



Former Sacramento mayor was Riverside-Pocket area resident

Various locally renowned people have established their homes in the Riverside-Pocket area at different times during the history of this historical community. And among these notable residents was former Mayor Clarence L. Azevedo.

Clarence, who was born in Mountain View, Calif. on Oct. 21, 1909, was the son of John Lawrence Azevedo and Rosa Agnes Silva Balcao Azevedo.

John Lawrence immigrated to Sacramento from the Azores Islands with his brother Frank in the early 1890s.

In 1893, the two brothers constructed a house on the old Jackson Road, five miles east of Sacramento in the town of Perkins, and a few years later, they engaged in winemaking.

Frank later established a farm in Natomas and John Lawrence farmed in Mountain View.

In addition to farming, John Lawrence was able to occasionally provide Portuguese interpreting for the courts through his knowledge of Portuguese and Latin, which he acquired while studying for the priesthood in the Azores Islands.

While residing in Mountain View, John Lawrence met and married Rosa Agnes and together they had three children, who were born in Mountain View.

The Azevedo family eventually sold their Mountain View ranch and purchased a summer resort in Calistoga, Calif

It was there that the family moved into a 14-room house, rented out cab-

ins to tourists and made wine for the government.

With the establishment of Prohibition, the Azevedos lost the majority of their income and moved back to the Sacramento area, where the couple had their fourth child and John Lawrence went to work for his brother in Natomas.

John Lawrence later worked at Manlove Station, east of Perkins, where he managed the McGillivray Ranch.

On Jan. 10, 1920, John Lawrence became a victim of influenza and, as a result, died at the age of 58 on June 6 of the same year. And Rosa Agnes died nearly 17 years later at the age of 52.

Following his father's death, when he was 10 years old, Clarence, who was the oldest of his siblings, worked at a grocery store in Brighton, near Perkins.

At the store, he worked after school for 10 cents per hour from 4 to 7 p.m., then he returned to his home in Brighton to milk his family's cow and sell quarts of milk by horseback.

After his long day of school and work, Clarence would spend time on his homework by the light of a kerosene lantern.

When Clarence was 14 years old, he spent an entire month operating the aforementioned grocery store, as well as its associated gas station while the business's owner was on vacation.

And while he was still working at the grocery store in 1923, Clarence, who was then attending Sacramento High School, purchased a used Ford touring car for \$180.

Clarence turned his vehicle into a means of making money, as his car became a sort of school bus for out of town students.

In being well aware that the county assisted out of town students by paying them \$5 per month to attend high school, Clarence filled his car each day with six other out of town students and then collected his passengers' \$5 per month payments.

During the summers, Clarence earned 25 cents per hour performing cultivating and irrigation

work at the nearby Rooney hop fields.

When he was 18 years old, Clarence applied to work at a Safeway grocery store one afternoon.

Because his desire to work and earn money was so strong, Clarence claimed that he was 21 years old on his application.

Furthermore, he showed up the following morning, without waiting for someone from the store to call him, just

Azevedo: Former mayor played semi-pro baseball for teams in Perkins and Florin

in case a store employee had quit their position and created a job opening.

Clarence's persistency paid off, as he was hired to work at the Safeway store at 2430 J St. His first job at the store was peeling onions.

With his work ethic and drive, Clarence, who eventually worked for Safeway for 16 years, graduated to the order department following an incident in which he took a \$132 grocery order from a Sloughhouse farmer.

At a pay rate of \$22.50 per week, Clarence worked from 7 a.m. until whatever hour his work was completed each night.

Being that he lived in a city that was fanatical about baseball, it should come as no surprise that Clarence showed a great interest in baseball.

In addition to his dedication to Safeway, Clarence, beginning when he was 15 years old, played 15 years of semipro baseball as a catcher for teams in Perkins and Florin.

Although Clarence participated in this popular sport with such notable players as Joe Marty and Stan Hack, Clarence admitted that he was "not in their league."

While he was still 18, Clarence married 16-year-old Alice Banks and the couple had one child, Phyllis Jean.

During the early part of his marriage, Clarence was living with his family in Stockton, where he worked at a Safeway for 10 months.

After transferring back to Sacramento, Clarence successfully managed various Safeway stores.

In about 1940, Clarence, who was then residing at 831 El Dorado Way in East Sacramento, became the manager of a new Safeway store at 2900 Freeport Blvd.

The only other person working at the store at the time was a butcher, named George Zarzana, who resided with his wife, Mary, at 1906 P St.

Within its first sixth months, the store grew from a first week's total of \$315 to the highest volume Safeway store in Northern California, and employed seven clerks.

Azevedo also set up a training course for new employees, and he earned \$5 for each employee hired and trained.

Safeway's upper management was so pleased with the quality and effectiveness of Clarence's work that he was presented with the opportunity to become the supervisor of 27 Siskiyou Countybased stores.

Apparently Clarence did not accept the job, since Alice was well established in the capital city with her own business, the California Apparel dress shop at 2925 35th St. in Oak Park. She had opened the store on Aug. 17, 1935 with \$750 of Clarence's Safeway bonus mon-

Clarence left Safeway on July 10, 1943 to assist Alice with California Apparel, which at various times had stores in other locations in the Sacramento area, Roseville and Stockton.

Recurrent vandalism forced the Azevedos to close the last of their Oak Park stores - there were three such stores at different times - at 2930 35th St. in

In the same year, the Azevedos sold the remainder of their stores and began to operate a very large California Apparel store in the Fruitridge Shopping

Center. This store, which was entirely managed by Clarence and earned \$2.7 million in its last full year, continued to operate until April 28, 1986.

During the time that he was managing the Fruitridge store, Clarence became involved in politics and was appointed to the city council in 1953 to complete the term of Roy Nielson, who had been elected to the state assembly.

In 1956, Clarence began serving in the first of his two terms as mayor, a position he held until 1959.

It was also during this era that Clarence was a member of the executive committee of Solons, Inc. - the organization which purchased the Sacramento Solons minor league baseball team in 1959 - and the head of a committee designed to study the feasibility of financing the fairgrounds at Cal Expo.

In his latter years of his life, Clarence, who passed away at the age of 91 on Feb. 14, 2001, two years following the death of Alice, resided on 43rd Avenue, just off of South Land Park Drive, in the Riverside-Pocket area.

7th annual Sacramento Japanese Film Festival celebrates local Japanese heritage

The Japanese community has been a significant part of the Sacramento and Land Park area for well over a century. So, it is natural that a Japanese film festival would be held here. The 7th annual Sacramento Japanese Film Festival will be at the Crest Theatre, July 8 through July 10.

Six films will be featured, with special speakers and cultural highlights. Ten percent of the 2011 film proceeds will be sent to Japan for rebuilding and social support efforts, in response to the disasters earlier this year.

Dear Doctor

The Friday night opening film is "Dear Doctor." The movie follows the life of a Japanese physician who practices a small Japanese mountain town. Local villagers think Dr. Ino is a saint. However, he is really a kind, would-be physician, caught in a web of lies. This poignant and surprisingly humorous movie asks the questions: What counts in life, and how well do we know one another? This film is the winner of two Japanese Oscars.

The Harimaya Bridge

African American film maker Aaron Woolfolk taught English to junior high school students in Japan. He draws upon that personal experience in "The Harimaya Bridge." This film tells the story of an older African American, Daniel Holder,



portrayed by actor Ben Guillory. He dislikes the Japanese because his father died in a Japanese camp during World War II. As the story unfolds, he learns that he is the grandfather of a half-Japanese little girl. How can he reconcile his feelings? This film will show on Sunday night. Woolfolk will answer questions on his movie after the showing.

One Big Hapa Family

Canadian Yonsei film maker and anime artist Jeff Chiba Stearns tells the story of four generations of the Canadian Koga family through anime, interviews, and historical film footage in "One Big Hapa Family." Local families should find this a fascinating story.

Amazing, educational and off-beat, Annual Turtlerama is July 16

Turtles and tortoises and terrapins, oh my! The shelled, slow-footed Chelonians will serve as the stars of the annual Turtlerama event put on by the membership of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club. This year's event will take place from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Saturday, July 16, at Belle Cooledge Library, located at South Land Park Drive and Fruitridge Road. The free event will include live turtles and tortoises, educational displays, and turtle adoption opportunities.

Felice Rood, founder and president of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club, is the driving force for the annual event, which marks its thirtieth anniversary this year.

"I created it back in 1981 after rescuing turtles in the area before that," she said recently by phone. "The peo-

ple who'd bring rescue turtles to me encouraged me to start a club, and now here it is, 30 years later."

As the organizer of a successful event that has lasted for three decades, Rood said she knows what works and has no problem with trying to keep the event's vibe the same year after year.

"We'll have all kinds of educational information provided by our club members, we'll have tons of displays, and all the animals will be outside," she said. "It's always taken place right there at the Belle Cooledge Library. We never change things; everything stays the same because it's so popular the way it is."

A sense of permanence is also one of the things that Rood most appreciates about turtles and tortoises.

"I like that prehistoric look they have to them," she said with a chuckle. "I used to live in Dayton, Ohio, and my kids started bringing home box turtles all the time. Then one day, they walked in with this gigantic tortoise and my heart just started to sing and it hasn't stopped singing since then."

One such gigantic Greek Tortoise, known as "Jim the Jerk" (it's an affectionate nickname, Rood swears), will be one of the show's featured attractions. The cranky old male just last year helped to father quintuplets after a lifetime of less than amorous behavior around plenty of females.

Rood dedicates herself to educating people about turtles and proper turtle ownership, emphasizing that owing a tortoise or turtle is a long-term commitment.

"Not all people know or realize that, and so they get something little for a pet and then they're caught off-guard when it grows into something huge,"

she said. "That's when they have to call me."

Another point Rood stresses is that pet turtles need natural habitats.

"I always say aquariums are for fish and artificial light is for plants," she said, the tension in her voice evident as she recalled cases she has seen where a turtle's growth was limited to the point of deformity by being kept in an undersized glass tank.

Rood expects the show to draw a good crowd to Belle Cooledge Library; she said mails about 850 newsletters four times a year to the membership of the Sacramento Turtle and Tortoise Club, with mailers going as far away as New York, Florida, and even the United Kingdom.

Summer barbeques, bathing suits, boating...the buzz of mosquitoes

With the warm weather upon us, the buzzing of mosquitoes is everywhere. Late rains and hot temperatures create the ideal conditions for mosquitoes to breed. Mosquitoes are not only annoying, but they can also transmit serious diseases like West Nile virus.

You can prevent mosquitoes and protect yourself from bites by following these tips:

- · Mosquitoes need water to live; they especially like water that is dirty and not moving. Drain all sources of water around your home that may become a fertile breeding ground for mosqui-
- · At least once a week, walk around your property and check around your yard for any containers that may collect water. Empty all buckets, flower pots, children's toys, cans or wheel bar-
- If you are going to enjoy the outdoors around dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active, dress appropriately in pants and a light long sleeved shirt to prevent mosquitoes from biting
- Any time you're outdoors when mosquitoes are out; protect your skin from mosquito bites by using an effective insect repellent. There are many varieties of repellent including lotions, sprays, oils, towelettes, etc. Repellents have various active ingredients



Don't get "munched" this summer – take every precaution to keep mosquitoes from spreading disease. Drain standing water on your property, maintain (or report) neglected pools and wear mosquito repellant.

Lemon Eucalyptus, and IR3535 (from the AVON products). The most important thing to look for in a repellent is the percentage of the active ingredient which can range from five percent and up. The more active ingredient it contains, the longer it will keep you protected and will need to re-apply less often. For example, if a repellent has seven percent of the active ingredient, this will provide approximately two to three hours of protection. You may also consider the activity you will be engaging in. For example, an everyday walk to the park will require a lower percentage of the active ingredient however if you are going camping where there are other biting insects, a stronger repellent will be necessary.

- + Do not over water your lawn and utilize yard waste containers for grass clippings and other debris.
- Change water in pet dishes and bird baths frequently.
- Stock ornamental ponds, fountains and animal water troughs with mosquito fish.
- Dispose of old tires in your back yard.
- Keep hot tubs or spas clean or covered.
- · Run the filter and skimmer in your swimming pool to keep it clean. If you cannot maintain your pool, free mosquito fish are available. Report any neglected pools to the Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito Control District.





Last year, Mya and Rhowen Raju knew they wanted a business of their own. They had limited finances and only a couple of hours each day to invest in this new enterprise.

At first, Mya, who was six years old at the time and Rhowen, who was seven years old, were going to run a lemonade stand. Then they came upon another idea. While visiting their grandfather, the ice cream man showed up and they wondered why they didn't have one in their Pocket neighborhood. They approached their parents with the idea of owning an ice cream truck.

It sounded like a good idea, said Ben Raju, their father. He and his wife agreed to the business with a few caveats.

"We had to promise to do our chores everyday," Rhowen said.

"We had to do our homework and keep our grades up," Mya said.

Mya, and Rhowen are the owners of Icetopia. Mya said she came up with the name 'Icetopia.' Rhowen said he and his sister threw out lots of names before a decision was made.

"Topia means heaven," Mya said."Our business is ice heav-

Aidan Reed, who is seven years old and lives in the Pocket, loves the ice cream truck said Mike Reed, Aidan's dad.

"Aidan is a non-verbal autistic child," Reed said. "Having the ice cream truck come by has been a real learning experience for Aidan."

Reed explained many autistic children do not understand the value of money. Reed said when money is handed to Aidan; he often throws it on the ground. Reed said now that Mya and Rhowen show up in their neighborhood with the ice cream truck, Aidan learned he must pay for the Sponge Bob Popsicle he wants. Reed said the minute Aidan hears the truck coming he becomes excited. Aidan's dad said Aidan could not communicate what he wanted at first, but eventually he started pointing at the

Sponge Bob picture painted on the side of the truck.

Reed said he and his wife Anastasia are truly grateful for the learning experience Aidan receives from Icetopia.

"We don't meet a lot of people with patience for Aidan," Reed said. "The ice cream truck is a special experience

Ben Raju said he liked the idea of his children wanting to run a business and thought it would provide a good learning experience.

Ben said it took over a year to get the business running.

'My dad and I found an old white mail truck in a junkyard that had a blown motor, no brakes and the axles were missing," Ben said. "We had to do a lot of work to get it running."

Mya and Rhowen decided what color to paint the truck.

"We chose yellow, purple and black," Rhowen said. "We wanted to stand out."

Ben said Mya and Rhowen were involved in all steps starting the business. They attended meetings with insurance agents to find the best insurance rate. They watched the truck inspection by the environmental health depart-

Ben said the truck failed the first inspection. He was told the roof had to be lifted to meet the requirement of being able to stand up straight in the truck, so Ben said he

had a relative who was a welder, raise the roof.

Lino Hernandez, a Pocket resident, said having an ice cream truck in the neighborhood is great.

"Ben is a super awesome person and the kids get the orders exactly right," Hernandez said. "Not just kids, but you can see adults standing and waiting for the ice cream

Ben said his children have learned how to use Facebook and Twitter and are working on developing a website.

"People Twitter us what kind of ice cream they want and what street they live on," Mya said. "My brother and I get the ice cream ready and know where to go."

Ben said it's the children's responsibility to keep inventory of the ice cream and reorder it when needed. He said they keep track of the money and know how much things

"We buy our ice cream locally," Rhowen said. "We support our community.

Ben said having an ice cream truck has allowed him and his family get to know their neighbors. He said he wants his children to understand that by supporting their community, it will, in turn, support them.

"We are bringing our community together one sweet treat at a time," Mya and Rhowen said.






