Locals share memories of Sacramento's Edmonds Field and the Solons

When longtime Sacramentans reminisce about landmarks of the area, certainly the Alhambra and the Tower theaters come to mind. But around this time of year, many locals begin to think about the old ballpark, which was located at Riverside Boulevard and Broadway.

Glory days

This old stadium was for many years home to the Sacramento Solons of the Pacific Coast League. However, at various times, the team, as well as the stadium, underwent name changes.

Long gone are the sounds of cheering crowds, cracks of bats connecting with fast-balls and the thumps of hardballs hitting players' gloves at this historic location.

On the site of what was once a playing field, stands for the fans and other features of the stadium is a large parking lot and a Target store

Unfortunately for the sake of local baseball memories, the scene at this location does little to remind anyone of these glory days of Sacramento.

As a respectable and noble tribute, yet in many ways a sort of dim consolation prize, is a marker with a plaque near the northwest corner of the parking lot.

The inscription on the plaque reads: "Edmonds Field, 1910-1960: This was the site of home plate at Edmonds Field, home of the Pacific Coast League's Sacramento Solons baseball team for fifty years. More than 4,200 games were played here over those years and Solons fans set several PCL attendance records. The Solons won the pennant in 1942. Their fans were some of the

best in all of baseball. Dedicated July 26, 1998. Sponsored by Play Ball! Sacramento."

Historic photographs and memories of longtime locals indicate that the marker does not actually designate the precise site of home plate.

Another plaque commemorating the ball park is inside the Target store, near the exit. Shoppers pass by daily with nary a glance.

But such information is merely trivial when considering the value of displaying information regarding the old stadium.

The brick marker serves as a reminder for those who were familiar with the old stadium.

But in some ways even more valuable is the fact that this tribute presents the opportunity for those who were either born too late or moved to Sacramento in latter years to become somewhat familiar with the stadium's history.

History hidden

Since the plaque is affixed to the east side of the roughly 5-foot-tall marker, it is often

St. Elizabeth Parish has longtime connection to **Riverside-Pocket Portuguese**

The historical St. Elizabeth Portuguese National Church building at 1817 12th Street has been a part of the Sacramento community for nearly a century. And throughout the existence of the church, many residents of the Riverside-Pocket area have been members of this parish.

Prior to St. Elizabeth's founding, many Portuguese in the Riverside-Pocket area attended Masses and other religious services at the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament at 11th and K streets, St. Rose Parish at 7th and K streets and St. Stephen Parish at 3rd and O streets.

Parish established in 1909

The beginnings of the St. Elizabeth parish date back to early 1909, when Bishop Thomas Grace was petitioned by the Portuguese community to establish a church to meet

their needs for the conducting of Portuguese services, as well as other traditions.

These traditions mainly included the annual Festa do Espirito Santo (Holy Ghost Festival).

Soon after the request was made for a new parish, property was acquired and plans were completed for the construction of what would become the St. Elizabeth church or "Igreja de Santa Isabel" to its early members. The name of the church was selected in honor of the beloved 13th century queen of Portugal.

Plans for the church were made at Manuel S. Williams' grocery store at 1630 11th Street and the property for the church was donated by Manuel and his wife.

Early reinforced concrete structure

The church, which was one of the first reinforced concrete buildings constructed in the capital city, was designed by Frank Shea and John Lofquist of San Francisco.

Shea and Lofquist designed the building to resemble the 15th century Igreja de São João Baptista (Church of St. John the Baptist) in the island of Terceira in the Azores Islands of Portugal.

Selected to construct the building was the well-known Sacramento building contractor Charles A. Vanina, who resided at 2022 M Street (now Capitol Avenue).

Parish beginnings

During the time that the church was being built, the parish was already in exis-

The parish began at St. Stephen Parish with the October 24, 1909 baptism of a Portuguese child named Joseph Viega.

First priest

St. Elizabeth's first pastor was Father Joao (John) Vieira Azevedo, who was born in the Azorean island of Pico on Nov. 25, 1880.

When he was 21 years old, Azevedo came to California to finish his studies for the priesthood.

After being ordained two years later, he completed assignments in Yreka, Fort Jones and Sutter Creek.

Azevedo was later assigned to Sacramento to establish the St. Elizabeth parish.

On May 10, 1948, Azevedo was bestowed the title of monsignor by Bishop Robert J. Armstrong.

Although he appeared stern and was recognized as being strict in the discipline of the children who he tutored, Azevedo was very well liked and respected by all members of his congregation. He remained active as the church's pastor until June

In addition to assisting in the planning process for the church, Azevedo was involved in the dedication of the church on Feb. 2, 1913. Aze-

vedo presided over the dedication with Bishop Grace.

An active dedication day

On the day of the dedication services, the first wedding at the church was also held, as Joseph Valine and Rosa Neves were married inside the new structure.

Also occurring at the church on the same day was the church's first baptism, that of Mary Alvernaz.

Basement features

Several years after the church was constructed, various features were added in the church's basement.

Among these features were a community center – known as the "social hall," where plays and other entertainment were presented - a kitchen and a unisex bathroom.

Also in the basement was a stage, which was initiated by Azevedo to accommodate his first communion and confirmation classes.

Second pastor

Two years following Azevedo's service as the church's pastor, Father Valdemiro Machado Fagundes, whose secondary education had been financed by Azevedo, became the church's second pastor.

Fagundes' experience leading up to his years as

the church's pastor included serving as St. Elizabeth's associate pastor from 1951 to 1955 and the church's administrator from 1955 to

A sad moment in the church's history occurred on the morning of Tuesday, April 2, 1957, when Azevedo passed away.

Fagundes, who was born in the island of Terceira in the Azores Islands, had a much different appearance than Azevedo.


His youthful looks, which were enhanced by his crew cut haircut, high energy and young behavior caused parishioners to initially question his readiness to become the church's pastor.

As Fagundes matured, he gained the respect of the parishioners, and his willingness to intervene in their welfare and financial problems endeared him to his congregation.

Fagundes, who was also appointed monsignor, retired as the church's pastor on January 1, 1985.


A retirement party for Fagundes, who passed away on Sept. 26, 1996, was held at the Elk Grove S.E.S. (Sociedade do Espirito Santo or Holy Ghost Society) Hall on Jan. 13, 1985. The

event was chaired by Al Balshor of Balshor Florist.

Subsequent pastors

St. Elizabeth's next pastor was Jose F. Ribeiro - of the Society of Jesus - who served the church from 1985 to 1991.

Ribeiro, who was born in Penude Lamego, Beira Alta, Portugal on Sept. 15, 1935, had previously served in Zimbabwe and Mozambique.

Following Ribeiro as St. Elizabeth's pastor was Eduino T. Silveira, who served the congregation from 1993 to 2005.

For two years prior to his pastorship 'at St. Elizabeth, Silveira, who was born in Fenais da Luz in the Azorean island of Sao Miguel on Aug. 10, 1955, served as the church's administrator.

Januarius Rodrigues, a retired pastor who was born in India and speaks fluent Portuguese, became the church's temporary pastor on Feb. 24, 2005.

On following July 1, Rodrigues was replaced by three fathers - Giancarlo Mittempergher, Antonio Luiz Madeiros and Edwin E. Limpiado - from the Congregation of the Sacred Stigmata.

Presently, Mittempergher, who is St. Elizabeth's first non-Portuguese pastor, and Madeiros serve as the pastors for both the St. Elizabeth parish and the Holy Cross parish in West Sacramento.

Recognized landmark

An important moment in St. Elizabeth's history occurred on Feb. 18, 1983, when the church was designated as a"Point of Historical Interest" by the California Department of Parks and Recreation.

A bronze plaque recognizing this designation is located on the west tower of the church, near the edge of the stairway leading into the church.

Today, St. Elizabeth Portuguese National Church is recognized as the oldest Portuguese national church west of New England.

The designation of a Portuguese national church is rare, as altogether there are only three of these churches throughout the United States.

The Catholic Church infrequently grants this designation for churches in certain areas with large ethnic populations.

A centennial for the parish, which included a Mass with Bishop Jaime Soto and a candlelight procession, dinner and dancing at the Portuguese Hall in the Pocket area, was held on October 10 and 11, 2009.

Many people associated with the church are hopeful that a centennial celebration honoring the dedication of the church will be held next

Athletic Director David Carson said the locker room had not been renovated in over 50 years. The lockers were rusty and broken. The school hired a contractor who worked with Bob to better organize the placement of the lockers. The renovation included removing half the old lockers and replacing them with brand new lockers, and repairing and painting the other half. Carson said the students appreciate that there are enough dress lockers for each student to use during P.E. to safely store their clothes and personal belongings such as cellphones and wallets.

St. Francis' first president to retire after 11 years of service

After 11 years of service, St. Francis High School's firstever president, Marion Bishop, will retire on May 31, leaving behind a legacy that includes a capital campaign, technology, campus ministry, and a growth spurt in student population.

The 'President-Principal Model'

In 2001 Bishop, who at the time was working in the Catholic Schools Department for the Diocese of Sacramento, was appointed president of St. Francis High School to bring the president-principal model to St. Francis that other Catholic schools in the area were already using. This model calls for a principal to handle the academics of the school and a president to handle the business side of the school, including fund raising.

"Research had indicated that a when a high school reaches an enrollment of 600 or more students that it really becomes impossible for a single administrator to take care of all the academ-

ic concerns of the campus, as well as all the business," Bishop recalled. "St. Francis was at the threshold of that 600 students and it was time to move in to this new model. I just happened to be first in line to be hired to implement the new mod-

St. Francis' current principal, Patrick O'Neill (who has been principal for three years and was assistant principal for two years before that), said the president-principal model that Bishop initiated was instrumental in the growth of St. Francis' student body from 600 to now 1,100 students. Having this model allows him to effectively concentrate on the academics of the school, while having a compatriot handling the business side.

'Marion and I have clicked from Day One," O'Neill said."We see things the same way and she's been outstanding to work for."

Making improvements

As part of her role as president, Bishop played an integral role in the improvements made to the St. Francis campus over

the years. For instance, when she first arrived in 2001, the school was beginning the first phase of a capital campaign to expand the campus.

"I was really privileged not only to be part of that capital campaign to raise monies to improve the campus and expand it, but also I oriented the expansion itself," Bishop said. For example, she played a pivotal role in the development of the school's current Performing Arts Center and gymnasium.

Throughout her 11 years Bishop continued to make improvements to St. Fran-

"She listened to the student body and what was going on in the education world, and then would be strategic in trying to weave that into the direction of the school, whether it be technology, safety or the green movement," explained Shannon Terwedo, past St. Francis High School Board member whose daughter graduated from the school in 2007.

Past Board member Helen Pierson - whose two daughters graduated from St. Francis in 2000 and she herself graduated from the school in 1974 – said Bishop always had St. Francis' best interest in mind in all the decisions she made and that she was someone who could see what was important for the school.

"It's a challenge to have an all-girl high school and keep it running - a lot of different schools have had to go different ways and unfortunately some even had to close," Pierson ex-plained. "St. Francis has been very fortunate be-cause of the leadership that has enabled it to stay above the water and keep itself as a place where young ladies want to go. It's a great school and she's been at the helm for many years and I think it's because of that."

Having faith

One area Bishop focused on building upon during





Remembering my father's garden

Last week, I planted my summer garden.

I started by digging up the soil in my raised bed. Then, I hoed the dirt, raked it, poured manure on it and then raked it again.

After watering the plot, I planted tomatoes, squash, green beans, green peppers and lettuce.

Doing this brought back memories of father's vegetable gar-

One day, back in the late 1950s, my dad came home from a rough day at work and said, "This year I will plant a summer vegetable garden, like my father did."

Sure enough, that weekend, Dad began to dig in the back yard. Soon, he had dug up almost one third of the yard.

After digging, he hoed the soil until it had a nice even texture, then he amended it with fertilizer. Finally, he raked the soil into neat rows with watering channels in between, and planted different vegetables in each row: tomatoes, green beans, squash, cucumbers, radishes and lettuce.

We were skeptical.

After all, don't they sell all these things in the store.

But, within a few weeks, the little plants began rising from the soil. It seemed like a miracle.

By summertime, a full-fledged vegetable garden filled the back part of our yard.

Dad had done it: grown a garden just like his step father, Rosario Petta did in his big side yard.

During the great depression, Rosario had fed his big family with the vegetables he grew in his yard. Now Dad would feed us with the bounty harvested from his plot.

We grew to love the produce harvested from Dad's garden: the fresh green lettuce, the sautéed squash, the tender green beans and crisp cucumbers. Vegetables grown in our own garden did, indeed, taste much better than those from the store.

Dad even cooked up fresh tomato sauce for spaghetti, just like Grandma Petta made.

Growing his own summer garden did more for Dad then just provide food for the table. It relieved the stress from his job, and gave him a connection to the earth. He worked in that garden right up until the day he died.

Now, as I plant my summer vegetables, I think of Dad and the wonderful things he grew. I hope that someday my daughter will grow vegetables in her own garden. She is already a wonderful cook.

Now the thought of my Dad's summer harvest is just another bountiful Janey Way memory.

Longtime fans

An example of a group of longtime baseball fans with connections to the old stadium and its ballgames was found just north of the Tower Theatre at the Flame Club at 16th and V streets last week.

Sitting together discussing their memories of games at the stadium were Norman Greenslate, Joe Duarte, Henry Torres and Wesley Silva.

Roof shagger's tale

Like many longtime Sacramentans, Greenslate played baseball in local leagues during his youth and was a fan of the city's PCL team.

But unlike many youth of the time, he was paid to attend the games.

"In 1937, after I got my Social Security card, I began working there (at the stadium shagging balls on the roof)," Greenslate said. "We used to get a buck a night and a buck and a half on Sundays. We got paid every two weeks. We got \$13. And Ronnie King (who later became a Major League Baseball scout) started working there a little bit after me. He was on the right hand side and I was on the left hand side. So, the ball goes up on the roof and if it didn't bounce over (the roof), I would go up the stairway and get the ball and come down (the stairs). Then they had a little shoot right by the hot dog stand and I'd drop the ball down the shoot and it come out at the bottom where the ball boys were."

Although Greenslate does not know the names of the ball boys at that time, he said that "Smity" and "Shorty" were among the field's groundskeepers.

Duarte said Horace Smith was the birth name of "Smi-

In recalling a particular memory about Smity, Greenslate chuckled and said, "He thought I stole a ball once and so that night he fired me. The next day, he came over to my house and hired me back."

After the games, Greenslate, King and ushers would collect and stack up the seat cushions that had been rented out for 10 cents per cushion.

In exchange for that job, Greenslate and King were al-lowed to eat leftover hot dogs.

"Those were good hot dogs and they had good, good mustard," Greenslate recalled."The closest mustard I found since is Morehouse (mustard)."

Greenslate shagged the balls off the roof for about two years.

During a telephone interview held later in the day, King said that he worked at the stadium from 1937 to 1946, first as ball shagger, then as a batboy, then as a scoreboard operator and lastly he worked in the clubhouse.

Memorable moment

After listening to Greenslate's ball shagging stories, with a smile, Duarte said, "I was just a fan. I was a (ball shagger) out there just in the stands. They didn't trust me up there on the roof."

Duarte said that one of his dominant memories of the stadium was the night Marino "Chick" Pieretti (1920-1981) threw a ball over the grandstand.

"The Solons were ahead and Pieretti was pitching and some guy got a base hit to right field and one run scored and there was still a couple of guys on," Duarte recalled. "The ball came back in and they threw it over to Pieretti. There was no time out yet and (Pieretti) looked up and here comes the manager. He saw the manager coming out to get him and he took the ball and he threw it over the third base stands onto Broadway. Two runs scored and (the Solons) lost the game."

Tough ticket

Henry, 91, who was raised by his parents Jesus and Lupe Torres at 806 Q St., said that although he could not afford to go to baseball games, he discovered that balls that were hit outside the stadium were basically as good as a ticket.

"If you wanted to go to a game (for free), you had to stand outside and wait for a ball to come out over the fence," Henry said. "I only did that once or twice and then I got tired."

School memories

While living off 35th Avenue, Silva attended a Solons game with some of the students from the old Sutter Union School, where Cabrillo Civic Club #5 now operates.

Adding to his excitement of attending the game was the satisfaction he felt when the Solons won the game.

Highs, lows

Of course, there was no greater victory for the Solons than their final game in 1942, when they won the PCL championship.

But as high as fans felt at that moment, they felt at least equally as low six years later when the stadium was destroyed by fire.

Fortunately for the Solons and their fans, the stadium was rebuilt and the team eventually returned to playing at the site.

The game goes on

Although the days of baseball at Riverside Boulevard and Broadway are long gone, minor league baseball is alive today with the PCL's Sacramento River Cats.

Over the Hill Gang loves sports, enjoys good times, reminiscing

Among the capital city's social/service clubs is the uniquely named Over the Hill Gang. But don't let the name fool you. This is one lively bunch.

Certainly, despite this all-men's group's name, its members are never too old for fun times.

A foundation of fun

The foundation of the club, in fact, was laid in the name of fun.

The Over the Hill Gang was established a quarter century ago by a group of Sacramento men who knew a lot about having fun and shared a common interest in sports.

Larry Gunst, who is the youngest surviving member of the group, recently shared his memories about how the organization was formed.

"Gene Sullivan was a customer of mine, who was referred to me by Bobby Rehm, who was an old Stockton Ports (California League baseball) player," Gunst said. "Sullivan had someone at his house (at 2751 12th St.) every day. I would stop by about twice a week. I loved to hear their sto-

'Español' beginnings

Gunst added that Sullivan eventually called him on the telephone and invited him to a luncheon, which was to be held on Dec. 10, 1985 at the Español Restaurant on Folsom Boulevard in East Sacramento.

"(Sullivan) asked me to bring a couple of wines for advertising," Gunst recalled. "He would also pass out my business cards. He was a very generous man. A hundred and four (people) showed up at that gather-

Gunst recognizes the luncheon at the Español Řestaurant as the event that led to the official establishment of the Over the Hill Gang.

"The party at the Español was the beginning of the real thing," Gunst said. "About March of 1986 at Sullivan's house, we discussed making Over the Hill Gang a real club, and we would start selling annual memberships. I remember most members wanted \$6 for the dues. I said, 'If we charge \$10, there would be less trouble with change."

So, upon Gunst's recommendation, the initial, annual cost to be a member of the club was \$10. Today's annual membership cost is \$15.

Early members

The first continuously active members of the "gang" were Sullivan, Charles "Babe" Anderson, Del Silva, Frank Nugent, Billy Rico, Sonny Valine, John Rakela and Lou Brusato.

The earliest occasionally attending members of the club included Gunst, Bill Conlin, John Giannoni, Elmer Enos, Barnie Bernard, Woody Scott, Elton "Lefty" Rogers, Vic Zito, Les Lollis, Carlo Dallosta and Ronnie King.

Sullivan served as the club's first president, Nugent was the original treasurer and Rakela was the first sec-

Regular meetings

As an official group, the "gang" began meeting on a monthly basis, mostly at the Golden Tee across from the Haggin Oaks Golf Complex, but also at The Distillery, the Palomino Room, Joe Marty's and the Hereford House. Occasional mid-week gatherings were also held at the Sheldon Inn on Grant Line Road and Glenn Dufour's Broken Arrow Inn in Rock-

The club has been meeting monthly at the Dante Club at 2330 Fair Oaks Blvd. since the early 1990s.

Some of the members of the group also enjoy spending time visiting with fellow member, Sam Kanelos at Old Ironsides, which is owned by some of the members of the Sam Kanelos family.

Mostly baseball today

In general, the "gang" has evolved from an all-sports club, which included Dallosta, John Giannoni and Milt Cupish, who were involved in football, and soccer player Harry Slaughter, to mainly a baseball club.

A May 12, 1988 article in The Sacramento Bee notes that the roots of the group date back to 1946, "if not to Sister Inez's first grade class at St. Francis school, where 'gang' president Gene Sullivan and treasurer Frank Nugent were classmates in 1922.

The 1946 reference refers to when Sullivan, Nugent and other former local athletes began meeting every Friday at the Commercial Hotel at 231 I Street, near the Southern Pacific de-

Fast friendships

It should come as no surprise that the group has deep roots, considering that its earliest members were simply men who grew up in the capital city, played local sports and attended area high schools. As a result, many of the members were friends long before the establishment of the "gang."

Gunst, who will turn 74 in July,

said that when he joined the "gang"

as its seventh member, he was the youngest member of the group.

Besides Gunst, Rico is the organization's only other original founding member.

Rico, 89, said that he has fond memories of the early years of the Over the

"I was one of the original guys," Rico said."We really had a good group when we started off. Gene Sullivan was one of the original guys and we used to meet at his house all the time. He was a nice guy. He went to St. Mary's College and he went to Christian Brothers (High School). Most of the guys (at the time) were Catholic and Christian Brothers guys."

A place to share

For Rico, who was a successful local baseball player in the Sacramento area for three decades, the group presents an inviting environment for him to share and listen to baseball

Rico's most notable accomplishment in baseball was managing and playing for the Carmichael Firemen baseball team, which won the first Canadian-American "World's Series" for Non-Professional Baseball in 1946.

Harry Donlop is another member of the group who has plenty of baseball memories to share with the

Altogether, he spent 50 years in the game as a player and coach. This experience included working as a Major eague Baseball coach.

Dunlop said that among the many highlights of his career was catching three no-hitters in 14 days in the Appalachian League in 1952.

When asked about the group, Donlop showed off his sense of humor, saying, "Whenever I've been around, I've always gone to the Over the Hill Gang. We meet down at the Dante Club and we tell each other a bunch of lies."

Like Donlop, during part of his membership in the "gang," King was not always able to attend meetings of the group on a regular basis due to his baseball commitments.

King played semi-pro baseball and is a former Major League Baseball scout, who signed many notable players, including Steve Sax and Bob Ol-

Giving back

As a service club, the Over the Hill Gang originally raised funds and made donations to the Stanford Home for

The group has also donated to the Shriners' Burn Center, the Sacramento Food Bank and St. Patrick's Home for Children.

The Over the Hill Gang encourages any man with an interest in sports and socializing to visit with the group on any third Thursday at the Dante

The Thursday luncheons feature different guest speakers. Speakers of the past have included former Major League Baseball players Don Larson, Dusty Baker, Greg Vaughn and Ricky Jordan, former National Football League players Danny Bunz and Skip Vanderbundt, and professional referees and umpires.

Arrangements for speaking engagements are generally made by Jim Jor-

The group also holds annual picnics, which have been hosted at the trap shoot at Haggin Oaks Golf Complex, St. Joseph Church in Clarksburg and at the Dante Club.

Volunteers lead canal, trail cleanup

In honor of National Park Week and Earth Day, a small army of community volunteers led a day of clean and tidy up of the Pocket-Greenhaven Canal Parkway and trail. On April 21, a day before Earth Day, several dozen volunteers, armed with sturdy shoes, work gloves, buckets, and rakes, met at Portuguese Community Park, located on Durfee Way. "We had a good range of people, very diverse,

come out and help clean up the walking trail around the canal," said event organizer and Pocket-Greenhaven resident Araceli Mercado. She was appointed by Councilman Darrel Fong as District 7 Sacramento City Parks and Recreation Commissioner.


"Because of budget constraints, we wanted the local community to feel a sense of ownership in their local canal and events like this provide a great opportunity for people to find out how to get more involved," explained Mercado.

Volunteers picked up several bags of garden debris and litter from the walking trail. The Pocket Canal Parkway follows the canals from bridge at Pocket Road, extending deep into the Pocket area. The motivated group pulled out garbage such as plastic debris that does not leave the environment and cut back tree limbs from the popular stretch of the canal.

City of Sacramento Department of Parks and Recreation provided the volunteers with gardening tools, trailers and garbage cans. City workers filled two trailer bins with brush debris and tree limbs, along with several bags of leaves, weeds and garbage.

"In these tough economic times, the Department of Parks and Recreation is so fortunate to have such community support with volunteers stepping forward every weekend to help maintain our park system," said Dave Mitchell, operations manager, Department of Parks and Recreation. "This past weekend, the Pocket-Greenhaven community took it upon themselves to organize 60 volunteers to weed, trim low hanging trees, and clean fence lines in an area of the park system that the regular crews have not had the time to be able to maintain like we used to in the past. Working together with the community has made a huge difference in the way our parks look and feel."

The Pocket-Greenhaven Canal is a key part of the area, but it has been damaged by littering and graffiti on occasion. Resident Adam Shoppe uses the canal path for running for many years and was happy to take part in the cleanup event.



"There are a lot of problems with litter and overhanging trees and bushes, so I'm just happy to do my bit," he said. "I'm retired now, so I had the time on my hands."

Youth take part in clean-up

More than 50 high school volunteers from C.K. McClatchy, John F. Kennedy, St. Francis and Met High School were out canvasing the area, picking up trash and litter. Several earned community service hours for participating in the clean-up activities.

'It's great to have young people involved in this," said Chad Sweitzer, principal at J.F. Kennedy High School. "Today, kids are more aware of the importance of taking care of their community and becoming leaders in their community. It helps reinforce the idea that it's wrong to litter, and it helps students learn that when they're out picking up other people's litter."

Ruffling some feathers

Some residents came out not to pick up trash and falling tree limbs, but rather monitor the volunteers to make sure they were not disturbing the wildlife near the canal.

We had some calls prior to the event asking if we'd postpone the cleanup for a later time because they were worried we'd disturb the duck nesting," said Mercado. "Before everyone started, we gave the volunteer groups warnings and tips about keeping a five-foot clearance from any native bird species. Throughout the three hours we were out there we only saw one mama duck in her nest."

The City plans to have a couple more clean-up days throughout the summer, concentrating more on trash pick-up in the canal itself.

'We had calls from neighbors saying there are couches, bikes, and furniture in the water. Councilman Fong plans to bring a barge out later this year to address those issues," said Mercado. "This is a community-wide effort. This weekend's effort just shows how a little bit of work makes a difference when people come together."
