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

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
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


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New Pocket library is true 'green' building

The Robbie Waters Pocket-Greenhaven Library was designed with the intent to create an environmentally responsible asset to the Pocket-Greenhaven community, and serve as an example of contextual green architecture.

Designed to embrace the site's residential context, the library anchors the corner of the complex shared by a 500student capacity charter high school and city playfield.

High open volumes created by sloped roofs define and separate the interior spaces while clerestory windows within these high volumes allow natural daylight to penetrate deep into the building's core. The interior space program includes a community meeting room with exterior access, story-time reading tower, children's collection, teen room, quiet reading room, technology reference area, fiction and non-fiction collection and staff support spaces.

The new library targets Leadership in Energy and Environ-mental Design (called LEED) Silver rating with energy efficiency strategies to minimize energy consumption. LEED is the Green Building Rating System and was developed by the U.S. Green Building Council. It has become the standard for environmentally sustainable construction. Proper solar orientation for maximum natural daylight, high performance HVAC system with localized zoning controls, daylight and occupancy sensor controls for built-in artificial lights, low flow water fixtures, low volatile organic compound and recycled material products are just a few of the LEED strategies employed in the Robbie Waters Pocket-Greenhaven Library.

Sustainable sites

Due to its advantageous location and key site features, the project qualifies for multiple points in the sustainable sites category. Alternative transportation methods are encouraged. The project provides bike racks for more than five percent of all users, and is located within a quarter mile of public transportation routes including Regional

Transit route 81 and 200 as well

Water efficiency

By working closely with the landscape architect, the design team was able to successfully reduce the amount of water needed on site. Water efficient landscaping was selected to achieve a 50 percent reduction of potable water consumption. Also, high efficiency fixtures were selected in order to achieve a water use reduction of 30 percent. In doing so, the Pocket-Greenhaven Library reduces the burden on the municipal water supply and waste water systems.

Energy and Atmosphere

With the future of our planet in mind, systems including the building envelope, HVAC, and lighting were designed to maximize energy performance, while minimizing the library's impact on global warming and climate change. A commissioning strategy was created to ensure the energy related systems continue running to specifications.

Materials and resources

In an attempt to support indigenous resources and lessen transportation, local materials were specified for this project. providing recycling containers recycled or salvaged at least 75 percent of non-hazardous construction and demolition.

In order to achieve a high quality indoor environment, low-emitting materials were chosen for the project. These materials including adhesives and sealants, paints and coatings, carpet, and compost wood work to reduce indoor air contaminants. The lighting and thermal comfort of the Library was also carefully considered and designed to allow controls for individuals and multi-occupant areas. The HVAC system meets the latest performance standards.

These materials were harvested and manufactured within 500 miles of the project site for a min of 10 percent of project material cost. Targeting materials with a high level of recycled content was also a priority. In doing so, the design team successfully decreased the impacts resulting from extraction of virgin materials. The construction team also contributed in this LEED category. They decreased the waste hauled to landfills by near the construction site and

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Boxing at the Relles

One Christmas, my father gave two pairs of boxing gloves to my

brothers and me. He hoped this would help us learn to defend ourselves. Terry and I put on the gloves and sparred. Soon other kids came over to try on the gloves and box. We set up an imaginary ring in our backyard. A large tree marked one side of the ring, the garden in the rear marked another, the patio another side and the fence opposite the patio completed the

Soon we began scheduling regular 3-round bouts. I fought Dan Petrocchi and he bloodied my nose. He won in a TKO. I fought him later that year in a return match and bloodied his nose. I fought both the Ducray boys. They were tough fighters. I moved adroitly around the ring, kept

jabbing and avoided heavy blows. I "flew like a butterfly," but did not "sting like a bee."

We had many other good fights in the newly founded Relles gym. I remember one fight in particular. Lou Viani fought a barnburner with Bob Pesce. They came right out throwing blows as if the fight would last only one round. No blood appeared, but faces reddened from the contact of the gloves. In the second round, the pace slowed. The boys slowly ran out of gas. By the third round, the pace of the fight slowed to a crawl, but the boys kept throwing leather, missing mostly. At the very end of the round, Lou slipped to the ground and in the heat of battle, Bob kept punching. We rushed in to halt the bout. By this time, the two boys were very angry at each other, but we made them shake hands and called the fight a draw. After that, the two good friends walked away with arms around one another's shoulders.

Bob Pesce died from a stroke last year. Lou Viani, a successful architect here in town, found the time to attend his old friend's funeral. They might have once traded blows, but the bond of friendship they forged on Janey Way lasted a lifetime.

The days of boxing at the Relles gym are only a memory now, but dad was right, the boxing did teach us self-defense. It taught us more. We learned to settle our differences by the Marquis of Queensbury rules, not the rules of the street. This lesson was doubtlessly more important than simple self-defense.

Burbank High School has significant connection to Pocket area

For the majority of newcomers and most of the younger generation of the Pocket area, Burbank High School is just another local high school that seems to have no significant connection to this community. But other Pocket area residents remember differently.

Certainly with the 1967 establishment of John F. Kennedy High School, Pocket-Greenhaven area students instantly had a high school to call their own.

But they were not the only students to suddenly have a new alma mater, as students from outside of this area who attended Burbank High, as well as McClatchy High made up Kennedy's original student

Filling the new school

From Burbank alone, about 400 students transferred to Kennedy, largely contributing to a student body that decreased from about 2,700 students in the fall of 1966 to 2.137 in the fall of 1967.

Burbank's alma mater, as printed in its 1967 Oracle

yearbook, includes the line, We vow to love you, Burbank High with lasting fidel-

Perhaps there should have been a clause or an asterisk associated with this line for students who would be attending the Pocket area's first and still only high school.

The transferring of students to the new campus was one of mixed emotions, as Burbank and McClatchy students left their established schools and ventured into an unfamiliar environment.

Additionally, students who remained at these already established schools had to undergo the loss of many close friends who were transferred to Kennedy.

Ratchford Higgins, a long-time Burbank High physics teacher and yearbook advisor, remembers being one of the McClatchy students who lost friends to the opening of Kennedy High.

"A lot of my friends went there (to Kennedy) in that first year, so I knew a lot about what that first year was like and it wasn't much fun for them," Higgins said. "The senior year is supposed to be the pinnacle of the high school experience and it was all fragmented for them. Nobody knew the teachers and they didn't know each other."

Fortunately for the January 1968 graduates of Burbank, McClatchy and Kennedy, many separated friends were able to reunite as joint commencement exercises for these schools, as well as Johnson High, were held at the Memorial Auditorium on Jan. 20, 1968.

Following the exercises, an all-night graduation par-ty was held for the students at the Alpine Alley bowling lanes at 2326 Florin Road.

Higgins added that Kennedy benefitted from the fact that many of the area's best cross country runners resided within Kennedy's boundaries at the time of the school's

opening.
"I was on (McClatchy High's) cross country and track (teams) and we had always had the cross country championship," Higgins said. "But (Kennedy) got the best runners from our school and the best runners from Burbank and that was just too much to overcome. So, in Kennedy's first year, they were number one (in cross

country). (Kennedy) also had a really top miler. He won the Golden West Invitational and he won the California state championship in the mile. He would have been at Burbank (had he not been transferred to Kennedy)."

Maintaining the topic of running, Higgins said that

Burbank also had a longtime English teacher, named Paul Reed, who was a very active runner.

"They called (Reed) 'Mr. Marathon,' Higgins said. "He ran to school every day, he ran hundreds of marathons, liter-

ally. He was a character here. And more recently, we had a teacher who would ride his bicycle about 15 miles to Burbank every day."

The Burbank-Kennedy connection

Being that Burbank High undoubtedly has a direct connection to Kennedy High, the following tribute to the school serves as a sort of extension to Kennedy's rich 42-year history.

The roots of the school date back to 1958, when city school administrators determined there was a need to have a new south area high school for the purpose of handling the growing number of students at C.K. McClatchy and Hiram Johnson high

After a site for the school was selected, planning began for its construction.

Although the school's campus was scheduled to be opened in September 1962, construction strikes resulted in an extension of its opening to Jan. 21,

With the delay in Burbank's opening, students planning on attending classes at the new campus temporarily attended afternoon sessions at Johnson High.

During its earliest years, Burbank was led by its principal, Oliver A. Livoni, and vice principals and former Sacramento State College students, Edward B. Morrison and Marguerite L. Neal.

Despite being a new school, it did not take long for Burbank to establish many traditions and organizations.

One very early tradition that ceased to exist was a joint rally with Burbank and Johnson students prior to every

By 1966, a rivalry between these two schools abruptly ended this tradition.

Other traditions, as well as organizations, during Burbank's initial two years included the establishment of its Columbian blue and gold colors, Titan mascot, a fight song, alma mater, student government, football, baseball, basketball, track, swimming,

tennis, golf and cross country teams, dances, bands, an art club, a ski club, four language clubs, a yearbook and a newspaper.

Although the name of the yearbook has remained the same, the name of the newspaper, as well as its presentation has evolved.

The school's original newspaper was first printed in the fall of 1963 and was known as the Banner.

The publication was initially produced by first and sixth period journalism students, who alternately created editions of the newspaper.

Due to the lack of efficiency of this system, the following school year, the two classes were combined to create the newspaper.

The first editors of the combined classes were Richard Rouse, Sharon Yerman and Tim Smith.

The newspaper has since been renamed twice, first becoming known as The Mighty Titan and with its change to an online-only format, it became known as The Titan Ledger.

The Banner explained the reason that the Titan mascot was selected, noting, "The symbol 'Titan' stands for persons having enormous size, strength and power."

And the school's name honors a man who is so revered in the state's history that his birthday is annu-

ally celebrated in California as Arbor Day.

Luther Burbank legacy

Born on March 7, 1849, Luther Burbank, who resided in Santa Rosa for more than a half-century, was known for his experimental plant breed-

These experiments had a direct purpose, as his goal was to improve plant productivity with the objective of expanding food supplies throughout the world.

During his career, Burbank, who has often been referred to as "The Wizard of Horticulture," developed more than 800 strains and varieties of plants, which included about 200 varieties of fruits and many vegetables, nuts and

When the Burbank campus opened, it was not as fully developed as it is today.

And those familiar with the campus today know that it is one of the city's most artistic school campuses.

Among its artistic features are older mosaic details and more recent student-made ceramic work, including a tileplated mural, which reads"Titans," on the south side of the cafeteria and ceramic books at the entrance to the library.

Advance ceramics students of Ted Dal Porto also created murals for the nearby Regional Transit light rail station.

A large, concrete, artistically-designed bridge that was built by Burbank students also draws attention near the center of the campus.

Higgins said that Burbank students have been involved in many memorable activities, including the marching band's representation as the number one California high school marching band at the re-inauguration of the Statue of Liberty, the student-built, Guinness' recognized largest bicycle in the world, the construction of a bowling robot and many exciting sporting

Notable athletes among Burbank's alumni include Sacramento's renowned prize fighter Tony Lopez and several NFL and NBA players.

Reflecting upon the school's rich history, Burbank High Principal Ted Appel said that Burbank has undergone many changes throughout the years and appears to have a very promising future.

'While the area has changed, the school's commitment to serving the community has never wavered," Appel said. "The school was originally built to serve a more rural, agricultural population. It now proudly serves a richly diverse, international community. In 50 years, people will probably look back and talk about the dynamic opportunities that the school created through its support of its diverse population. With programs such as International Baccalaureate, the future is bright for graduates of Luther Burbank High School."



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Love is the 'heartbeat of the universe' in Sac Opera's 'La Traviata'

True love and tragic misunderstanding, aristocrats and commoners, noble sacrifice, betrayal and dying young... Sacramento Opera's production of Giuseppi Verdi's "La Traviata" has it all.

Verdi based his opera in three acts on a novel by Alexandre Dumas, fils, called "La dame aux Camélias." The novel, which was based on Dumas' own affair with the beautiful courtesan Marie Duplessis, who died at the age of 23 from consumption, a common term for tuberculosis. Duplessis was known for her petite figure, charming smile and her smart conversation in French salons of the day. It is reputed that no fewer than two French noblemen (and former lovers) were at her bedside when she passed away. In death, as in life, she was a legend.

In English, Dumas' work was translated as "Camille," and the title character was successfully portrayed to great success by Greta Garbo on the silver screen in 1936.

In contrast, the first performance of Verdi's opera, at Venice's La Fenice in 1853, was an utter failure. However, Verdi had faith that his work would endure ("La Traviata' last night a failure," he wrote.

"My fault or the singers'? Time will tell"). After some revisions, an 1854 production at the Teatro di San Benedetto in Venice proved to be successful. "La Traviata" has been in production ever since.

The title for Verdi's work,"La Traviata," means "The Woman Who Strayed," or "The Fallen Woman." It focuses on the lives of a famous courtesan, Violetta Valéry, and a young nobleman, Alfredo Germont. The two meet at a party she is hosting to celebrate her "recovery" from a "brief illness."

Alfredo woos Violetta, who has her doubts about the young man who "has loved her long from afar." However, she also wonders if he could "be the one." In the Act I finale, Violetta sings "Ah, fors'è lui" – "Perhaps, he is the one."

The second act finds the two as lovers, happily ensconced in the French countryside. But trouble is on the way, in the form of Alfredo's father, Giorgio Germont. Giorgio informs Violetta that his daughter's upcoming marriage is threatened because of Alfredo's affair with her. Because of her love for Alfredo, Violetta agrees to sacrifice her love for the sake of his family and leaves for her former life in Paris.

Alfredo, at first determined to bring her back, eventually is led to believe that Violetta has betrayed him. He confronts her publicly, throwing money in her face at a party. She faints and the members of the party reprimand him: "You have offended a noble lady."

Too late, Alfredo realizes that Violetta's love for him was true all along. In the third act, the lovely courtesan is told by her physician that she has not long to live, as her consumption has worsened dramatically. Violetta sings "Addio del passato" – "So closes my sad story." Alfredo rushes to her side, and the two lovers are reunited. Alfredo tells Violetta that he will take her away from Paris, back to the countryside. But she senses that her life is slipping away.

Together, Alfredo and Violetta sing "Gran Dio! morir si giovane" -"O, God! to die so young." Giorgio enters with a doctor to save Violetta, but it is too late – Violetta dies in her lover's arms.

'La Traviata" is listed in the Top Three most popular operas in the United States by "Opera America," just behind "Madama Butterfly" and "La bohème." Sacramento Opera's production will be sung in Italian with English supertitles. James Marvel directs and Timm Rolek returns to conduct the Sacramento Philharmonic Orchestra.

Soprano Karen Slack will perform as Violetta. She has

performed internationally to much acclaim. Her voice is described as "warmly expressive." Slack's career has been fostered by both the Santa Fe and San Francisco operas, which recognized her native talent and invited her to participate in their programs for young artists. She is noted as a talented performer whose star is on the rise.

Tenor Alexander Boyer is cast as Alfredo. Boyer has performed with the San Jose Opera, as well as the Merola and Santa Fe Opera programs. He is a winner of the Mario Lanza Scholarship Award.

"La Traviata" will run for three performances: Friday, Feb. 26 at 8 p.m., Sunday, Feb. 28 at 2 p.m. and Tuesday, March 2 at 7:30 p.m. The Sacramento Community Center Theater is located at 1301 L Street in Sacramento. From rancher to restaurateur: Big Al's BBQ and Deli

A lot of barbecue joints claim to have the best ribs in town, but not all owners can make the claim as lifelong ranchers. Such is the story of Al and Sue Kuhn, owners of Big Al's BBQ in Elk Grove.

The Kuhns make their residence in the Pocket area and have been there for nearly five years, according to Al. But the journey from rancher to restaurateur was a long time in the making.

Al's family lived on a ranch for 50 years, beginning in 1946 at the Circle K Ranch. While there, he met Sue in grammar school. After tying the knot, Al and Sue worked on a ranch they own together in Elk Grove.

As housing developments went up all around their Elk Grove ranch, the Kuhns held occasional barbecues for the industrial workers. The gatherings regularly drew 90-120 people, and several compliments from the workers gave the Kuhns an idea.

"A lot of people said they thought we should open up our own barbecue place," Al

As industry and housing continued to encroach in all directions, the Kuhns decided it was time to move on, eventually moving in to the Pocket.

But they would be back to work, anyways.

When a developer bought some of their land in Elk Grove to put up more new housing, the Kuhns found themselves with a chunk of money to do with what they

pleased. They decided to take over a Mexican restaurant that was failing and Big Al's BBQ was born.

The restaurant opened on December 4, 2008 to booming business.

Business started out great," Al said. "Lately it's been a little slow, but it has started to pick back up."

Despite Elk Grove's apparent lack of barbecue restaurants, Al stands by his claim that you will love his barbecue and the ranch culture.

'Unfortunately, I can't think of any other places around that have barbecue," he said. "But people seem to really enjoy what we serve."

The ambiance of the restaurant is one of the Old West, with pine interior, many old pictures and old branding irons on the walls.

On the menu

The Kuhns take pride in offering affordable prices for their food as well.

"A family of four can eat for around \$45 including drinks," Sue said. "It probably comes out to about \$10-12 per person."

As far as customer feedback, Elk Grove residents are quite clear about their opin-

"People have come up to me and said that our ribs are the best they've ever tasted," Sue said. "People really love our chili, too. We have had a lot of return customers."

But it's not all ribs, ribs, ribs. Al and Sue ran down the menu, which includes tri-tip, chicken, potato salad, onion rings, french fries, okra, salad and coleslaw. Soon they will be introducing hamburgers to the menu

"We eat there quite a bit," Al said. "We are there a long time every day.

Both Al and Sue said that their favorite item on the menu is the tri-tip sandwich, which comes with a house barbecue sauce. That pretty much takes care of giving a good fallback option if you're unsure of what to order when gazing at the menu. Al also likes the Old Susanna Salad served with chicken. Since he and Sue eat there often, they try to make sure they don't eat red meat for every meal.

The next step for the restaurant is to one day soon have live entertainment in the form of singers. During the spring months they can use the porch to house a band to perform, but nothing is set as

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Twain you and me

In response to a news story that he was at death's door in London, Missouri-born Samuel Langhorne Clemens, known popularly by penname Mark Twain, wrote, "The reports of my death are greatly exaggerated."

Indeed, as Twain has since passed, his legend (and wisdom) lives on in popular culture. And while his larger-than-life persona is sometimes exaggerated by modern authors and playwrights, Twain's pointed humor, dogged honesty, keen insights and plainspoken ways are as welcomed now as they were when he was writing for The Sacramento Union newspaper during the 19th century.

It has been nearly a century since his death, but his ghost still haunts Sacramento. The capital city's deep political divide would be the perfect fodder for a Twain novel or the subject of a community chat.

Next month, Twain returns to life via the stage and he is back in Sacramento. Actor Hal Holbrook portrays the famous author Saturday, March 6 at 8 p.m. at The Community Center Theater. Tickets are available at the Convention Center Theater Box Office (1301 L St.), Tickets.com, and (916) 808-5181. Ticket prices are \$30-\$60 plus facility and service

Considering Twain's far-reaching legacy, our city is very lucky to have such a connection to the author (much as I'm sure Salinas values John Steinbeck). Clemens might have been born on the Mississippi River, but Twain spoke the language of modern Californians - in his time, he was a pioneer for human rights, women's rights, the environment and the humane treatment of animals. He may have been a character of the Gilded Age (having coined the term in fact), but Twain, pseudonym and all, was the real

The Sacramento Union believed that - and they traded on that reputation. Anytime The Union encountered financial problems, the publisher would drag an old desk out from the backroom and sell it as a "Desk used by Mark Twain." Almost always, those desks sold quickly.

A chance to experience a form of Twain today is a treat. As Twain's close friend Helen Keller wrote, "I think 'Mark Twain' is a very appropriate nom de plume for Mr. Clemens because it has a funny and quaint sound that goes well with his amusing writings, and its nautical significance suggests the deep and beautiful things he has written."





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
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

Year of the Tiger roars into the Pocket

Throughout the week of Feb. 16 to Feb. 19, students from Pocket's Kennedy High School celebrated the Chinese New Year, which was February 14. According to tradition, this is the "Year of the Tiger." 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Good things grow at county organic gardening club

A lot of things seem to be taking the "green" approach these days. But this movement seems to have only started in the last few years as far as cars and other machinery are concerned. One Sacramento club, however, has been advocating the green motto for 25 years in the form of gar-

The Organic Gardening Club of Sacramento County is a non-profit organization founded in 1985, in the absolute infancy of the movement.

"Nobody really knew much about it at the time," club president Barbara Schulte said. "But now I think a lot more people are going organic."

The club meets on the first Friday of each month at Carmichael Park, 5750 Grant Ave. in Sacramento. The meetings are open to the public and one of the goals of the club is to educate people about the benefits of organic gardening rather than just how to do it.

"It is absolutely the healthiest way to grow food both for the environment and for people," Schulte said. "It is very important to grow without pesticides and trying to make the healthiest soil possible.

Healthy soil doesn't just aid in the growing of different fruits and vegetables, it also acts as a nature-made insect repellent, according to Schulte.

"If the soil is healthy it keeps away the harmful insects," she said.

There is a misconception that going organic is a difficult thing to do that leads to much more work being done by the gardener; Schulte described why that's simply not the case.

"It's absolutely easy to do," she said. "You can make it difficult if

you want to, but you certainly don't have to. Most nurseries have organic products and staff that can answer any questions you have about

As with anything else, there are levels of difficulty depending on how far you want to get into it. Schulte spoke of the organic growing of flowers and plants that can actually attract beneficial insects to an organic garden, which could greatly aid growing.

She also believes that the word is getting out about the benefits of organic gardening, partly thanks to groups like hers.

"I think it has become more common recently," she said. "There are many articles out about the different ways to become an organic grower. People are beginning to realize that it isn't complicated and our programs teach them what to do. People are really starting to learn that it's a healthy

The group welcomes new members, but Schulte asks that people attend a couple of the monthly meetings before deciding whether to join. The meetings are open to the public and are a good way to introduce yourself to the concept of going organic.

She also said that the Fair Oaks Horticulture Center has an organic exhibit that could be helpful for interested parties.

The March meeting (which will take place on March 5) will welcome master gardener Mary Ose, who will talk about spring gardening prepa-
