





# Pocket area violinist chosen as concert master of Sacramento Youth Symphony Premier Orchestra

Pocket area Concerto winner Ariana Fong has been playing the violin since she was five years old.

Fong has competed and won many solo competitions. Most recently, she was chosen as Concert Master for the 2011 Winter Concert, performed by the Sacramento Youth Symphony Premier Orchestra.

"I didn't choose the violin," Fong said. "My sister, who is older, started out on violin and ended up not liking it very much, so it got passed down to me.

"The violin fits me, I am open, loud, opinionated and I like my voice to be heard just like the violin likes to be heard in an orchestra," Fong said.

Fong said she practices the violin an hour each day dur-

ing the week and three hours on Saturday and Sunday.

Wistfully, she says she had to give up tennis, one of her loves, because it was just too much of a time commitment to play tennis and play the violin.

Fong said as much as she loves playing the violin, she does not plan on studying it at college. She said she would like to continue playing the violin on the side. Her goal is to either become a dentist or a civil engineer like her mom, though she is leaning towards dentistry. She has been accepted to the University of the Pacific in Stockton.

Fong, like many orchestra players who are violinists, had to work her way up to be becoming a concert master. She has been a part of the Premiere Orchestra for four years. She started out her freshman year of high school as a second violinist, she then

moved up to first violinist. Later she became an associate concert master and last year moved up to concert master.

Fong said it takes a lot of experience to get to this point. She said you have to really want to play the music perfectly the first time.

She says she does not get nervous during a performance, but she does get nervous the whole month before the performance. "The moments before I go on stage is torture," Fong said. "As a violinist, I have to rely on muscle memory to get through a concert."

She said she felt really confident during her performance in February, something she says she never experienced before.

Fong comes from a musical family. Her mom plays the piano and her dad plays the guitar. Her sister, Francesca, plays the cello. They are members of the Laguna Baptist Church and play as part of the Praise team. Fong plays the piano, electric guitar, drums and the Irish pen-

ny whistle for her church. She started taking piano lessons at age three.

When Fong plays during performances she does not concentrate on the notes.

"You either have it or you don't," Fong said. "I think about my surroundings and who is in the audience and how I am feeling at the moment."

Fong graduates from Mc-Clatchy High School this spring and said she and her friends plan on playing a contemporary piece at the ceremony.

Fong almost quit the violin four years ago when she

### Two Pocket women compete to enter Miss America Pageant

Parker said her school counselor encouraged her to try out for Miss California Teen. Parker is 15 years old, turning 16 in May.

"I decided to try out for the pageant because I wanted to expand my horizons," Parker said. "I believe entering the pageant has increased my self-esteem and leadership skills."

Parker said she applied online and was soon doing interviews over the phone. After a month of interviews, she was accepted into the pageant.

"This has been very exciting," Parker said. "The only hard part has been trying to find sponsors, which I am working on right now."

The pageant will be held sometime in November in either Palm Springs or Los Angeles. The winner receives cash, prizes and college scholarships. All participants need sponsors to provide \$2000 for their expenses. In return the sponsors will receive advertising through various means.

Both Parker and Johnston are working on sponsorships. Many of the ways sponsors help is through providing services such as gym memberships and donations for events.

Johnston, 22 years old, is running for Miss California. She said a friend of hers who ran last year and won Miss Photogenic, encouraged her to

"I like to do things outside of my comfort zone," Johnston said. "Last year I ran two half marathons and one full marathon, plus I have spent the last two years abroad doing missionary work."

Kellie Reali, who met Johnston at a summer youth camp eight years ago said Johnston is very passionate about wanting to help people.

When you first meet Claire, she is instantly engaging," Reali said. "She is upbeat and seems genuinely happy to meet you."

During one of the pageant interviews, Parker was asked which super power she possessed.

"I answered the power of giving," Parker said. "It is an amazing power if you use it correctly."

Parker said her biggest cause is the fight against breast cancer. Her mother is a breast cancer survivor and Parker knows first-hand how it affects families. Parker said her grandfather is also dealing with cancer.

"My goal is make California a healthier place," Parker said. "I want to work on helping improve the environment."

Vonne Matney, a friend of the Parker family for 11 years, watched Parker grow up. She said Parker is a confident, caring, smart and witty young woman.

"Because of what Michelle saw her mother go through as a cancer survivor, she is always open to new experiences," Matney said. "She can roll with the flow. If the unexpected happens, she's adaptable."

Johnston remembers being asked in one of the pageant interviews what one thing would she change in the world if she could?

She said she would teach people to be more selfless and loving. Johnston said her travel abroad taught her that spending quality time with people is very important.

'Nothing matters in your life if you don't love people," Johnston said. "It's what makes your heart bigger."

Johnston said she was given the opportunity to serve in Mozambique, Africa and saw people struggling just to find fresh drinking water. She said

she learned a lot about the different problems these people face.

Johnston said she holds tightly to Gandhi's belief of "Be the change you wish to see in the world."

Parker, who attends Kennedy High School, said her interests are dancing and helping out at her church. Her goal is to become a pharmacist. She belongs to Greenhaven Lutheran Church where she helps with Vacation Bible School and the Lutheran Women's Missionary League. She has been taking dance lessons since she was a small child.

Johnston leads a youth group at Life Point Church in Elk Grove. She worked at Bel Air in the Pocket while attending Kennedy High School. She said she is serving the Sacramento area through the Big Brothers Big Sisters mentoring program.

Diana Marks, who met Johnston when they both worked at Giovanni's Pizza, said Johnston is a very compassionate person.

"At the time a family member of mine was dying and Claire could tell something was wrong. She asked if she could pray with me," Marks said. "It really helped. She is my angel from heaven."

Both girls said they work out on a daily basis now. They also said they have become more aware of what they eat and where their food comes from.

"I don't want anything to jiggle when I'm on the stage," Johnston said

Parker was quick to agree with her. Both girls agreed the reason they entered the pageant was for the positive experience. They said winning would be nice, but making new friends and learning new skills such as speaking in groups is what they find most important.


### Easter Bunny comes early to the Pocket



The Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD) is holding a preliminary public hearing, two public workshops, and an additional public hearing to discuss the proposed restructuing of electricity rates. These proposals would not raise system average rates or increase SMUD revenues. Instead, the main proposals will better align SMUD's true cost of electricity with the delivery of power. The open access transmission tariff and distribution wheeling service rate would go to effect July 22, 2011. The retail rate changes would go into effect January 1, 2012.

Most customers would see only minimal impacts to their electric bills on an annual basis. And SMUD rates would remain more than 20 percent below those of PG&E on average.

The General Manager Report and Recommendations include:

- Time-of-use rates for small commercial customers during the summer billing season.
- A modest increase to the system infrastructure fixed charge, which covers
  maintaining poles, wires, customer service and other infrastructure vital to
  reliable service, moving that charge closer to actual costs for small commercial
  and residential customers (except those on the Energy Assistance Program
  Rate).
- Revert to standard residential rates for customers on the Energy Assistance Program Rate instead of discount rates after usage exceeds 600 kilowatt hours in excess of Base Usage allowance.
- Shortening the summer billing season from six months to four months for residential and small commercial customers.
- · Decrease current standard residential kilowatt-hour charges in all months.
- Decrease current small commercial kilowatt hour charges for all "off-peak" hours.
- Institute a late fee of 1.5 percent of overdue charges.
- · Re-word language on bills to more clearly define specific charges.
- Creation of a new tariff for wheeling power across SMUD's distribution lines and other minor clarifications in SMUD's Rules and Regulations.
- Update the open access transmission tariff to provide generating projects with better access to electricity markets outside of SMUD.

All meetings will be held at SMUD's Headquarters Building, 6201 S St., Sacramento, 95817.

# YO Mamas knitters group in fine tune

When one retires and continues life into the unfamiliar territory of having additional time to spend in leisure activities, oftentimes such a person opts to enjoy new or neglected hobbies. And such is the case of a group of retired ladies who meet weekly at the Pocket area business, Caffé Latté.

Calling themselves, the YO Mamas after a type of knitting technique known as a "yarn over," the group actively participates in various knitting projects, many of which provide clothing for charities.

YO Mama member Diane Denman said that one of the group's charity projects is assisting one of the region's medical centers.
"My daughter-in-lay

daughter-in-law's dad (Danny) passed away from myeloma and so we're donating (knitted) hats to Sutter Roseville for Danny's mother in memory of (Danny)," Denman said.

The group has also joined in creating items for Amer-

ican troops such as knitted squares that were donated for the creation of blankets

"market baskets" or shopping bags that were sold at the Sacramento Buddhist Church Bazaar and knitted items for the Clarksburg Volunteer Fire Department Bazaar. Fran Jaksich, one of the

group's longest term members and a resident of the Pocket area since 1966, said that she has dedicated many hours of her time to creating tote bags for the Shriners Hospital for Children in Sacramento and Maryhouse, a local, daytime hospitality shelter for homeless women and children. To date, she has made about 2,100 bags for this project.

Consisting of 22 members - their present limit the group evolved from another knitting group that formerly met on Friday afternoons at the now-closed Pocket-Greenhaven area coffeehouse, Buckthorns, which was located at the corner of Rush River and Windbridge drives.

Another YO Mamma member, Carrie Parker, who resides within walking distance from Caffé Latté, which is located at 7600 Greenhaven Drive in the Riverlake Village Shopping Center, recalled the moment she met the Buckthorns knitting group, which originally consisted of mostly teachers from John F. Kennedy High School.

"One time (in July 2004), a friend of mine had finished (working out) at Curves (gym for women) and we went over there (to Buckthorns, which was located next to Curves) and this lady was doing something really weird with yarn," Parker said. "She was thrumming and that's when your knitting and you put a piece of roving in between the needles and then you slip it in (during the knitting process). So, we were there talking and (the woman who was knitting) was waiting there for a knitting group and she invited us (to stay for the group's

gathering) and by the time we got through with our coffee, it was 1 o'clock and we (met the group)."

Soon afterward, Parker joined the group, which continued to expand before breaking off into two groups.

Parker, who carries personal cards that include her name, telephone number, a cartoon-like character of a knitting sheep and the words, "To knit or not to knit, there is no question," said that with the closure of Buckthorns, the group had to seek out a new meeting place and eventually moved to Caffé Latté.

Although knitting is naturally the main objective of the group, since it is, after all, a knitting group, music also plays an important role during the members' gatherings.

Among the group's members are musicians who perform for their group.

Known as the Knit Pickers, a ukulele band whose

members all studied under ukulele instructor Glenn Watanabe at the Asian Community Center at 7311 Greenhaven Drive, these local musicians perform ukulele music toward the end of each week's gatherings at Caffé Latté.

And all YO Mamas members agree that the inclusion of this music has enhanced these gatherings by putting smiles on their faces through the use of a type of instrument that has a tradition of creating "happy music."

Despite the Knit Pickers ability to perform a wide variety of songs, there is one song that has become a tradition for the band to

play.

Yo Mama members often perform what could be described in their circles as their hit single, "I'd Like to Teach the World to Knit" – a lyrically reworded version of the popular song, "I'd Like to Teach the World to Sing (in Perfect Harmony)."

By permission of the Knit Pickers, the lyrics to this song are presented as follows:

I'd like to teach the world to knit In straight and even rows Knit Afghans, scarves and vests and hats And socks to warm the toes

Cast on, knit, then purl, repeat My project starts to grow The needles click, I drop a stitch Don't tell, no one will know

That's the call I hear Let the world knit today A call for yarn that echoes on And never goes away

Increase, decrease, check that gauge I'm proud of what I've done That's why I want the world to knit It's fun for everyone

(Song ends with repeat of third stanza)

Parker, who Jaksich decribes as the "sparkplug" of the group, said that although most people typically think of women when they think of knitters, history tells a different story.

"Men knitted before women," Parker said. "Soldiers, fisherman and shepherds were the first knitters. But you know

how we (women) are. We took over pants and everything."

YO Mamas is composed of about 50 percent Pocket-Greenhaven area residents and members from as far south as Elk Grove and as far east as Fair Oaks.

The group's members note that although spending time in a knitters' environment is entertaining for them, one of the most important things that they value in being a part of the group is the friendships they have made with other members.

Jeannie Regal, who joined the group three years ago, said, "I just love it here. You get to make products and you aren't wasting your time watching some stupid TV show."

And Parker added her own theory on the value of knitting in four short words: "Busy hands, happy hearts."



### **Every 15 Minutes program impacts St. Francis campus community**

"Dear Mom and Dad,

"Every 15 minutes, someone dies as the result of an alcohol-related collision.

'Today, I died, and I never got the chance to tell you..."

Possibly the worst news parents can ever receive is that their child was killed as a result of teens involved in drinking and driving. The number of lives affected is staggering, as is the profound sense of loss...and the waste of lives cut off, too soon...too senselessly.

In an effort to prevent loss of lives and to change student behavior, a partnership of many organizations began in 1995 to bring a program to high school campuses that would show students the consequences of drunken - and now also distracted - driving. The program was titled "Every 15 Minutes," (EFM) because at that time there was an alcohol-related death in a traffic collision every 15 minutes.

On April 5 and 6, the EFM program came to St. Francis High School in Sacramento. The program involved the California High-

way Patrol, Sacramento City Fire Department, UC Davis Hospital, the Sacramento County Coronor, the Sacramento Law Enforcement Chaplaincy and a year of planning by a small group of students and staff who worked in secret to plan the day of the initial event.

The reason for the secrecy is to give students the opportunity to experience the same emotions they would encounter if confronted with the loss of a loved one, a friend or acquaintance. It involves students seeing a "re-enactment" of a drunk driving crash with a fatality on their campus.

Students were called out of their classrooms after a "shelter in place" security drill and were instructed to go to the softball field by the student parking lot. Blue tarps covered two vehicles. They sat down, wondering what was up.

Suddenly, the tarps came down to reveal a horrific scene of twisted metal, broken glass...and blood.

The young women were riveted. And dead silent.

The enactment followed in the same steps as a real car accident scene, with one notable exception: the event was narrated by a CHP officer, who put every event into context for the teens.







### **EFM:** Program brings awareness to teens of the consequences of one bad decision

"ejected" onto the hood of the car, was covered by the fire fighters with a blanket. She was "dead."

The "drunk" student was subjected to a field sobriety test...which was failed. As happens in many of these situations, the drunk driver only suffered cuts and bruises... but the consequences of one person's decision to drink and drive were devastating.

The outdoor part of the event concluded with one student being sent to the hospital via helicopter, another to UC Davis Hospital by ambulance, one headed to the morgue for identification, others treated for bruises and one student headed to the county jail. The day would continue with one student being removed from class every 15 minutes, and an assembly the next day would mourn the loss of real loved ones who had perished in drunk driving fatalities - some also involving texting and

The Troubadours were quiet as they departed. Some looked stunned.

And that was the point – to learn from experience without actually "experiencing" an actual fatality.

Parents who agreed to participate in the EFM program with their daughters were also impact-

"As parents, we visited our child (Mia) in the hospital. She was seated beside the 'drunk driver' during the accident, and was found to be 'brain dead,' and 'passed away' shortly after the event," said Clarence Macaspac, a Troubie parent. "We were anxious about the acting' portion of the program, but the nurse in charge told us that the emotions will come naturally. They did. The experience was genuine, and the emotions were real. This program gave us a taste of losing a child, albeit it was makebelieve, but the event was real."

The event was emotionally draining and life-changing for the Macaspac family.

"(It was an) amazing experience," Macaspac said. "I did not think it would affect me that much: (I) had nightmares for two days and stress-related pains. Now we are recovering from the experience and appreciate those who shared with us stories of their losses due to alcohol-related vehicular accidents. We are now very vigilant against driving in a diminished capacity at all times, reminding and reinforcing each other's decisions behind the wheel."

Because of the cost of producing this event - which can approach \$50,000 - EFM is only held on the St. Francis campus once every four years. It is paid for with a grant that is available for all high schools. The CHP is in charge of the overall coordination of the grant and insures compliance for the provisions of

the grant.
"The EFM program is funded by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), who gives money to the state Office of Traffic Safety (OTS)," explained Michael Bradley, public information officer for the CHP South Sacramento. "OTS then gives the CHP the grant specifications. Each high school throughout the state who wants to run the EFM can apply for the grant through the CHP."

One benefit to the community by holding EFM at St. Francis is that it spreads the program's message throughout the region quick-

ly.
"With St. Francis High School being a private school, there are students from all over the Sacramento region," Bradley said. "Each student is able to take back to their neighborhood friends

what they learned and experienced about alcohol/drug and distracted driving related deaths while driving."

According to Aaron Dean, fire-fighter with Sac City Fire and coordinator of the EFM program,

this program saves lives.

"This program has touched many, many students. Often I have students approach me at a local store or restaurant and tell me how they have made different decisions in their lives due to witnessing or participating. Also, parents on the fire department have shared with me they graduated from 'XYZ High School' and volunteer to assist in the crash scene," Dean said. "Often times, their children attend the same high school they did or another local Sacramento area high school that participates in this program. This program has a far-reaching effect within families and the community.

Macaspac agrees. He cited the drop in fatalities since the pro-

gram began 16 years ago.

"Due to the effectiveness of this program, that every 15 minutes is now down to about every 37 minutes," Macaspac said. "Not that we should rest on our laurels - now



She first picked up a basketball competitively at an extremely young age. She joined a church league when she was in first grade and took off from there. Cydni's father, Mike, talked about his daughter's beginnings in the sport.

"Her grandfather was very athletic," Mike said. "They bonded over sports. He would babysit her and take her out to shoot around and she always loved it."

As the years rolled by, it was clear that Cydni had some real talent, but what her father enjoys the most is that she is doing what she loves.

"I think she likes (basketball) more than anything else," he said. "She has always played because she loves it. We never had to make her do anything (when it came to basketball)."

The 2.800 miles or so that sits between Sacramento and Poughkeepsie, N.Y. has been an adjustment for everyone, but Mike keeps it all in perspective.

"It's OK because she really likes the school," he said. "She has made good friends and has a good coach. It's a great fit for her."

After graduating from Kennedy in 2010, Cyd-ni chose Vassar in part because it had the best academic program of any of the schools to which she was accepted. Despite the distance, Cydni is making the best of it athletically as well as academically.

"College in general is a big adjustment," she said. "But I have made a lot of friends on my team."

"Successful" is the word Cydni chose to describe her freshman year both on and off the court. It's easy to see

She led her team to a 16-12 record and a berth in the 2011 NCAA Division III tournament. Just like the wildly popular Division I tournament, the Division III tourney is comprised of 64 teams from all over the country.

Awaiting Cydni's Vassar squad was powerhouse University from Kean Union, N.J. A close game in the first half, Kean eventually opened up a big lead and went on to win 80-49. No team wants to end the season with a lopsided

loss, but Vassar had exceeded this year's goals just by making the tournament.

"Our goal was to make our league tournament," Cydni said.

Not only did they make the Liberty League Tournament, they won it too. It was the first time in school history that Vassar took the Liberty League title and it was the first time the school appeared in the NCAA Tournament. And although Cydni came in as a freshman, her impact was immediate.

She finished second on the team in scoring (17.4) to fellow guard and close friend Brittany Parks (20.3). Cydni led the team in minutes played (38.4), field goal percentage (.480), threepointers made (78), threepoint percentage (.456) and steals (52).

Parks, a junior, talked about Cydni's impact on the team.

"I was forced to play point (guard) my first two seasons at Vassar," Parks said via e-mail. "I was very grateful to have such a talented player

as Cydni come in and automatically make an impact at the (point guard) position so that I could move to the (shooting guard) where I am more comfortable."

Cydni tends to be shy by nature, but as the year wore on she began to show her abilities as a leader on the court.

"Her leadership by example has always been evident as seen through her natural athletic ability and dominance on the court," Parks said. "As the year progressed she felt more comfortable asserting her opinions, which were always helpful."

Parks, a California girl herself (from Escondido in San Diego County), was drawn to Cydni's sense of humor

and general likability. The two have grown close, thanks to basketball. They are so close, in fact, that they even win awards as a duo.

Cydniwas named D3Hoops. com's National Rookie of the Year while Parks was named Fouth-Team All-America by the same site. The two also racked up All-East Rookie of the Year (Cydni) and All-East First Team (Parks).

The first go round at Vassar was a smashing success for Cydni and her teammates. It has done wonders to whet the appetite for seasons to come.

"I can only hope to imagine the amount of success that she will have in her remaining years at Vassar," Parks said.
