The ride was divided into two treks, with the first portion totaling 31 states and 6,025 miles, from Salem, Ore. to Washington, D.C., and being completed after five months on the road in October 2011. The second leg of his ride, which began on April 28 at the Kent Is-

When King arrived at the Sacramento Elks lodge on Riverside Boulevard in the Pocket area after riding from Vacaville, he was in high spirits for a variety of reasons, including the fact that he was only about two weeks away from completing his ride.

In commenting about his visit to Sacramento, King said, "The Elks today, they put all the flags out there and as I rode in they were waiting for me. The city of Sacramento is beautiful. I'm not kidding. I came through Sacramento and it's a wonderful city. I can't say enough about the city. It's very nice, very nice.

"The people who were waiting for me were absolutely wonderful – the Elks – and I'm an Elk myself. Elks care and Elks share and they've opened up their arms for me and they're taking care of me."

As part of his welcoming at the Elks lodge, King was presented with a new bath towel, a bar of soap wrapped with a U.S. Marine Corp lanyard, and he was invited to use the lodge's shower room and spa facilities.

He was later an honored guest at the local Elks' weekly Wednesday night dinner.

At the dinner, a donation of \$2,000 from the lodge's veterans' fund and members was

"Scot and I are both members of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and he came to the Elks (lodge in Portland) ize that we were going to have one night at one of our board meetings - I was the exalted ruler at the time – and proposed what he was doing and asking for some assistance, which we, of course, gave," Hartman said. "I personally liked what he was doing and why he was doing it and got involved with him. And the day he left for the ride (in 2010), I became vice president of the corporation."

Hartman also commented mendous physical abilities to undertake such a bicycle ride.

"Most Americans couldn't ride five miles, let alone 14,000 (miles)," Hartman said.



Most Sacramentans would likely have a look of confusion when asked about East Sacramento's "Little Italy." But Frank Ghilarducci is one who remembers this once thriving Italian

neighborhood quite well. After all, Frank, 78, grew up in the neighborhood, which was roughly located from 48th to 58th streets between H Street and Folsom Boulevard.

Bonifazio had sponsored Salvatore to come to America from Italy in place of his brother – possibly Armando Francesconi – who was not able to immigrate to the United States until a later time.

The commute to his job was extremely short for Salvatore, since he resided in a living space above the grocery store.

By the time that Salvatore moved to his 49th Street home, he was a married man and no longer working for Bonifazio.

Salvatore and Marcella were married at St. Mary's (Italian) Church at 1915 7th St. on Sept. 29, 1928.

Marcella, who was the daughter of Jacabo and Giselda (Cordoni) Dinelli, was born in Franklin, Mich. on June 17, eatery was then owned by Ju-

1906 and her family came to Sacramento in the early 1900s.

During his first year living in Little Italy, Salvatore was an employee of the Western States Grocery Co. (formerly Lindley & Co.), a wholesale grocery and coffee roasters business at 3rd and Q streets.

It was also at that time that Marcella began working as a clerk at the John Breuner Co. home furnishings store at 600-608 K St. She remained employed at this locally well-known business until about 1965.

During the early 1930s, Salvatore worked as a bread delivery driver for a local bakery.

And by 1935, he was working at Julius Restaurant at 301-303 J St. This popular Italian

lius L. Giammatti and Arthur P. and Orazio Puccinelli.

Salvatore's long career as a laborer for the city began in

Additionally, Salvatore eventually spent many years working as a bartender for Quirico "Bill" Dallosta at the Western Café at 2001 K St. at nights, while working his city job during daytime hours.

While living in the their 49th Street home, Salvatore and Marcella had two additions to their family - their first-born child, Al, who was born on June 27, 1931, and Frank, who was born on Feb. 2, 1934.

The family temporarily resided in the home of Jacopo Dinelli at 1381 48th St. in 1941 before moving into their own home on M Street a year later.

Frank said that he remembers the M Street house better than any of the three houses that he lived in during his years residing in Little Italy.

"The (M Street) house, which is still standing today, is a single-story structure with two bedrooms, one bath, a living room and a kitchen." Frank said.

Frank added that his family's M Street house also had a basement, where wine would be made each year.

"The (houses in the neighborhood) all had basements and I think at that time, they were allowed to make 200 gallons of wine a year per family," Frank said. "And they would start at one corner and each one would

the (press that had been rented) until they got finished at the end of the block. I can remember us kids going down in the basements, and it stunk like hell down there with the wine and the gnats. I remember watching (the adults) as they would take the tap and they would all take a little bit of wine and they would taste it. They would then put it up to the light and they would talk about it in Italian and, at this time, I didn't know what they were talking about."
Frank recalled that his uncle,

Tullio Cottini, would drink wine with very undercooked bacon.

"My uncle, Tullio, who lived next door (at 5001 M St.), he would get himself a big glass of wine and he would put bacon in a cast iron skillet and put it on this side and put it on that side and then take it out. He had about four pieces (of bacon) every morning. He just heated it and had a glass of wine."

Frank described the Italians of Little Italy as people who would commonly trade among one another.

"Just about everybody (in Little Italy) had a garden back then," Frank said. "We had rabbits and my dad had the best vegetable garden. Tullio, next door, he had chickens, the Ghilarduccis (who were not related to Frank and his family) who lived two houses away (at 4917 M St.), they had something else, and we'd trade off."

In discussing his time in Lit-tle Italy, Frank had little difficul-

Among the Italian family surnames, which he mentioned, were: Baruffaldi, Samboceti, Cortopassi, DaPrato, Mori, Giannini, Guidotti and Costamagna.

Frank's best friends in the neighborhood were Lee Ghilarducci (who was not related to Frank) and Merino DelChairo.

And Frank's childhood memories include playing baseball in the gravel pit, where East Portal Park is now located.

During his years residing in Lit-tle Italy, Frank attended El Dorado School at 5255 J St., Kit Carson Junior High School at 1300 54th St. and Sacramento High School at 34th Street and Broadway. He graduated from the latter named school in 1951.

Frank's days of living in Little Italy ended in 1952, when he joined the Coast Guard during the Korean War.

Four years later, Frank returned to Sacramento and began working for the Pacific, Gas and Electric Co.

He eventually spent 40 years working for the Capital Whole-

Frank, who has resided in the Pocket area of Sacramento for the past 30 years, was married to Donna (Halm) Ghilarducci from 1956 to 1980, at which time she passed away.

His present wife is Kay (Parsons) Ghilarducci, who he married in 1990.

Through his two marriages, Frank has eight children, 15 grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren.

Although Frank's childhood home on M Street was sold in about 1986 in order to pay for his mother's assistant living Alzheimer care facility costs, he still maintains his fond memories of his life in Little Italy.

"I cherish the years I spent in Little Italy," Frank said. "The families all got along so well together and there was always something to eat in the neighborhood and it always smelled so good. I feel sorry for many of the youth of today who don't have the type of closeness and upbringing that we had then. If I could go back (to Little Italy), I would.





And since the ride was a solo project with no support vehicles or support crew, King had to either take care of bicycle repairs on his own or, in the cases of more technical problems, he sought the assistance of bicycle shops.

Some of these shops provided discounts or free service and parts as a way of contributing to the project.

#### 55 flat tires!

Flat tires were the most common problem for King, as he had experienced 55 of them by the time he reached Sacramento.

For King, who has a son named Kalib, a fiancé named Jeaneane (who has a daughter named Kayla) and a dog named Quita, the number 48 is a very notable number.

Besides being 48 years old and visiting 48 states during his ride, King also made it his goal to acquire a state flag from each of the states he visited via his bicycle.

King said that his organization is planning to eventually have the 48 state flags that he was given during his ride raised at the Veterans Memorial Coliseum in Portland in 2013. The flags would be raised in honor of those who have served in the

military from each perspective state.

King's involvement with helping veterans does not end with the completion of his ride, as he plans to give motivational speeches throughout the country and promote his books about American veterans. The first book of his series, "America's Heroes: Untold Stories of Honor, Courage and Sacrifice," was completed in 2011.

In commenting about his recognition as a hero for his dedication to wounded veterans, King said, "There are lots of people out there who are heroes. I'm just trying to do what I can to help others. And I'm hoping I make a good role model for young people. That's what I want to be, a role model for people and maybe (inspire) people to do something bigger than themselves and help others."

After his visit to Sacramento, King was once again back on his bicycle to edge closer to completing the latter stretch of his U.S. trip, which was scheduled to end at the state Capitol in Salem, Ore. on Saturday, Sept. 29.

# **School of Engineering and** Science gets a solar learning lab

Special to the Pocket News

By planting Solar SunFlowers at Sacramento-area schools, SMUD is hoping to generate more than just electricity.

SMUD wants to generate interest in math and science - subjects that will help students develop the skills needed to adapt to a changing energy future.

Topped by six solar panels capable of generating nearly 400 watts of electricity, the Solar SunFlower is an 18-foothigh outdoor learning lab. Students can rotate the panels to see how much electricity the sun provides and study changes in the voltage and current being gen-

The energy readings are stored in a digital recorder that stores the information so students can use the data to perform calculations and conduct experiments. Students can also plug their iPods, laptops and electronic devices into the SunFlower for charging purposes.

With funding provided by SMUD's Community Solar program, SunFlowers have been installed at five local schools in the last year: the School of Engineering and Science in the Pocket area; Will Rogers Middle School in Carmichael; Leo Palmiter Junior and Senior High School in the Arden area; Oakdale School in North Highlands; and Harriet Eddy Middle School in Elk Grove.

# Local nonprofit makes life easier for people in wheelchairs and their families

By DELL RICHARDS

When Carla Gillett—an inventor who has a patent and prototype for a wind turbine with solar power saw a totaled van at a storage company, she saw the potential: A specially equipped van for her husband, Stephen, who is in a wheelchair.

"The owner thought it would be parted out, but I knew exactly what I wanted to do with it," said the 56-year old who lives near Executive Airport. Gillett's husband has had multiple strokes and has been in a wheelchair since February.

Luckily, a friend told her that Paratransit, İnc.—the local nonprofit known for its blue-and-white mini-buses that give rides to the people with disabilities—had started a new division to sell and repair wheelchair-accessible vans.

Because Gillett said "... it needed a lot of repair," the work took three






