

Sac City Unified students increase academic growth among all groups

Sacramento City Unified School District superintendent Jonathan P. Raymond said Sept. 15 student achievement in both state and federal accountability measures for every student group but progress was not sufficient to meet higher new national performance bars in English Language Arts and Mathematics. Raymond released district results on Sept. 15 at 10 a.m. at Ethel Phillips Elementary School, 2930 21st Ave.

"We moved forward, but not enough for too many students," Raymond said.

Raymond is the district's new superintendent; hailing from North Carolina, the administrator started work Aug. 21.

"Today's news conference is about informing our community about how well we are serving our students," Raymond said. "It is important that we be transparent and takes ownership for our results and that we showcase our principals and schools who are increasing student achievement on their campuses."

Among the state API highlights Raymond released:

• Under the state Academic Performance Index accountability system, SCUSD gained 11-points to reach 746 on the API, which matched the county and was under the overall state API of 755.

Twenty-four schools, 2 more than last year, met or exceeded California's API target of 800
All student groups, such as African American, Hispanic, Asian, Pacific Islanders, Eng-

ican, Hispanic, Asian, Pacific Islanders, English Learners and low-income students saw API growth ranging from 2 to 26 percentile points.

Students also made progress in English Language Arts and Mathematics under the federal accountability measure even as targets increase by approximately 11 points each year. However, growth was not sufficient to meet Adequate Yearly Progress targets. District wide, 37 of 46 AYP targets were met.

Last year, SCUSD met 44 of 46 targets. Forty schools of 86 reporting AYP results met 100 percent of their targets. (The district has three more schools, but they do not report AYP results because of their small numbers.) SCUSD also saw a significant increase in the number of Program Improvement (PI) Schools—sites failing to meet AYP targets for two consecutive years. Schools in Year 1 of PI status jumped from three in 2008-09 to 15 in 2009-10.

"We performed in the middle of the pack compared to similar districts and to the state," Raymond said. "We do have great things happening at many schools for children, but not at every school—and that is and must be our goal."



Know your neighbor

A delicious slice of Italian tradition in Land Park

In a culinary landscape that features pizza commercials boasting more cheese and toppings than is necessary or wise, one pizzeria is attempting to keep up a long-held tradi-

Masullo Pizza is modestly decorated - simple. And that's just how owner Robert Masullo wants to keep

"We strive to emulate what you would get at a pizzeria in İtaly," Masullo said. "American pizza has gone further and further away from Italian pizzas."

The difference is more than just the size. According to Masullo, it comes down to quality over quan-

"Our pizzas are not as heavily topped; they don't have a ton of cheese," he said. "It's about tasting individual prod-

Fiery flavor

One of the unique aspects of the pizzeria is its use of a wood oven to cook the pizza. And while the oven in some ways limits what they can do, Masullo considers the old-style oven a unifying factor that keeps the tradition alive.

The oven is fed with fresh firewood from local farms throughout the day to keep it going at an astounding 800 degrees. The high temperature makes it possible to cook the traditional pizzas in just over two min-

The place has a strong local presence too, as all of the tables and chairs were made from an old walnut tree from 10th and Richards.

Popular pies

Since its opening in June of 2008, Masullo has seen that some people are ready to make the change to a

less complex, more traditional pizza.

"I think in general in California there is an awareness for eating quality instead of quantity," he said. "People appreciate the work we put into our pizza."

pizzeria's The www.masullopizza. com, lists 15 pizzas on the menu. Most of them are quite simple, consisting mostly of mozzarella, tomato and a few other items depending on the pizza. People can special order pizzas, within reason. Just don't expect to come in and walk out with a pizza that weighs eight pounds; Masullo pizzas are about the size of a dinner plate. And all the emphasis is on taste.

The most popular pizza they sell is called the "Margarita" which is just tomato, mozzarella and

'People use it as a test," he said. "It's kind of our default pizza."

The oven is certainly one of the stars of the show, which has become evident in the pizzeria's yearlong existence.

"People want to see how it works," he said. "A lot of kids, but plenty of adults

Masullo said that the crew of five people chop their own wood out in back and feed the oven a little bit at a time throughout the day. People who are interested in seeing the process of making pizza in a wood oven can ask for permission to see it depending on how busy it as at that

And it does get busy. Masullo recalled a time last year when the line stretched out the door.

The pizzeria is also a good place to go to try a new kind of pizza as well. There's the "Jacque-line" which features potato, fontina, bacon and oregano. Try ordering that at Pizza Hut. And then there's the "Eileen"

which has mushrooms, bacon, mozzarella, sage, cream and black pepper. Or maybe you'd like the "Evelyn" which has moz-zarella, zucchini, mushrooms and ham. You more of a pepperoni person? They have you covered there, too. Just walk up to the counter and or-der yourself an "Ameri-

At Masullo Pizza, you won't find pinball machines or six-foot-tall singing rats. But if Masullo and company have their way, you will walk out with a new appreciation for the craft of making a pizza.

Portuguese Historical and Cultural Society celebrates 30th anniversary

Members of the Portuguese Historical and Cultural Society gathered together at the Sacramento Portuguese Holy Spirit Society Hall on Pocket Road September 13 to celebrate a very special occasion – the 30th anniversary of their cherished organization.

Founded by the late Lorraine (Perry) D'Alessandro and her son Joseph D'Alessandro, the non-profit society has enjoyed a successful journey of promoting Portuguese historical and cultural heritage and providing a harmonious environment for those of Portuguese ancestry to remain connected to their ethnic past.

Among the accomplishments of the organization have been launching successful campaigns to establish the Portuguese Community Park, Portuguese street names, historical registry for Portuguese meeting halls and churches and working with the local media to publish historical articles.

Specifically recognized during the gathering were recent Portuguese-related historical articles published in The Pocket News and successful efforts made to halt the city's former goal of changing the name of Pocket Road to Riverside Boulevard.

A special celebration

The Sept. 13 gala event, which drew more than 200 people, including dignitaries from various Portuguese organizations, featured a full program with a lunch catered by Antoinette Duarte, speakers and entertainment.

The gathering, which was also attended by several senior members who made a special effort to participate despite struggling with personal health issues, began with a welcoming by Nancy Souza-Mallory, a presentation of both the American and Portuguese flags by local Boys Scouts and an invocation by the Rev. Giancarlo Mittempergher, pastor of the St. Elizabeth Parish.

The main speakers of the afternoon were Dr. Elamano Costa, John Bento and Joseph D'Alessandro. Other speakers included Frank Dias, Al Balshor, Dolores (Silva) Greenslate and Gui Sequiera.

Joseph D'Alessandro, who served as the society's first president, marveled at the many accomplishments of the organization since its inception, noting that the society began with a much smaller focus.

'I think it's very encouraging, because we started with a very small focus, a very small idea," Joseph D'Alessandro said. "We knew the area as the Pocket, we knew that Riverside Road at that time led to the little community of Riverside and Pocket was its own community. We thought we had to kind of come together to preserve the rich, long history of this neighborhood, because it was getting developed and it was changing rapidly and to showcase why it became what it is today, why it was called the Pocket, why there was a Lisbon School.

It was a real attempt to kind of preserve the culture and the traditions of this neighborhood, but it grew beyond that to the greater Sacramento Valley."

And looking to the future, Joseph D'Alessandro added, "It's beautiful to have this 30 years of recognition of the history and tradition and realizing that we're going to be (continuing) for a long time, because the history is still happening and the tradition is also happening toService in the society

The efforts of Joseph D'Alessandro and others who have dedicated themselves to the society and the promotion of Portuguese heritage and culture were certainly not overlooked during the gathering, as the society's President Terri White and Vice President Mary Ann Marshall presented several awards of recognition.

In addition to recognition given to Joseph D'Alessandro as the society's first president, recognition was giv-

en to Lionel Holmes, a former society president and a former, 22-year editor of O Progresso, the society's quarterly newsletter, Marilia Wiget, a former society president and current editor of O Progresso, Greenslate, historian and archivist, and Sequeira, the society's secretary.

Also honored at the event were: Dias, who established a Portuguese radio program that broadcasts the late mass from St. Elizabeth Portuguese Catholic Church for those who are unable to attend the mass, Balshor, a longtime Sacramento florist, who has promoted many society events with his flowers, and District 7 city Councilman Robbie Waters, who was active in the naming and development process of Pocket area streets, parks and schools and the establishment of the new library, which was named in his honor.

Joseph D'Alessandro said that when it comes to reviewing the success of the society, many other people are very deserving of recognition.

He added that it is important to remember the society's original members, which in addition to himself, his mother, Greenslate and Holmes, included Lorraine's sister, Evelyn Nordeste, Tony Dutra, Clarence Nevis, Aileen Alves Gage, Clarence Machado, Grace Rose and Gregg Campbell.

These members were extremely noteworthy, explained Joseph D'Alessandro, considering how timely their efforts were in establishing the foundations of the society.

ety.
"Had we not (established the society) at this time, it would have been much more of a challenge," said Joseph D'Alessandro, who recalls keeping his horse at his cousin's Pocket area ranch

and seeing miles of open land from the site of Kennedy High School and beyond to the south. "At that time, there were more of the pioneers who were still alive and there were more of the immigrants who were still alive. Since then, things have changed and development has taken over much more of the area and the face of the landscape has changed. I think we started at the right time when there were still some elements that were recognizable and real and we were able to bring them to the future."

Future's past

And in terms of the future, during the event, the society embraced a challenge to establish a Portuguese museum in the Sacramento area.

Wiget said that such Portuguese museum projects are being reviewed in the Bay Area and Turlock and that a Sacramento museum would likely be located inside an existing building, perhaps at a local college facility.

Frank Dias, 83, a longtime Sacramento resident who was born on a ranch in Newcastle, Calif. to Pico, Azores islands natives Francisco Rodrigues Dias and Francisca Luisa Dias, praised the society for its efforts in celebrating the organization's 30th anniversary.

"This was a triple-A, first-class event," Frank Dias said. "(The society) had that (event) very well organized. This organization, everything they do is always first class and this was definitely no different."

Supporting Dias' words, Greenslate added, "This celebration was a great way to show what we have done and to express our thanks to all the people who have helped us to achieve this milestone of 30 years. It was a won-



Local officials get inside look at new Pocket-Greenhaven library

Sacramento City Councilmember Robbie Waters hosted the new Sacramento Public Library director, Rivkah Sass, on a tour of the under-construction Robbie Waters Pocket-Greenhaven Library, 7335 Gloria Dr., on September 2. The tour group received construction updates and got a first-hand look at many of the new 15,000square-foot library's features.

The lunchtime tour was led by Sacramento Public Library Facilities Director Don Tucker, accompanied by Duane Wray, project manager from Regent Development.

Checking out the library

The first stop on the tour was the library mock-up, clearly visible to passers-by from the Gloria Drive side of the construction site. The mock-up is used to demonstrate the actual materials to be used on the project. Next, the tour looked at the main entrance to the library, which is now clearly discernible. Above the entrance will be a decorative façade of books, funded by the Friends of the Robbie Waters Pocket-Greenhaven Library volunteer organization, to add further character to the building.

The next stop was in the main browsing area of the library - notable for the high volume of open space, with distinctive arches that let in volumes of natural daylight.

Sass was especially delighted with the children's area. Sass and Councilmember Waters stepped into the cantilevered "children's tower" - another distinctive architectural feature visible from Gloria Drive. Tucker described the children's area and the Early Literacy Center, which will be the largest of any of the libraries the Sacramento system.

"The Early Literacy Center is phenomenal," said Sass.

Designed to encourage reading and learning at the earliest age, the center will benefit from a generous community gift that will enhance the basic equipment. Library services for children were the most highly identified need in the community needs assessment survey conducted by the library system in

The teen area was also inspected and Tucker stated the area will have a glass partition for noise suppression and will be behind the customer service desk. Next stop was the 120seat community room where Councilmember Waters was the first to spot the beam signed

Tips for tough talks with your teens

Again and again, parents tell me how frustrating it is to try to talk to their teens about their concerns. The words are barely out of their mouths when their teens respond by getting angry, rolling their eyes, and leaving the room. I'll admit that talking with your teens about controversial topics is challenging, but I've found that keeping in mind a few tips can help parents feel better about the outcomes of these difficult conversations.

Consider the timing of your conversation. Parents often make the mistake of wanting to talk about their concerns immediately after an incident occurs, before they're calm enough to talk things through effectively. I admit that it's tempting to buy into the "there's no time like the present" attitude and want to get the talk over with right then and there. However, it's unrealistic when you catch your son sneaking back into the house at 4 a.m. to have a meaningful conversation before the sun comes up. Let him know in a calm voice that you are upset and want to talk, but you are going to take time to cool off and think about how you feel.

It's then crucial to think about the specifics of what bothers you about his choice to sneak out. Go beyond focusing on your anger and what his consequences will be; instead, consider why it worries you that he snuck out. Then think about how you'll communicate these concerns to him. Once your thoughts are clear and you feel calm, you'll be prepared to talk.

Consider the setting for the conversation. Take all steps to speak in a neutral location,

such as at the kitchen table or on the family room couch. If you call your son into your bedroom and have him sit in a chair while you stand up and talk down to him, you're setting up your teen to get annoyed and begin fight-

When you start the conversation, be aware of your tone and volume. If you open the discussion by speaking calmly and softly, you'll give the message that you are concerned (rather than furious) and want to talk (rather than

It's crucial to discuss both what he did and how it made you feel. Many parents resist talking about how worried they were when they found their teen wasn't at home, because it leaves them feeling too vulnerable and breaks an unwritten rule about how to talk to kids when they're "in trouble." Trust me, your teen will respect you for going beyond being simply angry to sharing your concerns, and you'll have a better outcome to the discussion.

Then, be prepared to really listen to your teen and try to understand why he made the choice he made. I've found that most parents have reached a conclusion as to why their adolescent did something and what the consequence should be, prior to beginning the conversation. Instead, have an open mind to what your teen says, and listen without interruption. If you're unclear, be sure to ask questions until you are. Perhaps you'll learn that your son snuck out to see a friend who'd been upset about his parents having a fight and needed to talk. Granted, sneaking out to see his friend is unacceptable and is worthy of consequences. However, knowing this might influence how you respond.

The second half of life

Exercising daily opportunity

A woman in my Mini-Med School class at UC Davis responded to a lecture about the importance of exercise with a remark that likely represented a significant percentage of students – most over the age of 45. "Honestly, I have to tell you that I just hate exercise," she boldly admitted. 'I'd much rather hunker down on the couch with a book!" There was a collective mummer of agreement.

For people who strongly resist the idea of beginning an exercise program - and also for those who grasp the importance of it, I have some painless short cuts that I've in-

tegrated into my daily routine for years.

· Say "No thanks, I don't need any help," when the courteous grocery clerk offers to have someone carry your bags or push your cart - to your car. If you've just filled a small hand-carry basket and you have two or three bags of groceries, its very likely you can manage to get them to the car yourself, without a cart. I balance the load using the bag handles, walk slowly and do a few repetitions of arm lifts. I get to work my biceps while pulling in my stomach muscles and tucking in the hip area to maintain proper posture for standing exercise. It's very important to understand the ergonomic way to do this because it's possible to do it wrong and hurt your back. If you've pushed the cart, again, flex your arm muscles, pull in your tummy and the gluteal muscles as you walk. Use conscious posture while lifting and loading bags into your car and feel the muscles you are using. So you get maybe 8 to 10 reps of arm lifts, some healthy tightening of the core area and, if you park far enough from the store, a little aerobic walking for extra measure.

• Stairs are your friend. If you live in a two-story home - and any time you have the opportunity to take the stairs rather than ride an elevator - you've got an opportunistic exercise. To make stair climbing count as exercise you have to again be conscious of your body. Tuck the pelvis in, tighten the gluteal muscles and stomach muscles. (Don't climb with your back curved and butt out.) With this erect posture, climb stairs so that you feel the muscles in your legs tighten and lift you. You should feel it in your thighs and in your calves.

• The vacuum cleaner is your friend, as is the garden rake and push broom. Of course, these implements are designed to make cleaning easy, but I use them as power tools. I tighten up my biceps when I push and pull the vacuum, pull in the core muscles and condition myself as I clean the house. There are numerous opportunities to slip in a little "opportunistic exercise" every day – and what you can do depends on your schedule and activities. Just be open to those moments and prepared to use them.

By the way, people do look at me strangely when I am power lifting my grocery bags. But, one of the freedoms of growing older is really not caring what people in the parking lot think about me. Of course, consult with your doc about any exercise program – even my "accidental" routines!



Five juveniles arrested in vandalism spree

On Sunday, August 23, the Sacramento Police Department responded to Lisbon Elementary School (7555 South Land Park Dr.) in the Pocket area regarding a burglary. Officers determined that the school had been broken into and several cans of spray paint were stolen. The thieves used the stolen paint to vandalize (graffiti) multiple homes in the area near the school.

A witness contacted District 7 Councilman Robbie Waters and provided information about the crimes. That information was given to the Sacramento Police Department's POP Team (Problem Oriented Policing). The POP Team is a group of officers that work closely with community members and organizations to find solutions to neighborhood problems.

Based on the information provided, officers were recently able to link six juveniles to the crimes. Five of the six juveniles were between the ages of 12 and 15 years-old; they were arrested for burglary and felony vandalism. One juvenile was 10-years-old; he was not arrested.

According to the Sacramento Police Department, this arrest and investigation is another example of the great partnerships that exist between the Police Department, city leaders, and the community. All three had an integral part in solving this crime spree.












Local church's 'Sacramento California Stake' celebrates 75th anniversary

A major milestone was recently recognized, as the California Sacramento Stake of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints - also known as the Mormon church - celebrated its 75th anniversary.

The announcement that the stake - a collection of wards and branches similar in formation to a Catholic diocese - would be formed occurred on Nov. 4, 1934. The Sacramento Stake, as well as the then-newly designated Gridley Stake, was scheduled to begin functioning on Jan. 1, 1935.

In honor of the Sacramento Stake's diamond anniversary, a gathering at the stake's Liahona Ward building at 7401 24th St. was held on Aug. 29.

The event featured a 5K run/walk, food, displays showcasing the church's rich history and dance performances.

A special day

Lindsay Bendinger, a spokesperson for the Sacramento Stake, explained that reaching the 75-year mark is a very special accomplishment, noting that this is a "very exciting time" for the stake.

Bendinger added that the anniversary gathering, which drew about 1,000 people, was designed not only to celebrate the history of the stake, but it was also held to recognize its "beautiful diversity."

"What began as one very small unit 75 years ago has grown both in numbers and diversity," Bendinger said.

Within the stake, several units were designated and made accessible for non-English-speaking members and visitors.

Sacramento Stake President Mitchell Rogers provided the following details regarding these units.

The Sacramento Stake is home to a Hmong branch of approximately 300 members, a Tongan ward of about 400 members and a Marshallese group of about 60 members," Rogers said. "We also have small groups of Cambodians and Samoans. We also have a group of about 20 Fijians. We, of

course, have members from all over the world, including the People's Republic of China, Vietnam and many European countries.

Summing up the diversity of the stake, Rogers added, "The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has room for everyone."

Stake through time

During its 75-year history, the Sacramento Stake experienced much growth in its membership.

Beginning with five wards and one branch, the Sacramento Stake - the fifth stake established in California - originally had 1,611 members.

Today, the stake has more than 3,400 members and includes the following 11 units: Sacramento 1st and 2nd wards (located in the Pocket and South Sacramento areas), Sacramento 3rd Hmong Branch, Sacramento 4th Young Single Adult Branch, West Sacramento Ward, Liahona Tongan Ward and Laguna Čreek 1st through 5th wards (located within the Elk Grove area).

Historically, the Sacramento Stake covered a much larger area, as today, 23 stakes are located within the original stake boundaries, which included Stockton, Tracy and Roseville.

Although the Sacramento Stake, which first had its stake center or headquarters at the 51st Street and Dover Way building in Sacramen-to, is celebrating its 75th anniversary, the church's presence in the Sacramento region began much

Predating the Gold Rush, the first members of the church to arrive in the area were William Brown Ide, his wife Sara and their nine children.

After joining an Oregonbound wagon train in Independence, Mo., the family eventually changed directions and joined a California-bound wagon train that reached Sutter's Fort on Oct. 25, 1845.

William played an essential role in a major event in California history: the Bear Flag Revolt.

Hearing rumors that Mexican authorities were planning to drive out settlers, William joined 32 others in seizing the Mexican province of Sonoma on June 14, 1846.

A few days after the raising of the Bear Flag, William presented a proclamation recognizing the new California Republic.

The proclamation, which was influenced by the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States, set forth its goals to "establish and perpetuate a liberal, a just and ĥonorable government, which shall secure to all civil, religious and personal liberty; which shall insure the security of life and property; which shall encourage industry, virtue and

William served as the first and only president of what became known as the Bear Flag Party. This position was brief, however, as U.S. Army Major John C. Fremont and 60 soldiers took control of the site in the name of the United States on June 23, 1846.

About nine months after William Ide's arrival in California, Samuel Brannan led the first company of Latter-day Saints to California, as the group arrived in San Francisco on July 31, 1846.

Brannan, who later became California's first millionaire, eventually left the church after receiving word that the church's president, Brigham Young, had no interest in having the church's headquarters located on the West Coast.

Growth and glory

Many early California Mormons worked for John Sutter, including six who were assisting with the construction of Sutter's sawmill in Coloma and were present at the time of James Marshall's discovery of gold on July 24, 1848.

About 25 members of the church formed the Sacramento Branch in 1872. The branch was first led by its president Aaron C. Garlick, who held the position for 24

In its formative years, the church met at various sites, including the Garlick home at 6th and O streets, Pioneer Hall at 1007 7th St. and Foresters' Hall at 716 I St.

The first Latter-day Saints building was completed at 2812 34th St. in Sacramento in 1926, followed by another Sacramento Mormon church building at 4647 U St. in about 1934 - the year the formation of the stake was announced.

Prior to that year, the area where the stake was located was within the boundaries of the California Mission, which was first established in 1846 and led by Brannan.

In 1944, the Sutter Ward building was constructed at 1424 24th St., where the first stake conference was held on May 28, 1945.

It was at this latter-mentioned building that local radio station, KROY 1240

AM, regularly broadcast a 15-minute, Sunday morning music and spoken word program during the early 1950s.

The church and its Sacramento Stake has continued to expand in the area and with the dedication of the Sacramento Temple in Rancho Cordova on Sept. 3, 2006, the church in the Sacramento region is considered to have reached its full maturity.

Restoring the roar: McClatchy's greatest return to the gridiron

Several all-time great players from past McClatchy football teams showed up for the Lions' Red and White Scrimmage on Saturday, August 29. The scrimmage represented the wrap-up of the two-week summer camp and workouts for the Lion varsity and junior varsity teams.

The largest turnout from any team was the 1964 squad, which posted a record of seven wins, one loss and one tie. Quarterback Gary Saccani, running back Richard Nishio, and linemen Jim Relles, Mike Budney and Pete Cotter were on hand.

Roaring forward

Restore the Roar, a lion sports booster organization founded in 2007, helped organize the event. Founding members of Restore the Roar, and former Lion players, George Potiris (1973) and Rodney Kunisaki (1974) were on hand. The organization helps support the CKM

sports activities as well as keeping the long and heralded sports tradition visible to current CKM athletes.






