a sort of legendary career at Kennedy High for her dedication to her work, explained Kennedy High Office Technician Silvia Lewis.

"She is so careful and responsible with her work and even sacrifices her time to come to work on holidays and weekends. I've learned a lot from her," said Lewis, who works in the administration office with Matisco.

And when it comes to caring for Kennedy High students both past and present, Matisco is famous on and off the school's campus for her bright smile, gracious demeanor and acts of kindness.

Kennedy High student Kelsie Muramoto said that she is amazed

at the kindness of Matisco, who has tutored students after school with her husband, Joe, and even made many lunches for students.

And with an appreciative look on her face, Muramoto said, "My aunt and uncle went to Kennedy and she sends birthday cards to them every year and they're in their forties." Despite only having one son, Richard Hunt, Matisco said she has gained many children throughout her time at Kennedy High.

"I actually have many children," Matisco said. "Richard said that if all of my adopted kids come home at the same, I won't have enough room for them."

Although she is only responsible for her registrar duties, Matisco, with the support of her husband, is known by those associated with the school for her longtime support of the school's athletic program.

Shell-shocked love: The delicate art of tortoise care

There was once a time when Greenhaven resident Felice Rood, who is beyond doubt Sacramento's leading expert on all things relating to turtles, would have taken a back seat to me when it came to making contact with those quirky, shelled reptiles.

That would have been some time before World War II, when I was, say, 12 years old, and baby Felice was around 3 years old. And it was then that I began raising turtles in our family's Brooklyn, N.Y. apartment, while Felice, just a subway-ride away in the Bronx, had undoubtedly not yet become acquainted with the cute little critters.

In my case, adopting a dog or cat had been taboo where we lived because our landlord wanted it that way. Instead, I had to settle for turtles, which were available at the neighborhood pet shop then for 15 to 25 cents each and could be housed discreetly in a small tank atop my bedroom dresser.

In the end, my turtle experience was a failure because the little critters, red-eared sliders they were called, quickly sickened, stopped eating and died. I bought replacements several times, but the sad outcome was just repeated. Finally, I gave up, and went on to other places and things in the face of World War II and an eventual move to California.

Felice, who founded the Sacramento Turtle Society in 1981, tells me that her childhood experiences with turtles in the Bronx were a lot like mine in Brooklyn. The first turtles she acquired got sick and died just like mine, but – unlike me – she began doing some research into how to handle the little sliders in captivity. Soon, she recalled, they began thriving in the Bronx apartment house where her family lived. She had learned that frequent water changes, a balanced diet, and exposure to sunlight, were key elements to turtle survival.

For her, this was the beginning of a lifetime commitment to the little reptiles. Soon after Felice and her new husband Bill moved to Ohio after World War II, she saved a colony of pond turtles facing incineration after a forest fire broke out nearby. She was able to rescue about a dozen of them, evacuating them to an area that was a safe distance from the fire.

Home on your back

Later, Felice, Bill and their family of four children moved to Los Angeles where she joined the local turtle society. Finally, they moved on to Sacramento where there was no turtle club in existence at the time. She remedied that absence in 1981 by organizing the Sacramento Turtle Society.

Since then, the organization has grown to 950 mem-

bers, demonstrating that the Sacramento area does indeed have many people who care deeply about turtles and tortoises. Among the benefits that members receive for a \$2 annual stipend is a quarterly newsletter that Felice lovingly composes; it's one of the most entertaining newsletters of any genre that I've ever read. If you read it once or twice, you'll be bound to get very concerned about global warming, pollution and other problems that endanger the turtle population of the world along with the rest of us.

Felice also serves as a kind of house mother and clinical advisor for turtle lovers and keepers in the area, responding to all questions with information gleaned from her years of gathering chelonian data of all kinds. She took umbrage recently at the use among local turtle people of "boxies" as an informal and even affectionate reference to the little reptiles. It was not a term that Felice for her part, viewed with any affection.

"I thought they were talking about men's underwear or a popular breed of dog," she wrote in her spring newsletter. "It did not dawn on me they were talking about box turtles."

She took a dim view that the term may have been gaining popularity, a trend that she viewed as "disheartening and a form of turtle slanguage." In short, don't say "boxie" when you talk with Felice Rood.

Four times a year, Felice emcees meetings of the turtle society at the Belle Cooledge library branch on South Land Park and Fruitridge drives where scores of members turn out for turtle swapping, problem discussions and

show-and-tell demonstrations of little pets that come from all parts of the world. The get-togethers reach a climax in August, when the annual Turtlerama is scheduled at Belle Cooledge, attracting hundreds, most of them society members as well others who just want to admire the exotic critters on display.

At home with the turtles

Felice's home is a monument to her unending commitment to the turtles of the world. She takes in a variety of turtle and tortoises whose owners tire of them or are otherwise left abandoned and in need of a home. When I stopped by at the Rood residence a couple of weeks back, I almost stepped on a large tortoise in the garden before I'd fully digested a warning to watch where I go. The tortoise, named Fat Betty, Felice reported, is an uncanny predictor of the upcoming sum-

mer weather. It will be cool, Felice said, because Fat Betty went into hibernation earlier than usual in October.

"That means she expects a cool summer," Felice said.

Elsewhere in the garden, there are a number of compounds where different species of turtle congregate and seemingly enjoy each other's company as they prepare for the mating season ahead.

Most of the Roods' neighbors are aware of the unusual nature of Felice's garden, and most are supportive. Several take the trouble of collecting their own garden snails and dropping them off at the Roods where they become delicacies for the turtles and tortoises. The snails are very nutritious, Felice said. Bel Air market also pitches in by supplying Felice with lettuce trimmings and surplus spinach, all hearty fare for Felice's guests.

Turtles, of course, never make noise, which elimi-

nates potential neighbor complaints. One problem that did come up not long ago involved a raccoon that invaded the yard and mangled several of the turtle pets. Felice solved the problem by buying a disc that duplicated a dog barking whenever the garden door was disturbed at night. The raccoon came once more, the "dog" barked, and the raccoon was never heard from again, Felice reported to her society members in what she calls a "Turtalert" message in her quarterly newsletter.

Turtle fun this summer

The upcoming summer will no doubt be a busy time for Felice and her turtle society members. The climax will come on Saturday, Aug. 15, when the annual Turtlerama, the 28th since the society was organized in 1981, will enliven the Belle Cooledge Library's meeting room. It could be a good date to put onto your calendar.

Pocket area resident relates history of Lewis Park property

To many visitors of Lewis Park at 6570 Park Riviera Way, this 3.38-acre Pocket area park is nothing more than a convenient place for recreation and leisure. But then there are others who have a much deeper connection to this site.

And among the people who are the most passionate about the area where the park is located is Riverside/Pocket area native Delores (Silva) Greenslate.

Sitting at a table in her Pocket area home last week, Greenslate explained with a serious tone to her voice her passion for the park site and its nearby surrounding area.

This was my great-grandfather's land," Greenslate said as she pointed to a large section of a 1908 survey map of the area.

Greenslate, 84, whose great-grandfather was early Pocket-area Portuguese settler Antone Rodrigues Pereira, added that the names Perry

and Lewis are very important names in her family history.

"These are both special names in my family's history," Greenslate said. "The name Perry is the Anglicized version of the name Pereira and the name Lewis (formerly Luiz) came from the man who married my great-grandparents' (Antone Rodrigues and Maria Gloria [Silva] Pereira or "Perry") daughter, Emma."

Born in Faial in the Azores islands of Portugal on March 26, 1831, Antone Rodrigues Pereira, who had worked as a baker in his native land, made his way to the Pocket area in the early 1850s.

Antone, who was described as a tall, strong, hardworking, blue-eyed man, spent many years working as a farmer in the Pocket area.

Voices from the past

During his early days as a farmer, Antone operated a freight produce business and delivered fruits and vegetables



to miners in mining communities northeast of Sacramento.

Greenslate said that this business was more of a service to the miners than a way to make a lot of money.

"Because he was a very honest man, he priced his produce so it could be bought readily," Greenslate said.

At the age of 34, Antone married 14-year-old Maria Gloria Silva, who had settled in the Pocket area with her uncle and aunt, Manuel Jose and Maria Madelena Da Rosa, who were also her godparents.

In 1868, Antone Rodrigues Pereira and Manuel Da Rosa purchased about a 44-acre parcel, which included today's park site. Of this acreage, Antone owned 30.82 acres.

Together, Antone and Maria Gloria raised 10 children, including their son, Joe Perry, who farmed on the park site parcel until the death of his father on May 2, 1917.

Greenslate said that the timing of her great-grandfather's death had a bit of an ironic twist to it, considering that he was married on May 2 and had remained unmarried since his wife's death on Jan. 30, 1909.

The name of Emma Perry Luiz (Lewis), the previously mentioned daughter of Antone and Maria Gloria, also appears on Greenslate's 1908 survey map.

Greenslate said that Emma acquired the land, which was located on the northwest section of today's Lewis Park site, through a deed from the Da Rosas, who desired to assist Emma in being able to marry Manuel Lewis, who did not own property.

"In those days, it was custom that a man owned property and a home before he could ask a girl's father for her hand in marriage," Greenslate said. "But I understand that it was a common law that when a woman married and she had land that it went into community property."

Oddly, Greenslate said, her 1908 map shows that the land was still listed as the property of Emma, when it should have instead been listed primarily in her husband's name.

Resolving a park naming dilemma

Although Greenslate said she is very proud to be associated with the Lewis name, she added that she believes the park should actually have a different name.

"The park should be named Perry Park, because that was my grandfather's land where the park is located," Greenslate said. "There was just a little alcove (of land) bordering his land that belonged to Emma. Manuel Lewis did not own any land, but it was prearranged that he would settle on Emma's parcel of land after they married. It doesn't make sense that they named it Lewis Park, since the majority of the land - besides that small alcove - was Perry land."

Greenslate said that the park was named during a city council meeting based on the fact that the Lewis family was the last family to own part of the park site property.

After a failed attempt to have the park renamed, Greenslate raised about \$500 from her family members to place a 2,000-pound memorial boulder at the park. The boulder includes an affixed plaque dedicated to her greatgrandfather, Antone Rodrigues Perry.

A ceremony for the memorial, which was held on Nov. 15, 2003 and emceed by Greenslate, was attended by four generations of Perry-Lewis family members and included a speech by District 7 City Councilmember Robbie Waters, who was instrumental in the efforts to bring the memorial to the park.

While recently observing the Antone Rodrigues Perry memorial, Greenslate said, 'Ît's nice for people to know that this was my great-grandfather's land and this (memorial) substantiates that."

Through the efforts of Greenslate, who also completed a project to replace the gravestones in the Antone Rodrigues Perry plot at the St. Joseph's Cemetery at 21st Street and Broadway, visitors of Lewis Park will continuously be treated to a history lesson of what came long before the park and its large green lawns, children's play area, tennis courts and other free public amenities.

Today's economic realities: Preparing for the unknown

Imagine driving along an unfamiliar cliff road that has no guardrail, in a dense fog. A wrong turn could spell disaster. That's today's real estate market. But there are some things you can do during this difficult economic reality. You can educate yourself about this new realty world and adjust your mindset. Here are some practical suggestions for buyers and sellers – a mental framework if you will – that could be the guardrail for your journey through the mist.

Buyers and Sellers

NEW LISTING

Whether a buyer or seller, you can start by learning the differences between bankowned listings (REOs), "short sales" and traditional owner sellers. Get good advice. Work with a seasoned Realtor who can show you how the shifting supply of REO vs. non-REO properties will affect your plans.

Today's Realtor should be able to show you overall market conditions for your area and price range; and show you how things have changed in the last six to eight years and the past few months.

You especially need to be aware of what I call "micromarket" dynamics. The impact of a poor economy and home foreclosures is not uniform across the region. You'll find availability, values and demand being quite different from one neighborhood to another and even the pace of change can vary—hence micro-markets. You need to know what is happening in your neighborhood now.


Sellers

Sellers should educate themselves about what is happening with the real estate market where they live. Go beyond sales comparisons by gaining an historical perspective; find out whether values have held up or declined, and differentiate between your neighborhood's distressed and non-distressed properties in good times and bad. Find out, too, if you are competing with ROs. Banks typically value their listings 15 percent to 20 percent below the local market, dragging down the value you of your home.

Selling within 3 months?

For an owner choosing to sell in the near future, they need to learn about market trends, standing inventory, months of inventory and sales trends. Currently, price is king. Sellers need to be realistic, understand that buyers are in the driver's seat and price their property to be the next sale. An experienced agent can help get them the best deal available but will not be able to get a price that buyers are unwilling to pay.

If the seller has little choice but to sell (difficulty keeping up with the mortgage payments, for example), it's more important to elect the appropriate agent than learn about current market conditions. Select a Realtor who can suggest financial options to explore and is experienced at selling homes under trying/ difficult conditions; this requires knowledge of what lenders expect and the tenacity and patience to see it through.



Begin now to educate yourselves about market dynamics. Seek out information about neighborhood trends and don't be afraid to ask a Realtor to help you set up an Internet search that will give you real time information. The goal should be to put yourself in a position to pick the optimum point at which you can get good value for your home that meets your selling objective (such as downsizing).

Buyers

Buyers need to consider which part of the market segment they will be involved in. Price, neighborhood or function (more bedrooms for example)? Buyer's need to educate themselves about current

Buying in the next few

With a short time frame in which to buy, it is critical for buyers to be well-prepared and financially prequalified before making an offer. Single-family home sales, median price showing movement

April showed some fluctuation in median sales price and sales volume. This data, compiled by the Sacramento Association of Realtors, is collected from the MetroList multiple listing services and covers Sacramento County and the city of West Sacramen-

There were 1,707 sales in April, a 1 percent de-

crease from the 1.725 sales last month, but a 17 percent increase over last year's 1,450 sales. REO properties continue to be a defining factor in the inflated rated of sales, this month attributing for over 65 percent of all sales. This percentage, however, has made small declines each month since January, where distressed properties accounted for over 75 percent of sales.

The median sales price moved slightly, decreasing .2 percent from \$167,500 to \$167,100 this month. The current median price is down 29.5 percent from inventory given the cur-\$236,888 price recorded last year. The Total Listing Inventory is also down, showing a 14.2 percent decrease from 6,266 to 5,377 this month. Compared to last year, April shows a 37.6 percent decrease from the 8,612 listings recorded. The Housing Market Supply has decreased 13.9 percent to 3.1 months from last month and 47.5

percent from last year. This figure represents the amount of time - in months - it would take to deplete the total listing median rent rate of sales. According to MLS Data, the average home spent 56 days on market before selling and measured just over 1,660 square feet.


> The recent and dramatic fluctuations in the market make for great head-lines, but the "bottom" of the market cannot be accurately predicted. Experienced Realtors have learned that the bottom of

the market is only evident after it has passed and trends have already turned positive. The graph below represents the change in single-family home sales, median sales price and FreddieMac 30-year loan commitment rates. The merging of all three near the X-axis suggests a shift in the market.

Condominium Resale Market

Sacramento condo sales made a 1.8 percent increase from 109 to 111 units. Compared with April 2008, sales are up 8 percent from the 103 units sold. This small number of sales has seen a varying median price in the last few months. A month-to-month comparison shows a 25 percent decrease from \$120,000 to the current median price of \$90,000. This marks a 35 percent from the \$138,500 median price last year. Distressed property sales in April – 70 total – accounted for 63.1 percent of all condo sales.

The Second Quarter numbers for 2009 are based seasonal trends and the April data.

- Tax credit is available until Dec. 1 (previously it expired on July 1);
- · Waiver of recapture (i.e., no repayment requirement) for properties purchased in 2009 prior to Dec. 1;
- The provision is retroactive to purchases made on or after Jan. 1, 2009. Recapture section does apply to properties sold in first three years;
- · Waiver of prohibition on financing by mortgage revenue bonds is includ-

six months to conclude - typically taking 2-plus months just to find out if you are the buyer chosen by the bank. If you're buying an REO, be prepared to move very quickly to make an offer once you find the one that's right for you. This is especially true below the \$200,000 price mark where we are seeing multiple buyers going after the same home. A day's indecision or not being pre-approved can cause you to lose out.

Buying a year from now?

Well over 80 percent of buyers today spend three to six months "window shopping online" before actually entering the market place. They are also familiar with the new timers on the market and could answer questions about how a new timer would work for you. There is no cost for this program and the goal is to help city residents use water efficiently. Again, it's free and you get practical and helpful information about your individual sprinkler set-up. Kennedy High building a good thing with ACE program

This past year, Kennedy High School was among several high schools from the greater Sacramento area to send students to live the life of architects, construction workers and engineers.

The ACE Mentor Program (ACE being an acronym for architecture, construction and engineering) is a group of professionals from those fields who come together to teach young people about their pro-

fession and maybe even draw them into that line of work.

Craig Yost, who teaches architecture at Kennedy High School, explained how he got involved with the program.

"I was contacted by the ACE Mentor Program and I thought it would be a great addition to my class instruction," Yost said. He felt that there were parts of his course that could be best covered by outside professionals.

Yost ended up rounding together 17 of his students to participate in the program.

But the program isn't just an excuse to get together and talk about cool buildings.

This year, participating schools were given the chance to completely overhaul an existing building. All schools were told to come up with a new use for an abandoned building using their expertise as architects, construction workers and engineers. The winning school would have their building constructed. This year the governing board chose the PG&E Powerhouse on Jibboom Street in

Sacramento as the building to be worked on by the schools.

The students got together once a week to work on the project beginning in September. Every other week they would meet with industry professionals who would help them to understand all that they would be doing to try and bring their idea to life. Beginning in February, the visits were increased to once per week until the presentation earlier this month.

During the year, the students have the chance to go out and learn about the things they would be doing from industry professionals. They were taken on tours and taught the ins and outs of the business and to help them with ideas for their project.

Freshman Scotty Shijo talked about the early process of coming up with their idea.

"We went around and talked to the (local) community and asked what they would want," he said. Among the most requested were an aquarium, a science center and a museum.

The team compromised and settled on building a natural science museum meant to educate people about the Sacramento area.

"I think we worked together really well," said senior Natalie Su. "At first it went pretty slow, but with a month or so before the presentation we worked a lot."

The presentation she spoke of is where the students bring their

ideas in front of judges from the program, who then decide who made the best plans.

Both Shijo and Su spoke about how they thought the judges were very impressed with their presentation, and it appears that they were. Out of 14 participating schools, Kennedy came in second place, just six points behind first-place Oakmont High School.

Despite falling irritatingly short of the prize, those involved seem pleased with their efforts.

Yost was so pleased with the effort of his students that he has already signed up to take part next year.

"These kids came together and did such a great job," Yost said. "They deserve a lot of credit for their work."

Shijo has agreed to come back next year and Yost said that the team is already 10 strong for next year's program. But second place is not an option in year two, according to Shijo.

"We want to take the win," he said.

As for Su, who initially didn't care much for architecture class, she came to enjoy the project very much.

"I'm upset that we didn't get to participate (in 2007-08)," she said. "It was a really fun thing."

She explained that her favorite part of the project was that it brought her together with people that she wouldn't know otherwise.

The 15 other students from Kennedy High School are: Derrick Ching, Kerrigan Cory, Joseph Craig-Ferraz, Kevin Ha, Curtis Katsura, Taylor Masters, Mark Matney, Martin Pauly, Margarite Perez, George Pierce, Susan Vang, Brian Wan, Casey Wong, Michael Yee and Kevin Yoshihara.

The ACE Mentor Program has affiliates in 30 states as well as Washington, DC. California alone has five affiliates: Los Angeles, Palm Springs, San Diego and San Francisco join Sacramento is bringing this program to high school students.

City College gets ready for another summer of Shakespeare

"Much Ado About Nothing," a tale of romance, betrayal, death and conspiracy, all set in Messina, Sicily. This William Shakespeare play is set to open in July at the annual Sacramento Shakespeare Festival performed at the William A. Carroll Amphitheatre at William Land Park.

If romantic comedy is not your style, what about an action and adventure with a touch of English history in Scott Lynch-Diggins' adaptation of "Robin Hood."

Lynch-Diggins wrote this play as if it was written by Shakespeare, using the same style of language, the type of scenes Shakespeare wrote about," explained Festival Coordinator and Director Luther Hanson. "Every season, we try to find shows that have a common theme. Doing this helps people understand the plays better - they know what to look for."

Connecting with the Classics

Some feel attending an outdoor performance of a play written by one of the world's greatest playwright is lost among today's younger generation.

"I think kids today know more one-liners from fictional characters like the X-Men's Wolverine more than Shakespeare's Beatrice and Benedick, a couple too stubborn to confess their love for one another," said Kay Carlo, theater enthusiast. "That's one story line that never dies."

It's true. For some, understanding Shakespeare can be tough sometimes. For near-

ly 40 years, the Sacramento Shakespeare Festival produced by the Sacramento City College theater program has designed a line up that would complement a viewer's prior knowledge about Shakespeare and attempt to help the younger generation understand the performance.

Dominique Jones, the actress playing Beatrice in "Much Ado About Nothing," said she is up to the challenge.

"You can definitely see when something clicks," said the three-year SCC theater veteran. "You can see the lights go on when they get it, and then they get excited, and they want to be a part of the show."

"I believe people watch reality shows because they enjoy seeing human nature and that is what you see in Shakespeare's plays," said Chris Iwata, dean of the Humanities and Fine Arts Division at Sacramento City College. "Shakespeare's plays have messages and lessons that can be learned today."

Staging a local comeback

Several would agree the Shakespeare Festival not only provides teens the ability to observe the play they are required to read in school, but it also spotlights the educational theater program at SCC, creates a central arts scene for the city, and it contributes to a growing economy.

With these economic times supporting the program supports all kind of related industries," said Iwata. "We purchase food, lumber, clothing material and we employ people right here in the city to build the sets. It's an investment in our community."

The set design for each show is minimal, but fitting for the outdoor location. Some say it's like bringing your living room into the small neighborhood park.

"People set up little tables, blankets, an ice chest, you can sit on the grass, lie down, have your dinner and watch the play, it's so comfortable," said Hanson. We're cheaper than taking the family to the movies. It's about community, family and having fun."

Funding for the festival comes from SCC, ticket sales, private donations and support from the Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission. To expand and enhance the festival's reputation, the college has added "Shakespeare Lite," an outreach program that takes plays to outlying areas that might not otherwise experience the festival. They have also started the High School Intern Program, which allows high school students to work alongside the festival's staff in all aspects of production, from scene shop to performance.

"Parents and teachers love this as a learning medium, and it's used to provide a lot of exciting learning activities for the kids," said Hanson.

Whether you are looking to brush up on your Elizabethan, or simply looking for a fun family activity that allows you to dine under the stars among 300 other theater aficionados, the Sacramento Shakespeare Festival is the place to be. 
